For instance, the artist's unique style may influence the proofs but isn't the main focus of their assessment. Similarly, market value pertains to the economic side of prints rather than their quality, and durability relates to the materials used rather than the quality review process of the prints. Thus, the emphasis on quality and approval correctly identifies the key role of an artist's proof in the
