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Explanations

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1. Which approach would analyze myth through the lens of unconscious desires and archetypes in the collective unconscious?

- A. Structuralism

Reading myths as expressions of unconscious desires and universal patterns found in the collective unconscious is a psychoanalytic interpretation. This approach treats myths as symbolic channels for inner wishes, fears, and conflicts, using archetypes—like the hero, the mother, the shadow—as recurring symbols that appear across cultures. The idea is that myths reveal deep psychic dynamics, much as dreams do, by decoding what the imagery represents about one's psyche. Because it emphasizes internal processes and shared psychic motifs rather than external structures or origins, psychoanalytic interpretation is the best fit for analyzing myths through unconscious desires and archetypes. Structuralism, in contrast, focuses on the organization of myths—the underlying codes and binary oppositions in language and culture. Cultural materialism centers on material conditions and social practices that shape myths. Etiological analysis explains myths by their origins or functions in accounting for natural phenomena or social phenomena.

The other names listed belong to different figures: Mars is the god of war, and Saturn is associated with agriculture and the older generation of gods, not the name used for Zeus in Roman culture. So the Roman name for Zeus is Jupiter.

Sacred heroes are figures who blend human traits with divine lineage and whose deeds carry religious meaning within their culture. Gilgamesh fits this pattern: in the Epic of Gilgamesh he is described as two-thirds god and one-third man, a king whose authority comes from both his royal status and his divine parentage. His quests bring him into direct interaction with gods, and the epic frames his life as a search that touches on mortality, meaning, and the relationship between people and the divine. That blend of royal power, semi-divine origin, and actions that carry heavy spiritual significance is why he's commonly cited as a sacred hero. Oedipus is best understood as a tragic hero whose downfall arises from fate and personal limitations rather than divine endorsement or sacred mission. Zeus is a god, not the kind of mortal-hero figure who embodies a religious ideal through chosen deeds. Nuwa is a goddess who creates humans, not a mortal hero who is revered for heroic quests; thus she doesn't fit the same category of sacred hero the way Gilgamesh does.

Differentiating sacred narratives from organized belief and practice is the main idea here. Myths are sacred narratives—stories that carry meaning, explain origins, and express a community's values. Religion is the organized system that uses those beliefs and narratives to structure ritual practice, institutions, and social life. In other words, myths often provide the stories that religions retell and sacralize, but religion encompasses more than just the narratives: it includes community leadership, rituals, ethical codes, and the ways a group organizes itself. That makes the best choice: it accurately captures the distinction between the narrative content of myth and the broader, shared system of belief, practice, and organization that religion represents. The other options misrepresent the relationship—for example, treating myth and religion as identical, reducing religion to rituals alone, or claiming myths are historical facts or fiction—whereas the accurate view recognizes myths as meaningful stories that underlie but do not wholly define the organized practices and structures of religion.

5. In Yoruba creation myth, which pairing is central to the creation of the world and humans?

The main idea here is who brings the world and humans into being in Yoruba myth. Olodumare, also known as Olorun, is the supreme creator who entrusts the act of creation to Obatala. Obatala acts as the craftsman, shaping the land and fashioning humanity, with Olodumare providing the life force that animates what Obatala forms. This collaboration between the high creator and the shaping deity is what the myth centers on. Shango and Oshun and the other pairing options don't fit the creation story because they represent distinct domains—thunder and lightning for Shango, river and love for Oshun—rather than the act of creation itself. Ifa is a system of divination rather than a creator partner, and while Olodumare and Olorun refer to the same distant creator, pairing them with Ifa isn't how the myth is framed. Obatala alone is not paired with the supreme source of creation in the traditional telling; it's the partnership with Olodumare that underlies the creation of the world and humans. So the central pairing is Olodumare and Obatala.

Prometheus embodies ingenuity and a concern for humanity. He steals fire from Zeus to give people warmth, light, and the ability to cook and work metal—essential tools that fuel civilization. Zeus had withheld fire to keep humans dependent or to curb their progress, but Prometheus disobeyed and brought it to mankind anyway. As punishment, Zeus binds him to a rock where an eagle comes each day to eat his liver, and it regrows so the torment continues. Epimetheus, his brother, isn't the thief; he's connected to Pandora and other later myths. Typhon is a monstrous challenger to Zeus, not the thief of fire, and Atlas is the Titan condemned to hold up the sky after the Titanomachy. So the figure who stole fire from Zeus is Prometheus.

The other deities have different primary functions: Zeus rules the sky and gods, Athena embodies wisdom and strategic warfare, and Pan is a rustic nature deity. Because of Hermes' unique combination of messenger duties and guidance of souls, he is the best fit for this description.

King Midas is the one who wished for the Golden Touch and learned a harsh lesson. He begs to reverse the gift and, after bathing in a river, loses the power and returns to normal touch. The lesson is to value life, nourishment, and relationships over riches. Other famous rulers—Solomon for wisdom, Croesus for wealth, Priam as a mighty Trojan king—aren't tied to this fable, which is uniquely about Midas.

In Greek myth, the title of queen among the Titans comes from family prominence and role within the divine family. Rhea is the wife of Cronus and the mother of the Olympian gods—Zeus, Hera, Demeter, Hestia, Hades, and Poseidon in many versions. That central position as matriarch and consort places her in the queenly spotlight among the Titans, symbolizing motherhood, fertility, and lineage of the gods. Gaia is the primal earth mother, not a queenly ruler within the Titan line. Nyx embodies night, a powerful primordial figure rather than a reigning queen. Themis is a major Titaness linked to divine law and order, but she isn't typically described as the queen of the Titans.

10. Which hero is associated with slaying the Minotaur?

Theseus is the hero associated with slaying the Minotaur. In the myth, Athens must send youths as tribute to King Minos in Crete, and Theseus volunteers to face the Minotaur in the labyrinth. The Minotaur is a fearsome being kept in a maze designed by Daedalus. With Ariadne's thread to guide him, Theseus navigates the labyrinth, defeats the Minotaur, and then uses the thread to find his way back out. This act links Theseus forever to the destruction of the Minotaur and freeing Athens from the deadly tribute. Other famous heroes have different feats: Perseus defeats Medusa, Heracles completes many labors including the Cretan Bull but not the Minotaur, and Jason is known for the quest for the Golden Fleece.
