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Explanations

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1. Which word means an important lesson about right and wrong?

- A. Theme
- B. Moral**
- C. Central Idea
- D. Plot

The main idea here is recognizing a specific lesson a story teaches about how to act. A moral is a clear lesson about right and wrong that a story communicates, sometimes stated at the end of a fable. It's the takeaway that guides behavior. Theme is the broader message about life or people in general, not a single conduct rule. Central idea is the main point the author is making about the text as a whole, and plot is simply the sequence of events that happen in the story. Because the prompt asks for an important lesson about right and wrong, the best word is moral.

2. What is the term for a poet's plan for the pattern of rhyme in a poem?

Rhyme scheme describes the plan for the pattern of end rhymes in a poem. Poets decide which end sounds will rhyme with which, and readers can label each new rhyme with a letter to see the pattern, like ABAB or AABB. This is about how rhyme is arranged from line to line, not about what a line means or how it is spoken. The other terms refer to different ideas: metaphor is a comparison between two things, a narrator is the voice telling the poem, and exaggerate means to stretch the truth. So the term for the plan of the rhyme pattern is rhyme scheme.

The main idea here is using comparison to show how one option stacks up against another. When you describe how a product is better or cheaper, you're weighing features and price against competing items and saying which one is preferable. That act—looking at similarities and differences to judge which is better or less expensive—is called a comparison. For example, saying "This laptop lasts longer and costs less than the other model" uses comparison to argue why it's the better choice. The other terms aren't about evaluating options against each other: a noun names a thing, an adjective describes a noun, and a metaphor is a figure of speech.

4. What is the role of diction and word choice in developing tone in a passage?

Diction and word choice shape tone by signaling the narrator's or speaker's attitude toward the subject. The words a writer selects carry feelings beyond their dictionary definitions—connotations that invite a reader to feel hopeful, angry, sympathetic, ironic, or formal. For example, describing a scene as "shabby and clanky" can create a rough, hostile tone, while calling the same scene "neat and quaint" suggests warmth and approval. The tone you sense comes from how the language makes you feel about what's being described, not just from the facts of the scene. Tone isn't driven only by plot or setting; those elements can influence it, but the voice—through diction—mostly determines how readers perceive the attitude being conveyed. Also, using hard or fancy words doesn't automatically yield a formal tone—the overall pattern of word choice, sentence length, and rhythm in context creates formality or informality.

5. Which word means to get in the way of?

The main idea here is choosing a word that means to get in the way of someone's plans or progress. Interfere means to hinder or block by getting involved in a way that causes problems. For example, when loud construction noises interfere with our ability to hear a lecture, they're getting in the way of listening. The other words don't fit: disprove means to show something is false, impact means the effect something has, and reveal means to uncover or make known. So interference is the best match for "to get in the way of."

6. What is the purpose of summarizing a section of a text, and what steps would you take?

A. To restate in detail every detail from the section.

B. To rewrite the entire text in your own words.

C. To capture main ideas and essential details concisely.

D. To prove the author wrong.

Summarizing focuses on the main ideas and the essential details from a section, and it puts them into your own words in a concise way. The goal is to capture the gist without including every detail, so you can understand, remember, and communicate what you read more easily. Think through the steps you'd take: first identify the central idea of the section, then pick the most important details that support that idea. Rewrite those ideas in your own words, and keep only the information that's necessary to understand the main point. Trim away examples, repetition, and less important specifics, and make sure the summary is shorter than the original and accurately reflects what was said. Finally, check that the summary conveys the meaning clearly. In this question, the best choice describes that purpose: to capture the main ideas and essential details concisely. The other options would either include too much detail, try to rewrite the entire text, or focus on proving something about the author, which isn't what summarizing aims to do.

7. Which sentences give facts, descriptions & examples that help readers understand the main idea?

A. Supporting Details

B. Summary

Supporting details provide the facts, descriptions, and examples that clarify and expand the main idea. They give specific information that helps readers grasp the central point by showing what it means in concrete terms. A summary would restate ideas in fewer words, without adding new information. A theme is the broader message or lesson the author wants to convey, not the specific evidence that explains the main idea. Procedural refers to the steps or processes for doing something, not to explaining or illustrating the main idea with facts and descriptions.

8. Which term means clues in the text that help determine the meaning of an unfamiliar word?

Using context clues helps you figure out the meaning of an unfamiliar word by paying attention to the words and sentences around it. The clues live right in the text, showing descriptions, contrasts, or examples that point to what the word means. So the term that names these hints is context clues. For example, if a sentence says, "The parched field drank in the rainless sun," you can infer that parched means extremely dry by looking at how the surrounding words describe moisture and heat. That's the idea behind context clues: you use nearby information to unlock the meaning of a new word. A thesaurus is a tool for finding synonyms and antonyms, foreshadow is about hints of what will happen later in a story, and genre is the category of the text, none of which describe the clues you use to determine word meaning.

9. What is the main idea of a nonfiction passage?

A. The central point the author is making about the topic.

B. The most interesting detail in the passage.

C. The chronological sequence of events.

Identifying the central point the author is making about the topic is what you're aiming to do. In nonfiction, the whole passage is built around one main idea, and the facts, examples, and details are included to support that point. So the best choice is the one that describes the central point the author wants you to take away about the topic because it captures the overall purpose of the text. The most interesting detail, while it can stand out, is only one piece and doesn't represent the entire message. A chronological sequence shows how things happen, but it doesn't state the author's main claim. A favorite example is just an illustration used to explain a point, not the point itself. Keep in mind: think about what the passage is mainly about and what the author wants you to understand or believe after reading.

10. Which statement best describes how two informational texts relate when they discuss the same topic?

A. They have the same author.

B. They share a topic and present information about it; compare details across texts.

C. They use the same font.

When two informational texts discuss the same topic, they relate by sharing that topic and providing information about it, which lets you compare details across the texts to get a fuller picture. They don't have to be written by the same author, printed in the same font, or published in the same year—the link between the texts comes from what they say about the topic and the facts or explanations they each present. So you can look at how each text covers the topic, what facts are included, and how their details compare to deepen understanding.
