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Explanations

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1. Round 41.875 FTE to the nearest whole FTE.

- A. 41
- B. 42**

Rounding to the nearest whole number uses the decimal part to decide whether to go up or down. If the decimal is 0.5 or higher, you round up; if it's lower than 0.5, you round down. For 41.875, the decimal part is 0.875, which is well above 0.5. That means you increase the whole number from 41 to 42. So the rounded value is 42 FTE. In practice, this reflects treating 0.875 of an FTE as essentially a full FTE for reporting.

Guiding and influencing people to work toward a common goal is leadership. Leadership involves shaping direction, communicating a clear vision, and motivating others so their efforts align with desired outcomes. It's about influencing behavior to achieve objectives, not just giving orders or managing tasks. Motivation refers to the inner drive that motivates people, supervision is about overseeing work and ensuring tasks are carried out, and management focuses on planning, organizing, and controlling resources. While those elements support goal attainment, the act of directing and inspiring others toward the goal best captures the concept of leadership.

Non-discrimination in hiring is at the heart of the Americans with Disabilities Act. It requires that when applicants with disabilities meet the essential job qualifications, they are given equal consideration in the hiring process. Employers should evaluate abilities fairly and may provide reasonable accommodations to enable performance of the job, as long as doing so doesn't cause undue hardship. The law does not promise that every disabled applicant will be hired, nor does it require everyone to receive the same training, nor does it permit excluding or restricting people with disabilities from certain roles simply because of their disability. By ensuring equal opportunity for those who qualify, the ADA promotes fair access to employment.

Accuracy of prediction measures how closely forecasts match actual results. In forecasting, you evaluate accuracy using error metrics such as mean absolute error, root mean squared error, or mean absolute percentage error—the smaller these errors, the closer the predictions are to what actually occurred. This directly captures how well the model's outputs align with reality, which is why it's the best criterion for gauging forecast quality. Other attributes describe different aspects: cost concerns the price of running the model, speed refers to how quickly forecasts are produced, and flexibility indicates how well the model adapts to new conditions. While useful, they don't quantify how accurately the forecasts reflect actual outcomes.

Using data and statistics to identify and remove the causes of defects in a process, with the aim of reducing variation and improving consistency. Six Sigma is exactly that kind of approach: a structured, data-driven method that uses statistical tools and the DMAIC cycle (Define, Measure, Analyze, Improve, Control) to pin down root causes and implement fixes that dramatically reduce defects. It also emphasizes a quantitative goal, often described as reducing defects to about 3.4 per million opportunities, which highlights its focus on near-perfection. Other options describe broader ideas rather than the specific, data-centered defect-elimination method. Kaizen centers on continuous, incremental improvements and can be less formal about data and statistics. Total Quality Management is a wide quality-improvement philosophy across an organization. Quality Assurance focuses on ensuring processes and outputs meet requirements, but not necessarily through the rigorous, data-driven defect-reduction framework that Six Sigma employs.

Conflict of interest occurs when a purchaser or someone connected to them has a personal stake in a supplier. That personal stake can cloud judgment, making decisions biased toward a relative's or friend's business rather than what's best for the operation. In practice, procurement should be guided by price, quality, reliability, and compliance; a personal connection to a vendor threatens objectivity and can lead to less favorable terms or unethical outcomes. Fraud involves deception to gain something; collusion and bid rigging involve parties conspiring to manipulate the bidding process. Those scenarios are different forms of unethical behavior and don't describe the situation where personal relationships create bias in purchasing decisions.

7. Which P represents the amount charged for a product?

The main idea here is the marketing mix element that captures how much customers pay. The amount charged for a product is price. In the marketing mix, Price reflects the monetary value placed on the product and can be influenced by costs, demand, competition, and how customers perceive its value. This distinguishes it from the other Ps: Product is the item itself, Place is where and how it's distributed, and Promotion is the messaging and incentives used to sell it. So price is the correct P because it directly represents the money customers exchange for the product.

8. Which are the essential ingredients for yeast-leavened dough?

Yeast-leavened dough needs four essential components to come together properly: flour provides the gluten structure that traps gas; a liquid hydrates the mixture and activates the yeast; yeast is the leavening agent that produces carbon dioxide to make the dough rise; and salt flavors the dough and helps regulate gluten development and fermentation. Sugar and fats can be added for flavor or texture, but they aren't required for the basic dough to rise. The best choice includes all four of these essentials—flour, a liquid, yeast, and salt. The other sets miss at least one essential element (for example, lacking a liquid, or lacking flour), so they wouldn't form a proper yeast-leavened dough. The liquid can be water or another liquid like milk, but having all four components is what makes a basic yeast dough work.

SWOT analysis evaluates internal and external factors by looking at strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, and threats. It separates internal factors (strengths and weaknesses) from external factors (opportunities and threats) to help plan strategies that build on positives and guard against risks. The best choice includes all four elements; omitting any one part leaves out essential information about capabilities or external conditions. By considering strengths and opportunities together, you can leverage positives; by considering weaknesses and threats, you can address vulnerabilities and prepare for risks. For example, a company might have a strong brand (strength) but limited distribution (weakness) while there's growing demand in a new region (opportunity) and new competitors entering (threat).

10. The document prepared by the supplier listing the items delivered and their price is the _____.

This tests your understanding of what kind of document a supplier issues that lists items delivered along with their prices and the amount due. That document is the invoice. It is issued by the supplier and serves as the bill, detailing each item, its price, and the total amount to be paid, which is essential for accounts payable and cost records. A packing slip or packing list, by contrast, accompanies the shipment to show what was sent, but it generally does not include prices. A delivery note confirms what was delivered and may be used for verification, but it typically omits pricing. A receiving report is an internal record created by the recipient to acknowledge receipt of goods and focus on quantities received rather than pricing.
