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Explanations

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1. Which route is involved in administering a drug by placing it under the patient's tongue and leaving it there until it is dissolved?

The sublingual route is the correct answer because it involves placing a drug under the tongue, allowing for rapid absorption directly into the bloodstream through the mucous membranes. This method bypasses the digestive system and the first-pass metabolism in the liver, enabling faster action of the medication. Medications administered this way can take effect more quickly compared to those that undergo gastrointestinal processing. The buccal route, while similar, involves placing the medication between the gums and cheek rather than under the tongue. Thus, it has a different absorption pattern and onset of action. The subcutaneous route involves injecting medication into the tissue layer between the skin and muscle, which is not applicable to placing a drug under the tongue. The transdermal route administers drugs through the skin, typically using patches, and is also not relevant to the sublingual method. Understanding these routes and their differences is essential for effective medication administration and patient care.

By breaking the chain, you're ensuring that the conditions for infection cannot be met, thus preventing it from occurring.

At dangerously low levels, like the one described in the question, the risk of cardiac arrest and death increases significantly. This temperature is particularly hazardous because the body is unable to generate sufficient heat to maintain normal function, leading to potential fatal outcomes. In contrast, the values for the other temperatures provided, while they might indicate fever or mild illness, do not reach the critical danger levels associated with hypothermia.

Posture relates to the position of the body and limbs, which can be affected by sliding down in bed but does not directly explain the mechanics of tissue movement involved in the shearing process.
