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Explanations

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1. What should happen when B2 takes a practice swing that contacts the catcher's glove?

When a player takes a practice swing and makes contact with the catcher's glove, the proper protocol according to NFHS baseball rules is for the home plate umpire to declare time. The action of contacting the catcher's glove during a practice swing is considered interference, thus making it necessary for the umpire to step in. Similarly, running outside the field boundaries is not necessarily defined as being out of the baseline, since boundaries are a separate aspect of the field's playing area rather than the runner's movement between bases.

In this case, since the pitch was a third strike, the correct application of the rule leads to the conclusion that both B2 and R1 are out, resulting in a double out due to the interference during an attempt to steal.
