In contrast with the other options: "truly" would suggest a strong affirmation of the statement that follows, "hardly" would imply that the matter is insignificant, and "definitely" would tend to suggest certainty and insistence about the matter, which does not align with the overall tone intended in the original sentence.

For example, "did pass" implies the opposite situation, while "haven't passed" suggests a present perfect tense that does not fit the context, as it lacks the necessary reference to a completed past event. Similarly, "won't have passed" mixes future and past tenses inappropriately, which would not work in this context. Thus, "didn't pass" is the only option that correctly preserves the intended meaning of the sentence.

The context of the question likely centers on the purpose of the letters, which is communication, achieved through mailing. Thus, taking them to the post office is the most logical and appropriate action in this situation.

The choice of "sensible" as the adjective to describe Sam's character suggests that he is practical, reasonable, and wise in his decisions and actions. It conveys that he thinks carefully before he acts, ensuring that his choices are sound and well-considered. This quality often imbues a sense of trustworthiness and reliability, which can be important traits in various situations, such as in personal relationships or professional settings. While "carefree" might indicate someone who is lighthearted and untroubled, it does not capture the idea of being thoughtful or cautious. Similarly, "reckless" implies a lack of consideration for the consequences of one's actions, highlighting a more impulsive approach, which contrasts directly with the notion of sensibility. "Confident," while suggesting self-assurance, does not inherently convey the practical decision-making aspect associated with being sensible. Therefore, "sensible" not only accurately describes a character trait that emphasizes reason and thoughtfulness but also aligns best with the context of being a reliable and grounded individual.

9. How does the girl express her feelings about the school trip?

The girl expresses her feelings about the school trip by stating that it was boring. This choice indicates that her experience was not engaging or interesting, which directly conveys a negative perspective on the trip. When someone describes an experience as boring, it reflects a lack of stimulation or excitement, suggesting that the activities did not hold her attention or provide enjoyment. In contrast, the other responses suggest positive or neutral feelings about the trip. Saying it was enjoyable or fascinating indicates that she found the trip pleasant or intriguing, while describing it as tiring implies exhaustion but could still suggest that the trip had worthwhile moments. Therefore, the choice of "boring" succinctly captures her dissatisfaction and disinterest in the school trip, making it the correct expression of her feelings.

10. What feeling does the man express by stating he did not intend to win the race: "I did it for ____."?

The man conveys a sense of personal motivation and value in his statement. By saying he did it for "the exercise," he indicates that his primary focus was on the act of running itself, which suggests a desire for physical activity and health improvement rather than for the sake of winning or competing against others. This implies a broader enjoyment of physical exercise as a rewarding experience in its own right, rather than merely a means to an end or an outcome. The other options, unlike "the exercise," focus more on different motivations that may imply a competitive or challenge-driven mindset. Selecting "the exercise" emphasizes a personal journey that prioritizes well-being and fitness, which aligns with a mindset that values the act rather than the accolades.
