For instance, stating that New York City is only in the Southern Hemisphere would be incorrect since the city is located north of the equator. Indicating it is only within the Eastern Hemisphere would also be inaccurate, as the city is west of the Prime Meridian. Finally, asserting that it is only in the Western Hemisphere fails to acknowledge its position in the Northern Hemisphere as well.
