This approach is especially helpful when a word has multiple meanings or can function as different parts of speech, because only one sense will align with how the sentence is built and what it's describing. For example, in a cooking-related line, a blank that could be filled by "pinch," "dash," or another quantity word will usually point to the measurement meaning because of the nearby words like "of spice" and the context of preparing a dish. So the blank helps you determine the correct meaning based on context rather than relying on a single dictionary sense.

For example, if you know the root that means throw, you can connect words like project, eject, and inject and understand their related ideas even without knowing every term beforehand. This approach gives you a systematic way to unlock new vocabulary rather than guessing or memorizing in isolation. Memorizing unrelated words, ignoring context clues, or focusing only on unusual terms don't provide a reliable method for understanding new vocabulary. The root-based strategy uses word structure to reveal meaning and is broadly applicable across many words you'll encounter.

The main idea here is that two things moving together don't automatically mean one causes the other. Seeing infection rates drop as hand hygiene rises to above 90% shows an association, but it doesn't prove that increasing hygiene caused the drop. There could be other factors at work—such as the introduction of additional infection-control measures at the same time, changes in patient populations, shifts in reporting practices, or seasonal effects—that explain why infections declined. To argue for causation, you'd need evidence that the improvement in hygiene preceded the decline and that the relationship remains after accounting for these other factors, ideally with a design that isolates the effect (like a controlled study). So the appropriate caution is that correlation does not imply causation. It's not accurate to claim there's no relationship, since an association is present, nor to claim that higher hygiene guarantees fewer infections, because the observed link doesn't establish a guaranteed cause-and-effect relationship.

For example, recognizing that bio- relates to life and -logy means study helps you deduce biology is the study of life, even if you've never seen the word before. The other ideas aren't as fitting because memorizing dictionary definitions focuses on recall rather than extracting meaning from word form, reading the entire dictionary is impractical and not what these questions aim to measure, and using punctuation to infer meaning hinges on sentence structure more than how a word is built.

For example, "home" usually carries warmth and safety, while "house" is more neutral. The difference lies in connotation, not in the literal definitions. The other ideas point to denotation (the dictionary meaning) or to the sound of the word, which aren't about the emotional associations connotation captures.

The best choice reflects that these goals must be balanced rather than treated as one always more important than the other. In practice, you protect confidentiality most of the time, but there are moments when sharing just enough information is necessary to prevent harm. That balance is what guides professional judgment and policy. If you were to say privacy always overrides safety, you'd miss situations where sharing information can prevent danger. If you said safety always overrides privacy, you'd ignore the critical trust and rights tied to confidentiality. And focusing on cost misses the human and ethical stakes involved. So, the idea that privacy and safety must be balanced captures the real, everyday tension and how clinicians navigate it.

The main idea is the overall point the passage communicates—the big message the author wants you to take away. To spot it, notice what the passage keeps returning to, what the author emphasizes the most, and what idea would summarize everything the passage explains or argues. The supporting details exist to illustrate or prove that central point, so they won't stand alone as the main message. Choice elements like a random detail, the author's favorite color, or the length of the passage don't describe the main idea. A random detail is only a part of the illustration, color or length are about incidental aspects, not about what the passage is communicating as a whole.

Relying solely on authority or on intuition can introduce bias and variability, and leaving outcomes to random chance undermines patient safety and care quality.
