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Explanations

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1. What is the role of a top coat in gel and acrylic systems?

The top coat in gel and acrylic systems is the protective finishing layer. Its main job is to seal the surface, add a high-gloss shine, and guard against chips and wear, which together boost the durability of the nail. Once applied, it's cured to set, giving the surface a hard, smooth, long-lasting finish. It can also irritate the respiratory tract if inhaled or inhalation exposure occurs. Because of these hazards, it is not safe to touch the skin without precautions; appropriate protective measures such as gloves and good ventilation are essential. The main idea is that a nail unit is a collaboration of several structures that work together to form and protect the nail. The most complete list includes the nail plate (the hard, visible part), the nail bed (the skin underneath that supports the plate), the matrix (the tissue that actually creates the nail plate), the nail folds (the side skin that frame the nail), the hyponychium (the skin under the free edge at the tip), the eponychium or cuticle (the seal at the base that protects the matrix), and the surrounding skin around the nail. Each part has its role: the matrix drives growth, the nail plate sits on the nail bed, the folds and surrounding skin keep the nail anchored and protected, and the cuticle and hyponychium help guard against infection at the proximal and distal ends. This combination is why the full set is the best choice.

Regular maintenance every 2-3 weeks fits how natural nails grow and wear over time. Fingernails continually accumulate daily stress from activities, so a manicure within this window keeps the free edge smooth, cuticles healthy, and the nail plate hydrated. It also allows early detection of any changes or damage, so problems can be addressed before they worsen, which helps nails stay healthier overall even without enhancements. Other options don't support preventive care: waiting six months leaves nails unmanaged for too long; daily care is unnecessary for a professional service cadence; and only addressing nails when they break is reactive rather than proactive, risking more frequent damage.

To start polymerisation you need something to create reactive centers that can kick off the chain reaction. An initiator provides exactly that: it decomposes (often under heat or light) to form reactive species such as free radicals or ions that attack a monomer's double bond and generate the first growing polymer chain end. Once this active end exists, monomers can add one by one in the propagation steps, building the polymer. A solvent simply dissolves reactants and can influence rate but isn't what starts the reaction. A catalyst can speed up certain types of polymerisations, but it isn't universally required to initiate; and heat alone may not reliably produce the necessary reactive species in many systems unless the design specifically relies on thermal initiation with an initiator.

The thing being tested is recognizing the actual natural nail component among items that describe materials or products used in nail work. Using disposable, single-use tools is the most effective way to reduce contamination during a nail service. When a tool is used once and discarded, there's no transfer of microbes from one client to another, which is a core goal of infection control in nail care. Some items that contact skin or nails are designed to be used only once so you can maintain a clean, hygienic standard without relying on sanitizing between clients. Reusing implements can still pose a risk because thorough cleaning and sanitizing between clients may not eliminate every pathogen, and some residues or contaminants can persist. Double-dipping into products introduces bacteria from hands or tools into the product, which can contaminate the entire container and affect multiple clients. Leaving bottles open allows contaminants from the environment and hands to enter and can degrade product quality. So, single-use tools directly minimize cross-contamination and align with safe practice guidelines.

Lift means the separation of the enhancement from the natural nail plate, creating a gap where the product no longer adheres to the nail surface. This bond failure is what people refer to as lifting. The two common causes are moisture or oil on the nail plate, which forms a barrier to adhesion and lets the product detach, and inadequate surface preparation or improper product application, which prevents a proper bond from forming. If the nail isn't properly dehydrated and abraded or the product isn't applied and cured correctly, the enhancement won't stick well and will start to lift, typically at the edges or sidewalls. Lift isn't about a color change from oxidation, nor about the natural nail growing under the product, and it isn't the term micro-leakage. It's specifically about adhesive failure between the enhancement and the nail.

Managing overgrown cuticles means softening and nourishing the tissue so you can safely push back or remove the excess skin without causing damage. Cuticle removers help loosen or dissolve the extra cuticle, making it easier to clean up the area. Cuticle conditioners, including oils and creams, replenish moisture and keep the surrounding skin pliable, reducing the risk of tearing or in-growth. Used together, they provide a safe and effective way to control overgrowth, with products like a cuticle eraser to soften and oils such as Solar Oil to condition. By contrast, heavy nail glue is not for cuticle care and can irritate the skin; sandpaper is too abrasive and won't address softening or conditioning; nail polish remover dries out and irritates the cuticle area.

When shaping nails, two widely used options create different, practical looks: a square shape with a flat free edge and sharp corners, and a round shape with a curved free edge. A helpful hybrid is squoval, which keeps a square silhouette but with rounded corners. This combination gives durability—because the rounded corners resist snagging and chipping—while still looking natural and neat. That's why this choice fits best: it names common, real-world shapes and describes the look they create, including the practical benefit of durability with a natural appearance. Other options bring in shapes that are less about the everyday two-shape combination or describe lengths rather than the shaping style, so they don't fit the prompt as cleanly.
