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Explanations

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1. Which term denotes the main body of a book or other writing?

The main idea here is identifying the term for the actual written material inside a book. The main body is the text—the sequence of words that convey the story or information, including all sentences, paragraphs, and dialogue. That is what you read, analyze, and quote. Organize refers to how ideas are arranged and presented. So the best description for an unbiased, unemotional writer is objective tone.

This differs from a hypothesis, which is a testable prediction often used in scientific experiments rather than the overarching argument of an essay. It differs from a conclusion, which is the result you reach after analyzing evidence. It also differs from an observation, a factual detail you notice or record, not the claim you're trying to prove. So, the best definition is that the central claim is the thesis—the main, defensible claim the paper is written to establish.

Developing and detailing an idea requires putting it into precise, organized terms that lay out the plan, components, and steps. That is what formulate captures: to craft and express an idea in a detailed, structured way so it's clear how it will work or be carried out. It's more than just describing or explaining; it's shaping the concept into a concrete, ready-to-use plan or statement. Explain is about making something clear, not necessarily building out every part. Interpret is about finding meaning or translating content. Integrate means combining parts into a whole. Formulate best fits the notion of creating a detailed, explicit expression of an idea.

Understanding text structure helps you follow the argument or story more easily and see how the writer builds meaning. Text describes the piece as a whole, not its organization. Theme is about the central idea or message the author conveys, not how the writing is arranged. Trace isn't the standard term for organizing a written work; it more often implies a path of evidence or the movement of ideas, rather than the overall structure.

Connotation shapes tone. The emotional associations a word carries beyond its dictionary meaning color the writer's attitude toward the subject or reader. For example, a word with a negative connotation can make the tone feel judgmental, while a more neutral or positive word can soften or brighten the tone, even when the factual meaning is similar. The other options aren't about emotional coloring: length is about sentence size, grammar is about rules and structure, and audience is the readers you're addressing. The direct link to how a word's feeling is conveyed is through tone.

Anticipating future outcomes based on evidence and patterns is what this item tests. When you predict what's likely to happen next, you're forecasting future events using clues from the current situation or data. Describing focuses on detailing what has happened or what exists now, not what will occur. Inferring involves drawing a conclusion from evidence, which can pertain to the past or present and isn't specifically about the next event. Measuring is about quantifying or counting something, not guessing future occurrences. So predicting best captures the idea of forecasting what will happen next.

The key idea here is finding a word that means information directly relates to and helps with the topic being discussed. Relevant describes something that directly informs the matter at hand and is useful for addressing the question or argument. Tangential indicates something only loosely related and often veers away from the main point. Peripheral means not central to the issue, more on the edge of what's important. Irrelevant means not related at all and not helpful. So, for a discussion about reducing energy use in buildings, details about insulation materials are relevant because they directly impact energy efficiency, while a side note about aesthetics might be tangential or peripheral, and a fact about the weather in a distant city could be irrelevant depending on the focus.
