This requirement is in place to ensure that these medications are prescribed only when deemed medically appropriate, contributing to responsible prescribing practices and better patient outcomes. In contrast, not all prescriptions require a diagnosis code, as many non-controlled medications can be dispensed without this additional information. Consequently, stating that all prescriptions or only certain categories (such as only those under Medicare Part A) require such a code would be incorrect. Hence, the focus on Medicare Part B and all controlled substance prescriptions is key to understanding these regulations.
