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Explanations

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1. Which structure is a tubular portion of the reproductive tract that extends from the outer opening to the cervix?

- A. Ovary
- B. Vagina**
- C. Fallopian Tube
- D. Uterus

The vagina is the tubular canal that runs from the external vaginal opening to the cervix. It is a muscular, elastic passageway forming part of the female reproductive tract, and it serves as the route for menstrual flow, intercourse, and childbirth. The other structures aren't tubes extending from the outside to the cervix: the ovaries are glands that release eggs, not a canal; the fallopian tubes connect the ovaries to the uterus but do not extend from the outside to the cervix; and the uterus is the organ above the cervix, not a canal leading to the outside.

2. Which is a cause of decreased blood pressure?

- A. Obesity
- B. Lack of sleep
- C. Increased arterial blood volume
- D. Dehydration**

Decreased blood pressure happens when there isn't enough circulating blood volume. Dehydration lowers plasma volume, so there is less blood in the vessels. With less blood returning to the heart, the preload drops, which reduces the amount the heart can eject with each beat (stroke volume). That lowers cardiac output and, as a result, arterial pressure falls. The body may compensate by raising heart rate, but the underlying issue is reduced circulating volume from fluid loss. Other factors listed don't fit as the primary cause: lack of sleep can affect blood pressure in the short term but doesn't directly reduce circulating volume; obesity is typically associated with higher blood pressure due to increased vascular resistance and related factors; increasing arterial blood volume would raise, not lower, blood pressure.

3. Cilia are hairlike projections extending from certain epithelial cells. These trap and prevent microorganisms from entering deeper into the body.

Cilia help protect the respiratory tract through mucociliary clearance. Epithelial cells lining the airways have hairlike projections that beat in coordinated waves, trapping inhaled particles in a mucus layer produced by goblet cells. The cilia then move this mucus upward toward the throat, where it can be swallowed or coughed out, preventing pathogens from reaching deeper tissues. Other bodily functions listed—circulating blood, producing antibodies, and digesting pathogens—are handled by the circulatory system and immune/digestive systems, not by cilia.

4. Cheilosis is a disorder of the lips characterized by crack-like sores at the corners of the mouth.

Cheilosis refers to inflammation and cracking at the corners of the mouth, a condition often called angular cheilitis. This location-specific fissuring is exactly what the description describes, so this term is the best fit. It can be related to factors like moisture, irritation from saliva, denture issues, or nutritional deficiencies such as riboflavin (vitamin B2), and it may be complicated by fungal or bacterial growth. Aphthous ulcers are canker sores that occur inside the mouth on the mucosa, not at the corners. Cleft palate is a birth defect where the palate does not fuse properly, creating a gap. Herpes labialis, or cold sores, typically present as grouped vesicles on an erythematous base around the lips, not as crack-like fissures at the corners. So the description matches cheilosis best.

5. Which term describes the image being seen from the image receptor side?

In radiography, how the image is described depends on the perspective you're viewing from. When you look at a radiograph from the side where the detector is, you're talking about the view—the orientation or perspective of the image as it is seen on the film or sensor. This differs from terms that refer to how the beam passes through the patient. The projection describes the path and angle of the X-ray beam as it creates the image, which is about the geometry of exposure rather than the viewer's viewpoint. Tangential and axial describe specific beam angles relative to a structure, not the viewpoint from the image receptor. So the term that captures the image as seen from the image receptor side is view.

6. In cold applications, how should the compress be prepared?

Cold applications aim to lower inflammation and swelling, so the compress must deliver cooling safely. Soaking gauze pads in ice water and wringing them out until they are damp but not dripping provides effective cooling without soaking the skin or causing excessive moisture. The damp contact conducts cold well, while keeping moisture controlled helps protect the skin from maceration. Directly applying something very cold or leaving a cold compress on the skin for too long increases the risk of frostbite or irritation, which is why hot water would be inappropriate and why you shouldn't leave it on indefinitely. A barrier between skin and the compress is usually used, and whether a wrap is used depends on the setting, but the key is a cool, damp contact rather than a dripping or dry application.

7. What is the mechanism of action of intrauterine devices (IUDs)?

- A. Prevents ovulation

IUDs prevent pregnancy by making the uterus unreceptive to a fertilized egg and by hindering fertilization itself. Copper IUDs release ions that create a local inflammatory environment and impair sperm function, reducing the chance that fertilization occurs. Hormonal IUDs release progestin (levonorgestrel), which thickens cervical mucus and alters the endometrium, making implantation of any fertilized egg unlikely. Across both types, the resulting effect is that a fertilized egg is unlikely to implant in the uterus, which is why the mechanism described as preventing implantation is the best way to capture how IUDs work.

8. What is the best definition of status epilepticus?

Status epilepticus is a state of ongoing or closely recurring seizures with no meaningful recovery of consciousness between episodes. The best description captures both the persistence of seizure activity and the lack of full neurologic recovery between events. A single seizure lasting more than five minutes is concerning and often treated as status, but the defining element is continuous or repeated seizures without regaining consciousness. Seizures that occur with only brief periods of consciousness between them do not fit this definition, and febrile seizures are a different, typically benign, pediatric condition.

9. Can the donor revoke the intent to donate?

- B. Only with spouse consent

Donor autonomy means a person can withdraw their donation decision at any time while they are alive and competent. The intent to donate isn't binding until the actual donation occurs, so revocation is possible by notifying the medical team or updating the donor registry. This choice protects the individual's right to change their mind. Once death has occurred and the donation process has begun, revocation isn't possible, which is why the timing matters.

10. Which term means excessive thirst?

- A. Hyperparathyroidism
- B. Polydipsia**
- C. Polyphagia
- D. Polyuria

Excessive thirst is polydipsia. The "poly-" prefix means excessive, and "-dipsia" comes from a word meaning thirst, so the term directly describes an abnormally high urge to drink. This signal occurs when the body is dehydrated or when blood glucose is high, prompting the thirst center in the brain to trigger increased fluid intake. Different symptoms refer to other problems: polyphagia means excessive hunger, polyuria means excessive urination, and hyperparathyroidism is a condition of overactive parathyroid glands affecting calcium balance rather than describing thirst.
