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## **Explanations**

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**1. Which term describes a phrase consisting of a preposition and its object?**

- A. Propositional phrase**

A phrase consisting of a preposition and its object is called a prepositional phrase. The preposition shows the relationship, and the object is the noun or pronoun that completes that relationship. Together they form a unit that can describe location, time, direction, or other details. For example, *in the park*, *on her birthday*, or *to the store* each shows a relationship between words and can function inside a sentence as a descriptor. This is different from a gerund, which is a verb form ending in *-ing* used as a noun (like *Swimming is fun*), and an infinitive, which is *to + a verb* (like *to eat*), which can function as a noun, adjective, or adverb. It's also not a commonly used term; a prepositional phrase specifically centers on a preposition and its object acting together as a unit.

The idea here is the infinitive. An infinitive is the verb form built with *to* plus the base form of the verb, like *to run*, *to read*, or *to eat*. This versatility—the ability to act as noun, adjective, or adverb—sets it apart from other verbal forms. Gerunds are *-ing* forms that act like nouns (*Reading helps you learn*), but they don't include *to*. Participles are *-ing* or *-ed* forms that describe or modify nouns (*a running stream*, *a broken window*) and don't serve as nouns themselves. A clause is a group of words with a subject and a predicate, not a single verbal form.

Character depth and development across a story is what this item is testing. A round character is a fully realized person with many traits, internal conflicts, and the capacity to change in response to events. That mix of nuance and evolution makes them feel true to life. In contrast, static characters stay the same from beginning to end; flat characters are one-dimensional and lack inner complexity; dynamic characters do change, but the real sense of depth comes from the multi-faceted nature and how those traits interact over time. Picture someone who, under pressure, reveals unexpected fears, loyalties, and beliefs—the kind of character who isn't reduced to a single trait but moves through different states while remaining coherent.

Characters with complex personalities come alive on the page when they are described as round. Round characters have depth and nuance: they embody multiple traits, motives, and even contradictions that drive their actions. They grow and change in believable ways, revealing new facets of themselves as events unfold, and their backstories inform why they react the way they do. This richness makes them feel like real people rather than one-dimensional figures. By contrast, flat characters show only a single or limited set of traits and lack inner complexity, so they don't surprise us in how they behave. Static characters stay the same throughout the story, not revealing new dimensions. Dynamic characters change, but round emphasizes the overall fullness of personality—the many layers that make a character feel authentic and relatable.

Joining two independent clauses without proper punctuation or a coordinating conjunction creates a run-on sentence. An independent clause can stand alone as a sentence, so when two of them are fused together with no end mark or conjunction, the result is a run-on. For example, “I went to the store I bought bread” shows two complete thoughts stuck together. Fixing it can be as simple as adding a period: “I went to the store. I bought bread,” or using a coordinating conjunction: “I went to the store, and I bought bread.” A fragment, by contrast, is incomplete and cannot stand alone as a sentence, so it isn’t about joining clauses. Prose simply refers to ordinary writing, not an error. A comma splice is a specific type of run-on where two independent clauses are joined only by a comma, which is a narrowly defined case within the broader idea of a run-on.

Drafting is the stage where you turn your ideas into an initial, workable version of the paper. The final manuscript—and where you’ll publish it—come later, after revisions. Editing for grammar happens after you have a draft, when you’re polishing language rather than building the main ideas.

Graphic organizers help students organize and classify ideas by presenting information in visual formats. They let learners see how concepts relate, sequence events, compare details, or group ideas, which makes understanding and communicating information more efficient. There are many forms, like concept maps, mind maps, Venn diagrams, flowcharts, and outlines, all designed to lay out thinking in a clear, visible way. The described idea fits this purpose because it emphasizes organizing ideas visually to communicate effectively. Textual marking is about annotating or highlighting text, not organizing ideas visually, and adverbs or adjectives are parts of speech, not tools for structuring information.

Think about how we form new words by sticking something onto the front of an existing word. That front piece is called a prefix. Prefixes are syllables or groups of letters added to the beginning to change meaning or create a new word, like un- in unhappy, pre- in preview, or re- in rewrite. A suffix does the opposite, adding to the end (like -ed or -ing). The root word is the base form that carries the core meaning, such as walk in walked or walking. An affix is the general term for any piece added to a word, whether at the front or the end. Since the question asks for the term specifically for syllables added to the beginning, the best answer is prefix.

An interrogative sentence asks a question and ends with a question mark. It usually uses question words like who, what, where, when, why, or how, or it can be formed as a yes/no question. The question mark at the end is the telltale sign. This is different from a declarative sentence, which makes a statement and ends with a period; an imperative sentence, which gives a command and also ends with a period (or an exclamation mark if strong); and an exclamatory sentence, which expresses strong emotion and ends with an exclamation mark. For example, "What time is it?" is an interrogative sentence.

Subordinating conjunction is the term for the word that shows how a dependent clause relates to the main clause. Because, if, and since introduce clauses that cannot stand alone and express relationships like cause or condition to the main idea. This contrasts with coordinating conjunctions, which join two independent clauses; prepositions link nouns to other words without creating a dependent clause; and adverbs modify verbs or adjectives and may signal time or manner but don't serve to connect a dependent clause to the main one.
