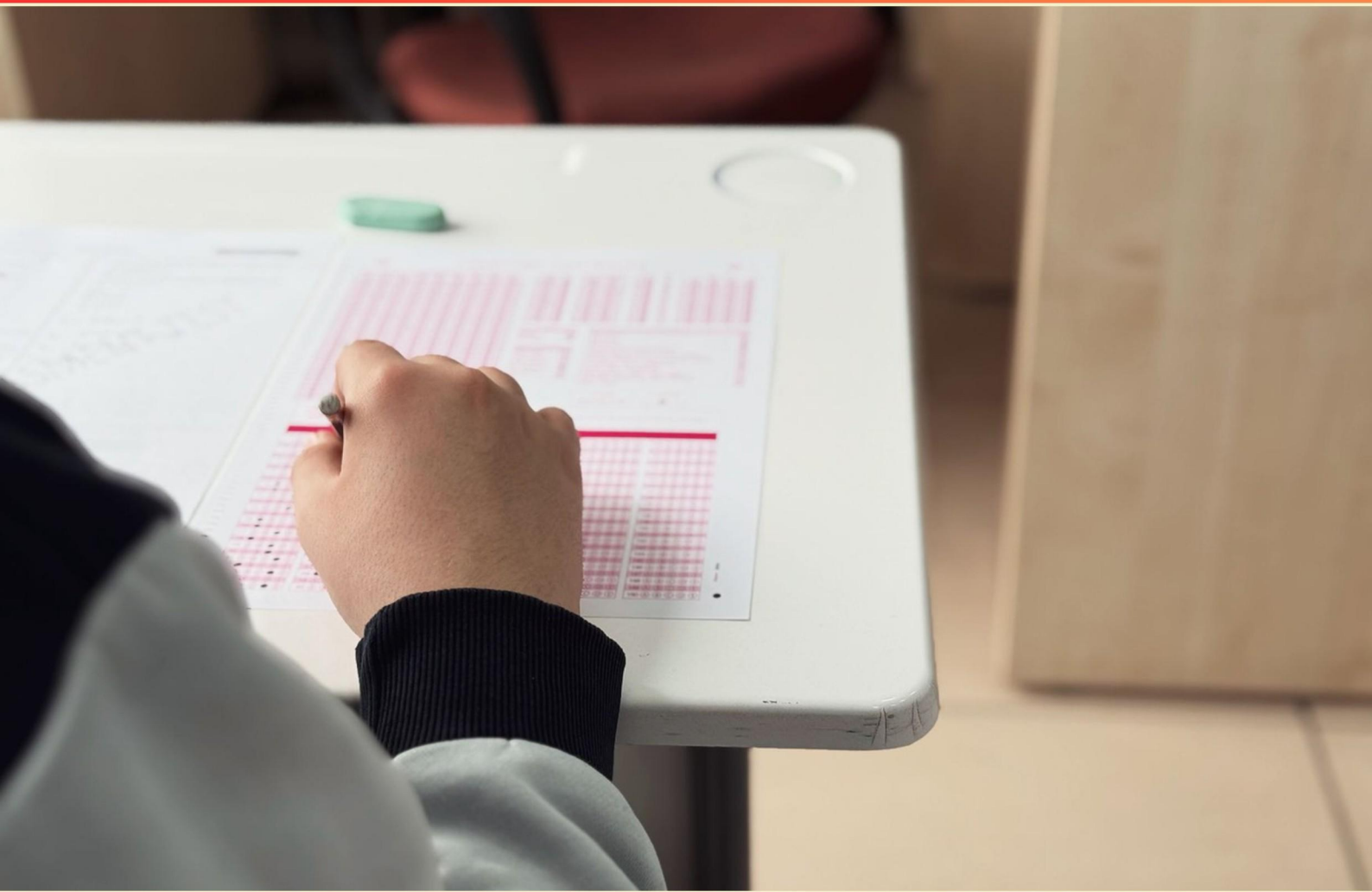

When comparing two passages, the key thing to notice is the authors' main ideas or purposes and how each text organizes evidence to support those ideas. This helps you see not only what the writers believe, but how they build their argument or present information, and where their emphasis lies. Pay attention to the thesis or main claim in each passage and the sequence of evidence—whether it uses reasons, examples, statistics, or anecdotes—and the structure that connects them, like a problem-and-solution layout, a cause-and-effect chain, or a compare-and-contrast frame. These differences reveal how the texts approach the topic and what stance they take. Details like page numbers or font size don't affect meaning, and publisher information doesn't illuminate the argument or structure.

Understanding plot structure, the high point of a story is the turning point where the central conflict reaches its peak and the outcome becomes clear. This moment, known as the climax, is when tension is at its strongest and the story shifts toward its resolution. Everything that comes before it—the buildup that creates suspense and complications—is the rising action. The exposition introduces the characters, setting, and situation at the start. After the climax, the falling action shows the results of the turning point and leads toward the ending. So, the climax fits the idea of the moment when the outcome starts to be revealed and the story moves toward its conclusion.

Rising action is the part of the plot where tension grows as challenges arise, stakes rise, and new complications push the story toward its turning point. This buildup is exactly about increasing suspense, so it fits the description in the question. The climax is the moment of greatest intensity, the high point of the tension, not the ongoing buildup. The resolution comes after the climax, winding down the story and solving the conflict. The stated theme is the underlying message or idea the story conveys, not a sequence of events that raise suspense. For example, in a mystery, each clue or obstacle that appears heightens pressure and keeps you eager to see what happens next—that ongoing push is the rising action.

Providing closure and reinforcing the main points is what a concluding summary does in an informational essay. After laying out facts and evidence, the ending wraps everything up in a concise restatement, reminding readers of the thesis and how the supporting details connect. This helps reinforce the big ideas and makes the overall message feel complete, leaving readers with a clear takeaway about what they've just learned. It can also hint at the significance or implications of the information. A closing summary shouldn't introduce new arguments or findings, and leaving it out would make the essay feel unfinished.

Theme is the message about life or human nature that unfolds as the story moves forward and characters respond to what happens. The best answer describes a recurring idea developed across events and characters, and it shows up through what people do, the conflicts they face, and motifs that keep appearing. This is how writers usually reveal theme: through actions, choices, consequences, and symbolic details, not just by the narrator telling us directly in every scene. Notes about the author or biographical details aren't what reveal the story's message, and how many main characters there are doesn't determine the theme. So you'll recognize the theme by watching how the plot and character experiences point to a larger idea about life or people, often reinforced by recurring images or patterns throughout the story.

The idea being tested is what we call the message a text conveys. The word theme refers to that central idea or lesson about life or human nature that the author wants readers to take away. When the message is stated outright in the text, it's still the theme because it's the core idea the work communicates, even if the author is being explicit about it. Other terms in the options point to parts of the plot or to how the story's problems are introduced, but they don't name the overall message the author is sharing. So the best fit for a directly stated message is the theme.

An implied theme is the underlying idea about life or human nature that the author suggests rather than states directly. You find it by reading how the story unfolds—the choices characters make, the events that occur, and the symbols or tone the author uses—and then interpreting what broader message those details point to. The theme in general can be stated or inferred, but this question calls for the idea that isn't spelled out, just hinted at. So the term that fits best is the implied theme. The other terms don't fit as well: a theme is the overall message (which may be stated or implied), the main idea is the central point of a passage, and the topic is simply what the text is about.

Tone is the writer's stance or attitude toward the subject or audience, shown through word choice, details, and how sentences are arranged. It can be serious, humorous, somber, sarcastic, hopeful, and more, shaping how you feel about the topic and what the writer wants you to think. For example, a piece about a school fundraiser might have a hopeful, encouraging tone that uses positive words like "together" and "achieve," while a critique of a policy might adopt a more critical or formal tone. The other terms describe different things: expository essay is a type of writing that explains information; dialect is a regional form of language; internal rhymes are rhymes inside a line of poetry.

Using textual evidence means pulling exact words or a concise restatement from the text to back up your analysis. It anchors your ideas in what the author actually wrote, showing clearly where your interpretation comes from. When you use evidence, pick parts that directly support the point you're making about theme, character, mood, or meaning. You can quote verbatim, with quotation marks and a signal that ties the quote to your point, or you can paraphrase the idea in your own words while still naming where it comes from. Either way, you should explain how the evidence supports your claim, not just drop in lines or ideas without connection. Personal opinions or beliefs aren't textual evidence because they come from you, not the text. Paraphrasing is allowed, and it's helpful to show you understand the material, not just lift phrases from it. And textual evidence isn't optional in analysis—grounding your argument in specific parts of the text makes your interpretation stronger and more credible.

Contrast helps develop meaning in a text by making differences visible that illuminate themes and character motivations. When an author puts opposing ideas or characters beside each other, readers are prompted to compare them—how they think, act, and respond—which highlights values, consequences, and what the story is trying to say. For example, showing a cautious character next to a bold one helps readers see how prudence and risk shape outcomes and what the work suggests about balance or responsibility. The other ideas aren't as effective here: aligning similar ideas emphasizes sameness rather than difference, longer sentences change rhythm rather than meaning through contrast, and hiding the main idea behind vague terms makes meaning harder to grasp.
