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Explanations

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1. Who commanded Union forces at Vicksburg?

- A. General William T. Sherman
- B. General George Meade
- C. General Philip H. Sheridan

The level of leadership at Vicksburg hinged on a general who could press a determined siege and coordinate land and river power to isolate the city. That role was filled by Ulysses S. Grant, whose Vicksburg Campaign culminated in the Confederate surrender on July 4, 1863. Grant's method combined patient, relentless pressure with strategic use of supply lines and joint operations with the Navy, effectively besieging the city and wearing down its defenses. The victory gave the Union control of the Mississippi River and split the Confederacy, a turning point in the war. For context, William T. Sherman is best known for his later campaigns in the Western Theater, including the march to Atlanta and the Savannah Campaign. George Meade commanded the Army of the Potomac at Gettysburg. Philip H. Sheridan led cavalry forces later in the war, notably in the Virginia theater. None of them commanded at Vicksburg.

Freedom of Navigation Operations are deliberate naval demonstrations to uphold that ships from any nation may transit international waters and airspace without undue interference. The point is to push back against claims that would restrict that movement, showing that those claims are not consistent with international law. In practice, a FONOP involves a ship or aircraft conducting a transit through waters or through an airway in a way that asserts the right of passage, even when a coastal state asserts a narrow territorial sea, extended baselines, or other zones that would limit innocent passage or transit. The goal is to keep global sea lanes open for all, based on customary international law and, where applicable, the principles of UNCLOS. This is why the best choice emphasizes challenging restrictive maritime claims and preserving freedom of navigation under international law. Live-fire exercises, domestic enforcement actions, or treaty negotiations are not the purpose of FONOPs.

Understanding hull classification symbols means reading the letters as a type plus propulsion. CV designates an aircraft carrier, and the suffix N shows nuclear propulsion. So CVN means an aircraft carrier powered by a nuclear reactor. This distinguishes it from older, non nuclear carriers (which would be CV) and from non-standard labels like "combat vessel" or "civilian vessel," which aren't used to describe Navy ships. Modern nuclear-powered carriers, such as the large fleet carriers, use this CVN designation.

The core idea here is momentum in the war at sea: two battles that decisively shift the balance from Japanese expansion to Allied offensive power, setting up the push toward Japan itself. Midway stands out because it stopped the Japanese carrier offensive and dealt a heavy blow to their carrier fleet. Losing four front-line carriers and many experienced pilots crippled Japan's ability to project naval air power at scale, flipping the strategic initiative to the Allies. From that point, the United States could pursue an offensive strategy across the Pacific, building air and sea bases and choosing targets that would steadily erode Japan's ability to wage war at sea. Leyte Gulf marks the other turning point by delivering a decisive defeat of Japanese sea power during the liberation of the Philippines. The battle demonstrated Allied dominance across combined arms—naval, air, and amphibious operations—while effectively eliminating Japan's capacity to contest sea control in the Western Pacific. This victory opened the door for the invasion of the Philippines, cut Japanese lines of communication, and signaled the end of any hope for a return to strategic initiative for Japan in the Pacific. Other events in the options were important in their own right, but they don't embody the same decisive shift in momentum. Pearl Harbor drew the United States into the war, but it didn't reverse the tide. Guadalcanal was a crucial early campaign, but the war's turning point comes with its later, more sweeping reversals. Coral Sea halted a Japanese advance and showcased carrier warfare, yet Midway more clearly changed the strategic balance. Iwo Jima and Okinawa showed intense fighting late in the war but did not reverse the overall momentum in the way these two battles did.

The big jump was nuclear propulsion. A submarine powered by an onboard reactor can run its electric motors for long periods without needing to surface for air or to recharge batteries, so it can stay submerged and cover vast distances. This dramatically increases endurance, which in turn enhances stealth because the vessel can remain hidden underwater rather than popping up to refuel or recharge. The first nuclear-powered submarine, demonstrated in the 1950s, showed that submarines could operate underwater for extended durations and travel across oceans, redefining both range and stealth. Diesel-electric improvements helped before, but they still required air to run the diesels and recharge batteries, limiting submerged time. Hydrogen fuel cells offered quiet power but didn't deliver the same long-range, sustained underwater capability, and rotary propulsion systems don't represent the major postwar breakthrough in question.

The key idea here is recognizing a failed attempt to project power with a full fleet. In 1812, a American commander tried to lead a large squadron in a bold operation, but the effort did not succeed, illustrating how difficult it was to coordinate multiple ships, keep them supplied, and sustain a campaign against a dominant Royal Navy. This is the best match because it specifically points to a commander associated with a sizable fleet action that ended unsuccessfully in that year. The other options refer to different concepts or later events: sea-denial through raiding, successful single-ship actions, or a later expedition far from 1812.

DDG signifies a Destroyer equipped with guided missiles. In Navy hull codes, the D denotes a destroyer, and the added G (guided) shows it carries guided missiles, distinguishing it from older gun-only destroyers. So the label describes a destroyer whose primary combat capability is guided missiles, which is precisely what the statement about a Guided-Missile Destroyer conveys. Other hull symbols point to different ship types: a nuclear-powered aircraft carrier would be CVN, a diesel submarine would be SS (or S), and a Landing Helicopter Dock is LHD. The combination of destroyer with guided missiles is unique to DDG, matching the concept behind the symbol.

Frigate duels in the War of 1812 show how two large sailing warships would close to firing range and determine the matchup with hull strength and gunnery. The most famous of these duels is the encounter between the USS Constitution and HMS Guerriere. Constitution, under Captain Isaac Hull, met Guerriere, under Captain James Dacres, off the American coast in August 1812. Constitution carried a heavier broadside and, combined with its robust construction, absorbed and repelled many of Guerriere's cannonballs while delivering decisive blows of its own. The British ship surrendered, and the victory earned Constitution the nickname Old Ironsides, giving the United States Navy a dramatic morale boost early in the war. There were other frigate actions during the war as well, such as later clashes involving United States and Macedonian and Constitution against Java, but the widely celebrated early duel that set the tone for naval combat in the conflict is the fight between Constitution and Guerriere. The option referring to the Essex describes a cruising expedition rather than a single ship-to-ship duel.

Air power at sea shifted naval warfare in WWII toward carriers as the centerpiece. Planes launched from carriers could strike targets far beyond the horizon, project force over great distances, and provide crucial reconnaissance and air cover for the fleet. This made surface ships' traditional advantage in gun power less decisive, since they faced threats from the air before they could engage. The major Pacific engagements underscored this shift: fleets built around aircraft carriers and their air wings, with carrier task forces coordinating strikes and defenses, proved more decisive than battleship-led fleets. Submarines played important roles too, but the ability to project air power from carriers defined how battles were fought and won.

This question tests understanding of why the Great White Fleet went on its world cruise. The voyage was a deliberate display of American naval power, modernization, and global reach. By sending a modern, well-trained fleet to circumnavigate the globe from 1907 to 1909, the United States aimed to show that it could project power across the oceans, deter potential rivals, reassure allies, and demonstrate the country's growing industrial and military capabilities since the Spanish–American War. The fleet's global port visits and the conspicuous white paint of the ships underscored a message of national strength and readiness to operate worldwide, not just in the Atlantic. The other ideas don't fit the historical purpose: missiles were not part of the era, the mission wasn't about limited Atlantic operations, and it wasn't primarily about backing colonial holdings.
