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Explanations

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1. Which term is defined as a legal group of people sworn to make a decision in a legal case?

A jury is a group of people sworn to hear evidence and render a decision in a legal case. Jurors listen to witnesses, consider the testimony, and apply the judge's instructions to reach a verdict. This is distinct from a verdict (the decision itself), a legal settlement (an agreement to resolve the case outside court), and a complaint (the formal filing that starts a civil action). So the term that fits the description is the jury.

2. Small claims lawsuits under \$5,000 are heard in which Florida court?

Small claims are designed for quick, straightforward disputes with a capped amount. In Florida, the trial courts are divided into County Court and Circuit Court. The County Court handles civil matters involving smaller sums, including small claims up to five thousand dollars. The Circuit Court takes on larger, more complex civil cases. The District Court of Appeal and the Florida Supreme Court are appellate courts that review decisions from the trial courts, not venues for new small-claim cases. So, a small claim under five thousand dollars is heard in County Court.

A jury is the group of citizens sworn to hear evidence and decide a case. In trial settings, juries listen to both sides, evaluate the facts, and render a verdict on guilt or liability. The other terms refer to different parts of the process: a complaint is the document that starts the lawsuit; a verdict is the actual decision reached by the jury; a legal settlement is an agreement to resolve the dispute without going to trial.

Civil law focuses on private rights and disputes between individuals, groups, or businesses. It covers areas like contracts, property, torts (such as personal injury), and family matters, with the goal of resolving conflicts and providing remedies such as damages or injunctions rather than punishing wrongdoing. This sets it apart from criminal law, which concerns offenses against society and is prosecuted by the government with penalties like jail or fines. While concepts like the burden of proof and due process are important in the legal process, they describe how cases are proven and protected rather than what civil law governs. So the statement that civil law deals with private rights of individuals, groups, or businesses best captures its scope.

5. A person who files a lawsuit in civil court is the...?

In civil litigation, the person who files the lawsuit is called the plaintiff. They initiate the action by submitting the complaint to the court, laying out the facts and the legal grounds for relief. The defendant is the party being sued. Damages refer to the monetary compensation sought or awarded, and a breach is the violation of a duty or contract—concepts that describe parts of the case rather than who starts it. Thus, the correct term for the initiator is plaintiff.

6. Which statement is true about the Florida Supreme Court?

The essential fact is that the Florida Supreme Court is the highest court in the state and serves as the court of last resort. It holds ultimate appellate authority, reviewing decisions from the lower District Courts of Appeal and interpreting Florida law and the state constitution. This means it handles both civil and criminal matters, not just one type, and it has the power to shape how laws are applied across Florida. It is not the smallest court—the state has Circuit and County Courts that are smaller in scope—and it does have appellate jurisdiction, so statements claiming it has no appellate power aren't accurate. The combination of being the top court and serving as the final arbiter on legal questions is what makes the statement true.

A motion is a written request filed with the court asking it to decide a contested issue. In civil procedure, a party uses a motion to seek a ruling on matters like whether there is enough evidence to proceed, or to obtain a specific remedy such as summary judgment. The motion is usually supported by a brief with legal arguments and evidence. An injunction is a court order directing someone to do or not do something, not a request to have the court decide an issue. Mediation is a voluntary process where a neutral mediator helps parties reach a settlement, with no court decision involved. Arbitration is a private process where a neutral arbitrator makes a binding decision after hearing both sides, outside the court system.

8. Which term refers to the freeing of a person accused of a crime due to lack of evidence?

Acquittal is the term for a not-guilty finding when the evidence presented by the prosecution fails to prove the defendant's guilt beyond a reasonable doubt. When this happens, the person is freed and the case ends in their favor, with the protection that they generally cannot be tried again for the same offense. This is different from parole or probation, which are forms of supervised release after a conviction, and from indictment, which is the formal accusation that starts a criminal case. So the freeing of a person accused due to lack of evidence is an acquittal.

9. What is a court reporter?

A court reporter is the person who makes a word-for-word record of what is said in court. They capture every spoken detail—from testimony and questions to objections and rulings—so there's an exact written transcript of the proceedings. To do this, they use specialized tools like a stenotype machine or voice-writing software, and they may provide real-time transcription for the judge and attorneys. This precise record is essential for appeals and for the official court file. The person who keeps order in the courtroom is the bailiff, a committee for settlement isn't a standard courtroom role, and a group of citizens deciding a case is a jury.

Discovery is the pretrial process of obtaining information relevant to the case. Through discovery, parties exchange documents, gather witness statements, and obtain other evidence that may be used at trial. This step helps both sides understand what the other plans to present, locate essential materials, and prepare witnesses, ensuring the facts aren't surprises and the case can proceed fairly. It is not the final verdict, which is the decision made after the trial; it is not the appeal, which comes after a judgment to challenge it; and it is not the sentencing, which occurs after a conviction to determine punishment. Types of discovery include interrogatories, requests for production of documents, depositions, and requests for admission.
