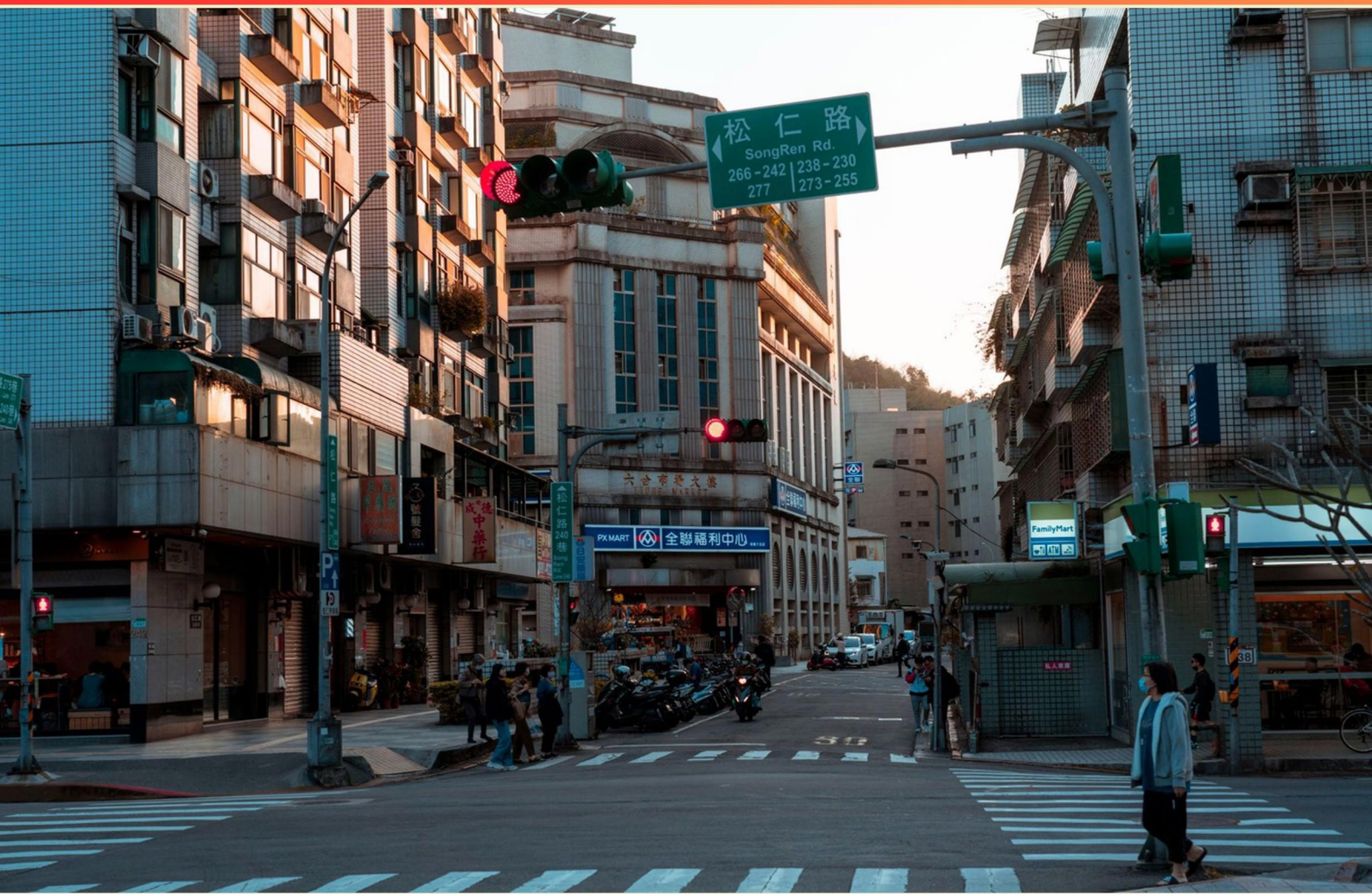

SAMPLE

1. Which statement about proof of insurance is accurate?

- A. You are never required to show proof of insurance to police.
- B. You must carry proof of insurance only if you drive across state lines.

In New York, you must be prepared to show proof of motor vehicle liability insurance whenever a police officer asks for it. The accurate statement captures both parts of the requirement: you must carry valid proof of insurance and be able to provide it upon request. This obligation applies regardless of whether you're crossing state lines or if you think you'll never be stopped, so it isn't optional or contingent on a stop. Insurance cards (physical or approved digital proof) serve as the evidence you'd present to the officer to verify coverage at the time.

2. What should you do when merging onto a highway?

- A. Signal, adjust speed to match traffic, and yield to vehicles already on the highway.**
- B. Speed up quickly without signaling.

When merging onto a highway, you must communicate your intent, blend with the traffic, and yield to those already on the road. Signaling lets other drivers know you plan to enter. Then adjust your speed in the merging lane to match the flow of traffic so you can merge smoothly without forcing your way in. Yield to vehicles on the highway and wait for a safe gap before entering. Once on the highway, maintain a safe following distance and continue to monitor traffic. The other options fail because speeding up without signaling, stopping in the merge lane, or entering without considering traffic can disrupt flow and cause a collision.

3. Which violation is described as an unsafe start?

Unsafe start is a traffic violation that happens when a driver begins to move a vehicle from a stop in a way that endangers others. This includes pulling out from a parked position or accelerating onto a roadway without ensuring there's a safe gap and that pedestrians or oncoming traffic aren't in danger. The question uses the exact label of this offense, so that term identifies the correct choice. The other options describe different violations: failing to yield entering a roadway is about not giving right-of-way to traffic on the road; insufficient notice of a turn signal (less than 100 feet) is a signaling-distance violation; and passing a stop sign is disobeying a traffic control device. Understanding that unsafe start centers on starting movement unsafely helps distinguish it from these other rules.

4. Which violation refers to tailgating or following too closely?

- B. Crossed double yellow line

Safe following distance is essential to avoid rear-end collisions. Tailgating, or following too closely, is the violation that specifically covers this unsafe behavior. When you're too close to the vehicle ahead, you don't have enough room to react if that driver brakes suddenly, which is why this is a separate traffic offense in New York. The other options describe different rules: running a red light is about disobeying a traffic signal, crossing a solid double yellow line is about improper passing or lane use, and turning on red when not permitted is about a specific turn restriction. None of these address how closely you're following the vehicle in front.

5. Which statement is NOT a permitted condition for turning right on red in New York?

- A. Turn on red after a full stop if there is no sign prohibiting the turn.

In New York, turning right on red is allowed after you've made a complete stop unless something specifically says you can't. You must also yield to pedestrians and vehicles before turning. If there's no sign prohibiting the turn, you may proceed after stopping. If there's no red arrow, the absence of that arrow doesn't block the turn on red. If there's no signal that prohibits turning on red, you're allowed to proceed after stopping. However, if there is a red right-turn arrow, that direction is prohibited — you cannot turn right on red when a red arrow is displayed. The red arrow overrides the general permission, signaling you must wait for a green signal or arrow before turning.

6. What is the BAC limit for commercial drivers in New York?

- A. 0.08% BAC or higher is illegal
- B. 0.10% BAC or higher is illegal
- C. 0.04% BAC or higher is illegal**
- D. 0.02% BAC or higher is illegal

Commercial drivers face a stricter limit because operating a large vehicle with any significant impairment poses a higher risk to others. In New York, a blood alcohol concentration of 0.04% or higher is illegal for anyone operating a commercial motor vehicle. This lower threshold comes from federal rules that states adopt for CDL holders, to enhance safety on the road. For ordinary drivers, the general limit is 0.08%, which is why the other numbers don't apply to commercial operation. The 0.02% figure is associated with under-21 or zero-tolerance rules in some contexts, and 0.10% is simply higher than the standard limit for commercial driving.

7. Which traffic violation is described as 'Speed in zone'?

Speed in zone means you were driving faster than the posted limit for a defined area or zone, such as a residential, school, or business district. The signs set a specific speed for that zone, and exceeding it is the offense described as "speed in zone" on a ticket. This is different from speeding in a work zone (which applies specifically to construction or maintenance areas and often carries higher penalties), driving too slowly/impeding traffic (a separate violation for going well below the flow of traffic), or unsafe backing (another distinct violation). In this item, the phrase matches the act of exceeding the posted zone speed, making it the correct description.

8. Which of the following describes the proper stop-sign procedure in practice?

- A. Proceed after slowing slightly
- B. Stop completely, look for traffic and pedestrians, and proceed when safe**
- C. Speed through if there is no cross traffic

Stopping fully at a stop sign, then scanning for cross traffic and pedestrians, and only moving again when it's safe is how you handle a stop sign in practice. The full stop gives you a moment to observe who has the right of way and to avoid collisions. After you've stopped, you must look in all directions and yield to vehicles and pedestrians in or approaching the intersection, proceeding only when it's clear. That description—complete stop, look for traffic and pedestrians, and proceed when safe—best captures the proper procedure. Choices that suggest merely slowing down, rushing through when there's no cross traffic, or ignoring the sign altogether violate the rule and create danger.

9. What must you do when approaching a construction flagger directing traffic?

- A. Ignore signals and proceed as usual.
- B. Obey the flagger's signals and proceed with caution.**
- C. Stop and wait for a green light.
- D. Do a U-turn to avoid the area.

When you approach a construction flagger, the priority is to follow the person directing traffic. A flagger is authorized to control the flow of vehicles in a work zone to protect workers and equipment, so their signals override what you'd normally do at a typical intersection. Slow down as you near the flagger, be prepared to stop, and proceed only when directed. Move through the area with extra caution, watching for workers and moving machinery. Never ignore the flagger's signals, and don't try to bypass the zone with a U-turn or by waiting for a green light that the flagger isn't giving you. The right approach is to obey the flagger's signals and proceed with caution.

10. At a yield sign, which action is correct?

- A. Stop completely and wait for a green light
- B. Maintain speed and merge without yielding
- C. Slow down, yield to traffic on the main road, and proceed when safe
- D. You should speed up to merge quickly

A yield sign means you must give the right of way to traffic on the main road. As you approach, you should slow down, check for vehicles and pedestrians on the main road, and proceed only when it's safe. If there's no traffic approaching, you can merge smoothly without stopping. This aligns with the correct choice: slow down, yield to traffic on the main road, and proceed when safe. Stopping completely is not required unless traffic on the main road necessitates it; maintaining speed and merging without yielding ignores the right-of-way, and speeding up to merge quickly is unsafe.
