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Explanations

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1. In Confirmation, what is the rite that completes the sacramental action?

- A. Water is poured on the person

Confirmation completes Baptism by strengthening the grace of the Holy Spirit. The moment that finishes the sacramental action is the anointing of the forehead with sacred chrism, accompanied by the words, "Be sealed with the gift of the Holy Spirit." The chrism, a consecrated oil, symbolizes being sealed by the Spirit for the apostolic mission in the Church, marking the person as a fully initiated, mature member who can witness to Christ. Water is associated with Baptism, not Confirmation; the other actions can be part of the rite or its prayers, but they do not complete the sacrament the way the chrism anointing does.

2. How many Beatitudes are listed?

Beatitudes are Jesus' blessings pronounced at the start of the Sermon on the Mount. In the Gospel of Matthew, there are eight of these blessings: Blessed are the poor in spirit; those who mourn; the meek; those who hunger and thirst for righteousness; the merciful; the pure in heart; the peacemakers; and those who are persecuted for righteousness' sake. Luke records a shorter version with four blessings. Because the standard listing in Matthew contains eight, eight is the correct count. The other options don't match the Matthew account (and Luke's four is a different, shorter list), so the eight-fold Beatitude is the commonly accepted total.

Liturgical symbols in RCIA communicate essential faith truths and mark the person's entry into the life of the Church. Water signifies cleansing from sin and rebirth in Christ, signaling initiation into the faith community. Oil used for anointing and the sacred chrism symbolize being chosen, strengthened by the Spirit, and sealed with the Spirit for the mission of the Church. The white garment represents putting on a new self in Christ and living a life of purity and conversion. The candle stands for Christ the light of the world, calling the believer to walk in that light and witness the Gospel. These are not decorative; they carry meaning and guide participation in the rites of initiation, occurring at appropriate moments as the person enters the Church, not only at the Easter Vigil.

In other words, the rite is effective because of what Christ established through the Church, regardless of the holiness or personal state of the minister or the recipient. That doesn't mean the recipient's interior life has no effect; it means the grace exists and is offered by the sacrament itself. Proper disposition, on the other hand, refers to the recipient's interior readiness—faith, repentance, openness to grace, and cooperation with what the sacrament offers. This disposition influences how fully that grace bears fruit in the person's life. So, the grace is conferred by the valid sacrament, but how fully it sanctifies or transforms a person depends on their receptivity. That's why the correct statement is that ex opere operato concerns the validity and power of the sacramental action itself, while proper disposition concerns the recipient's interior readiness and faith. The other ideas either overstate the guarantee of grace regardless of disposition, claim disposition is irrelevant, or say the two concepts are the same, which they are not.

Baptism is ordinarily administered by a priest. This reflects the priest's role as the normal liturgical minister who presides over the church's rites and has the authority to confer baptism within the ordinary life of the local church. The celebrant pours water (or immerses) while proclaiming the sacramental words, and the priest's participation ensures the rite is carried out with the proper form, intention, and unity with the Church. A deacon can also perform baptisms, and bishops share in this ministry, but in the usual parish setting the priest is the standard administrator. In emergencies, a layperson may baptize if they have the proper intention and use the correct form, which shows the sacrament's urgency and accessibility when life is at stake.

In this sacrament, the form is the exact words spoken by the priest that confer the grace of forgiveness. These words are what makes the forgiveness truly present, given by Christ through the Church's ministry. The other phrases aren't the form of this sacrament. The dismissal, "Go in peace," comes after the absolution and is not the act that forgives. The phrase "This is my body" is part of the Eucharist, not confession. The idea that forgiveness comes by faith alone isn't how the sacramental grace of absolution operates in Catholic teaching—the grace is conferred through the sacramental rite itself, with faith accompanying it.

The water's meaning goes beyond a simple wash or physical purification; it conveys both spiritual renewal and belonging to the community of believers. The other ideas—water as a fountain of youth, a merely symbolic splash, or water as physical purification only—don't capture the fullness of what baptism confers: forgiveness of sins, new life in grace, and full inclusion in the Church.

A sacrament is an outward sign instituted by Christ to give grace. Saying a sacrament is a sign and a means of intimate connection with Christ captures this: it describes both the visible sign and the grace it accomplishes. The other descriptions reduce the sacraments to memory or empty actions, which misses the central reality that grace is actually conferred through Christ's institution and the Church's administration.

At each stage there are rites that publicly mark progress toward baptism and full communion, guiding the person as they prepare to enter the Church. It's not limited to baptism alone, nor is it only for children; the process is specifically designed for adults and others seeking full membership in the Catholic Church. This combination of teaching, prayer, liturgical rites, and preparation for full communion best describes the overall RCIA process.

The priest blesses the elect and formally sends them to the bishop to participate in the diocesan Rite of Election. This action unites the elect with the Church universal and signals that the diocesan community, through the bishop, is recognizing them as ready to be initiated. This step culminates in their entry into the official process at the diocesan level, where the bishop reinforces their readiness and their place within the Body of Christ. It emphasizes mission and community because initiation is not just a private journey with one parish; it is a communal call to belong to the Church across the diocese and to participate in the mission of proclaiming the Gospel. So the best choice is that they are blessed and sent from the parish to the bishop and into the diocesan Rite of Election, emphasizing mission and community.
