1. What term describes an expression with a meaning different from the literal meaning of the words?

- A. Idiom**

An idiom is a phrase whose overall meaning isn't the same as the literal meaning of its words. For example, "spill the beans" doesn't mean to literally spill beans; it means to reveal a secret. That non-literal, fixed meaning is what makes it an idiom. Metaphor and simile are also forms of figurative language, but they work by comparing things directly (metaphor) or using like or as (simile). An expression is any phrase, but it doesn't by itself signal a non-literal meaning. So the term that best describes an expression with meaning different from the literal words is idiom.

2. "Compare and Contrast" is an organizational text structure of an expository text. Which statement best describes this structure?

The question tests recognizing how expository writing is organized. When a text uses a Compare and Contrast structure, it lays out two or more subjects side by side to show what is alike and what is different. This helps readers see relationships and differences clearly, often using linking words such as similarities, both, like, in contrast, and on the other hand. The best description is that this structure is a specific way of organizing information that focuses on comparing and contrasting. It isn't describing a single subject in detail (that would be Description), nor is it putting events in order by time (that would be Chronological Order). It isn't merely naming a general method of organization (Text Organization) but identifies a particular pattern used to present information.

3. Which word means influencing strongly?

Think about a word that describes a strong effect on someone or something. Impact fits that idea because when something has an impact, it strongly influences or changes outcomes, people, or events. That makes it the best match for "influencing strongly." For example, her speech had a big impact on the audience. Formal and informal describe levels of style or tone, not influence. Evaluate means to judge or determine the value of something, not to influence it.

4. Which term describes the punctuation marks placed around the words that the characters say to each other?

The idea here is the term for the spoken words characters say to each other. In writing, the words that characters exchange form the dialogue, and they're shown with quotation marks to signal exactly who is speaking. So the best fit is dialogue, because it names the actual spoken exchange between characters. Captions label or translate speech, a thesaurus is a tool for finding synonyms, and stage directions describe actions and settings, not the spoken words themselves.

5. What term describes a figure of speech that describes one thing as another, without using 'like' or 'as' ?

Metaphor is the figure of speech described here. A metaphor makes a direct claim that one thing is another, instead of saying one thing is like or as another. This creates a strong, imaginative link between ideas. For example, "Time is a thief" treats time as if it were a thief, giving it the sense of stealing moments without saying time is only like a thief. That's different from a simile, which would use like or as to compare (for instance, "Time is like a thief"). It's also not about sound patterns (alliteration) or giving human traits to nonhuman things (personification). Since this describes one thing as another without using like or as, metaphor is the best fit.

Reinforce means to make something stronger or provide support so it holds up better. When you reinforce a structure, you add materials to strengthen it; when you reinforce a skill, you practice to strengthen that ability or boost confidence. The other words don't mean strengthening: effect is the result of an action, affect is to influence, and reveal means to uncover or show something hidden. So reinforce is the word that best captures the idea of strengthening and supporting.

7. What are clues in the text that help determine the meaning of an unknown word?

Using context clues helps you figure out the meaning of an unknown word by looking at the surrounding words and sentences. The text often gives hints in nearby lines, such as a definition stated right with the word, restating the idea in simpler words, giving examples, or showing synonyms or antonyms. These clues let you infer what the word means without stopping to look it up. The really helpful idea here is that you're using the surrounding context to understand vocabulary. Foreshadowing is about hints for future events in a story, captions are labels for pictures, and "context signals" isn't the standard label students learn for this skill, though it describes the same idea in plain language.

8. Puts events in their correct order based upon the TIME in which they happened. Signal words include dates and times.

Putting events in the order they happened is shown by using time cues. When a passage gives dates or specific times, you determine which event came first, second, and so on. That process is called chronological order, because it follows the timeline from earliest to latest. The correct choice matches this idea: it describes arranging events by time. You would look for signals like first, then, after, finally, or actual dates to guide the sequence. The other tasks—comparing similarities and differences, identifying a problem and its solution, or giving a descriptive account—do not focus on placing events along a timeline, so they aren't about ordering by time.

Words that describe what we can see, hear, smell, taste, or feel are called sensory language. This kind of language uses vivid details that engage the senses to help you picture the scene in your mind. For example, saying "the aroma of cinnamon drifted through the kitchen and the bread crackled as it cooled" invites you to smell and hear, making the moment feel real. Figurative language uses comparisons like metaphors and similes, and while it can stir imagination, it's not specifically about describing sensory experiences. Literal language sticks to facts as they are stated, without painting a picture. Descriptive language adds details about how things look or feel, but sensory language targets the reader's senses directly, which is why it's the best fit for this prompt.

10. Shows how two things are alike/different or how one is better than the other.

A. Metaphor

This shows what a comparison does: it looks at how two things are alike or different, and can also note which one is better in a given way. That exact idea—checking similarities and differences or advantages—is what a comparison is for. A metaphor, while it links two things, does so as an image rather than a side-by-side analysis of similarities, differences, or relative value. Exaggeration stretches the truth for effect, not for comparing items. A cause explains why something happens, not how things compare to each other. So the concept described is comparison.
