Duty refers to the obligation one has to conform to a standard of care; causation links the breach of duty directly to the harm caused; and damages represent the harm or injury suffered as a result of the breach. Together, these elements form the basis of a negligence claim, but specifically identifying a breach is what indicates that the standard of care was not met.
