The availability of public transportation improves accessibility but does not directly create new business investments. Lastly, while a local newspaper giving away a free edition could boost readership and community engagement, it does not directly invoke the economic principles of the multiplier effect in the context of generating additional business opportunities or investment. Therefore, the first choice clearly exemplifies how the multiplier effect operates within the economic landscape of a large city.
