It shows respect for the reader's time and understanding, allowing them to focus on the important information being conveyed. In contrast, using long, complex sentences can lead to confusion, as it may introduce multiple ideas that could overwhelm the reader. Providing a glossary of terms can be helpful but does not inherently improve clarity in the initial communication; it may serve as a last resort rather than the primary means of conveying ideas clearly. Finally, incorporating multiple viewpoints can complicate the message, as it may introduce diverse opinions that detract from the clarity of the main point being communicated. Thus, focusing on concise and precise language is the most effective approach to ensure clarity in OET writing.
