The function of a sobriety checkpoint is primarily to check for impaired drivers. In contrast, conducting speed tests focuses on measuring a vehicle's speed, which is not the main purpose of sobriety checkpoints. Checking for vehicle registration is unrelated to assessing a driver's sobriety, as registration verification primarily addresses vehicle ownership and legality. Inspections for vehicle safety check for mechanical compliance and safety features, which, while important, do not address the immediate concern of driver impairment that sobriety checkpoints specifically target. Therefore, the primary aim of these checkpoints is to ensure that drivers are not operating their vehicles while under the influence of alcohol or drugs.
