The highest level of Bloom's Taxonomy is associated with the ability to create or compose new ideas or products. This level encourages critical thinking and creativity, requiring the individual to not only understand and analyze existing concepts but also to generate new insights or solutions. Other tasks like analyzing and explaining may involve breaking down information and making connections, but they do not reach the same level of complexity or originality as composing. Remembering is the foundational level, focused on recall, which is the most basic form of cognitive processing. Thus, composing represents the pinnacle of intellectual activity in Bloom's Taxonomy.

Thus, Print Concepts is the most accurate skill that aligns with understanding how texts function physically.
