This principle ensures that the plaintiff's recovery aligns fairly with their degree of responsibility for the incident. In a contributory negligence jurisdiction, for instance, if a plaintiff is found to have contributed to the accident in any way, they may be barred entirely from recovery. The combination of these two forms underscores a comprehensive view of unconscionability, ensuring that both the negotiation process and the essential terms of the agreement are just and equitable. A mere appearance of fairness or one of the two elements being present would not suffice to void the contract, thus solidifying the necessity for both factors to

Thus, the focus remains on the age of the individual served rather than the bartender's intent or belief.
