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## **Explanations**

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**1. Describe the role of vibrato in string performance and how it is controlled.**

- A. Vibrato is used to adjust tempo.
- B. Vibrato changes pitch in a fixed manner.
- C. Vibrato adds warmth and color through controlled oscillation of pitch; controlled by finger pressure, speed, and width.**

*Vibrato on string instruments adds warmth and color to a sustained note by making the pitch wiggle gently around the written pitch. This oscillation is produced by rocking the left-hand finger on the string while keeping contact, which changes the string tension just enough to raise and lower the pitch in a controlled way. The speed of the wobble is how quickly those pitch changes occur and shapes the character of the vibrato. The width is how far the pitch moves from the central pitch, which determines how wide the tonal color feels. Finger pressure influences how easily the finger can drive that motion and how pronounced the pitch excursion becomes. The central pitch stays anchored, so the note remains on pitch even as its color shifts. Vibrato serves expressive purposes, helping the tone blend with ensemble sound and conveying musical emotion; it is not used to set tempo or to dampen the sound.*

*Pitch stability on a bowed string instrument depends on factors that affect string tension, instrument setup, and how the ensemble coordinates intonation. Temperature and humidity change wood dimensions and string tension, so tuning can drift when the environment shifts. Instrument condition matters because worn or slipping components—pegs, nut slots, a loose bridge, or a shifted soundpost—allow pitch to wander. Ensemble tuning and bowing matter because everyone must reference the same pitch and bowing can subtly influence intonation if technique isn't consistent. The instrument case color doesn't influence any of these physical factors, so it has no effect on pitch stability.*

While Beethoven sits at the transition between Classical and Romantic styles, this symphony has become a universal staple in concert repertoires around the world, played from student halls to major venues year after year. Its unforgettable four-note motif, dramatic energy, and bold growth of scale embody the expressive drive that defines Romantic orchestral music, even as the piece belongs to that early transitional period. That enduring familiarity and frequency in programming is why it's considered the best example here. The other pieces are firmly Romantic and commonly performed, but the Fifth's widespread recognition makes it the most representative standard for study and discussion.*

*A slur over notes on a string instrument tells you to connect those notes with a single bow stroke, producing a smooth, legato line. In practice, you keep the bow moving through the whole group without rearticulating each note, shaping the phrase for a continuous, singing line. It's not about tempo changes, which are indicated elsewhere, and it isn't telling you to play staccato or detach the notes—the slur specifically asks for a seamless bow stroke across the notes under it. If you hear the line musically as one connected idea, that's the slur doing its job: guiding the bowing to match the intended smoothness and phrasing.*

#### 5. What is col legno and which family uses it?

*Col legno is a technique where the musician uses the wood of the bow to strike the strings, instead of the bow hair. This produces a distinctive, percussive timbre that adds a dry, "colorful" color to the music, and it's a tool primarily used by the string family to achieve a special effect. The method belongs to string players because it relies on drawing or striking the strings with the bow itself, not on brass or other families. Other choices mix up different ideas—pizzicato is plucking with fingers, and there isn't a standard technique called "play with the opposite bow hair," while "bowing near the frog" isn't what col legno refers to.*

*Hairpin dynamics are all about shaping the loudness of a musical line. When a hairpin opens wider, it indicates a gradual increase in volume—a crescendo—across the passage. When it narrows to a point, it signals a gradual decrease in volume—a decrescendo (or diminuendo). This dynamic contour lets the music grow or recede in intensity, adding expressiveness and helping create tension, release, and contrast within the texture. It's not about changing tempo, articulation, or pitch bend, which are indicated by separate kinds of marks.*

*Cadences often hinge on the dominant and the cadential six-four figure. When the tonic triad is in second inversion, the bass stays on the same note as the dominant, and the upper voices form a perfect fourth above that bass (along with a sixth as part of the six-four sonority). This four-above-the-bass creates a brief tension that drives the progression toward the dominant and then to the tonic, giving that unmistakable cadential release. That built-in perfect fourth above the bass is what characterizes cadential progressions, making it the best answer. The other intervals don't capture this common cadence tension and resolution pattern.*

## 8. What does sforzando indicate?

*Sforzando signals a sudden, strong accent on a note or chord. It tells you to attack the sound with immediate emphasis, often written as sf or sfz. This is an abrupt emphasis at the onset, not a gradual change, not a softening, and not a repeated note. In practice, imagine a sharp burst of emphasis right at the moment you play the note, sometimes followed by a quick drop back to the surrounding dynamic.*

## 9. Which instrument is a transposing instrument in B-flat and sounds a whole step lower than written?

*Transposing in B-flat means the instrument sounds a whole step lower than what is written, so musicians read notes a whole step higher than the concert pitch. The B-flat clarinet fits this exactly: when it plays a written C, it sounds a B-flat. That's why it's the instrument described. The clarinet in A transposes as well, but by a minor third, not a whole step. The trumpet in C sounds as written, so it isn't a transposing instrument in B-flat. The bassoon is pitched in F and has a different transposition, not a whole-step relationship in B-flat.*

*Polacca indicates a piece in polonaise style, a Polish dance that is typically written in triple meter. This style is marked by a dignified, ceremonial character and a rhythmic feel that emphasizes the strong first beat of each measure, often with a stately, processional quality. So the intended description is a composition in polonaise style, usually in 3/4 time, rather than a generic solo piece or a fugue.*
