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Explanations

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1. In a design-build project, which statement is true?

- A. One entity handles both design and construction, overlapping phases

In design-build, a single entity is contractually responsible for both design and construction, allowing design and construction work to overlap rather than follow a strict sequence. This integration speeds delivery and reduces client management burden because one team handles both sides of the project and coordinates decisions between design and build phases. The other descriptions fit design-bid-build rather than design-build: having the client contract with multiple specialized contractors implies separate design and construction contracts managed by the client, not a single design-build entity. Describing the process as sequential with separate contracts also aligns with design-bid-build, where design finishes before procurement and construction begin. Bidding after construction isn't typical for standard project delivery methods, since procurement and selection happen before or during design to initiate construction.

This tool ties together drawings, specifications, and procurement, helping to avoid mismatches during construction and ensuring smooth coordination across trades. It's used throughout design development and construction to communicate material specifications and installation notes to the construction team and suppliers. The other options miss this core function: a budget ledger relates to cost, a time log to scheduling, and a seating plan to furniture arrangement.

The main idea being tested is how a purchase order is linked to a specific project or client. The other options don't fit this purpose: a supplier's tax ID is for tax and vendor documentation, not project attribution; the delivery route concerns shipping logistics rather than linking to a project or client; and a color swatch code is a design detail, not a way to identify the recipient or project for the purchase.

Entry-level design roles are highly project-driven, so the tasks a designer assistant or junior designer handles can shift a lot depending on the project type and the firm's practices. Different project types demand different deliverables and workflows, and firms vary in how they assign duties to juniors, so their day-to-day tasks can look quite different from one situation to another. In contrast, senior designers usually maintain a more stable scope—leading design concepts, direction, and coordination—while project managers focus on governance like scope, schedule, and budgets, which tend to be more consistently defined across projects. That variability in the junior role best fits the idea that tasks can change with project type or firm.

That clear linkage is what helps prevent mismatches between design intent and procurement. Color swatches are typically tracked with separate color palettes or swatch references, not primarily by item codes. Installation dates belong in schedules or timelines, not the coding system itself. Vendor contact information lives in a vendor database or supplier list, with item codes sometimes used to point to those vendors but not serving as the main purpose for tracking contact details.

Promotion means the communications used to inform, persuade, and remind potential clients about a product or service. Each of these channels communicates value, builds awareness, and supports engagement with clients. The other options describe elements that support quality or identity rather than direct promotion: graphic branding focuses on visual identity and messaging, not the promotional outreach itself; product warranties are post-sale assurances; customer service training improves how you deliver service. Together, these don't function as promotion the way the listed channels do.

The person who may be the only designer on a project or may have junior staff assisting is the Senior Designer. A senior designer can drive the entire design effort solo when the project is lean, or they can supervise junior designers who assist with drafting, renderings, and documentation. The senior's experience is what ensures the design intent is carried through all phases and that coordination among architects, engineers, and clients stays aligned. The Project Manager focuses primarily on scope, schedule, budget, and client communications, not design direction. A Designer or Intermediate Designer works under the senior designer's guidance and is less likely to be the sole lead on a project. A Design Assistant or Junior Designer primarily provides support and assists with tasks rather than directing the overall design.

This communicates precisely what is needed so the contractor sources that exact item. If you described a product by function, you'd be stating what the product should achieve (for example, "provide ambient lighting for the lobby") rather than which product to install. Describing area requirements focuses on space dimensions or layout, not the product itself. And a requirement for a final fire rating is a performance standard, not a description of a specific product. So the concrete product example best represents a Description Specification.

This role is built to support the project team, with work that scales to the designer's growing skill set. Right after school, responsibilities often include drafting support, compiling mood boards, coordinating materials, helping with field measurements, and assisting with various project tasks. As they gain experience, they begin producing presentation drawings—plans, elevations, and detail drawings—and may also contribute renderings to help clients visualize concepts. This mirrors the scenario in the question: a position that is commonly filled right out of school, with tasks that depend on the level of expertise, and where some junior designers who are developing rendering skills start to contribute presentation drawings. More senior options, like a Project Manager, or higher-level designers, involve broader leadership, coordination, and conceptual development responsibilities beyond the entry level.

They plan spaces and select finishes, but they don't generally alter structural elements or the building envelope, since those changes affect safety and require specific architectural credentials. Interior architects, on the other hand, are often licensed as architects and can design or modify structural components and the building envelope. They handle the overall form of the space in ways that involve load-bearing elements, coordination with structural systems, and compliance with building codes, which is why licensure emphasizes their ability to sign and seal drawings for construction. So the statement that interior designers focus on non-structural spaces and finishes while interior architects may handle structural and building-envelope aspects aligns with how licensing distinguishes these professions. (Regulations can vary by location, so specifics may differ locally.)
