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## **Explanations**

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### 1. Which is a recommended approach for geriatric dogs?

With geriatric dogs, the priority is comfort and safety to protect joints and balance. Extra bedding provides soft support for joints and helps with warmth during rest, which can reduce stiffness and pain. Non-skid floors minimize slipping and falls, especially when getting up or lying down, protecting fragile joints and boosting confidence in movement. Pushing for high-intensity exercise, making them climb stairs all day, or skipping rest periods can increase discomfort and risk of injury, so a gentle routine with a comfy, slip-free environment supports their quality of life.

The key safety idea is to have one trained person handle all medication administration. When a single staff member is responsible for dosing, timing, and recording every dose, there's a clear point of accountability and a consistent routine. This reduces the chance of giving the wrong amount or missing a dose because there's a standardized process everyone follows. That person should be trained on the facility's medication policies and use checks like the right patient, right drug, right dose, right route, and right time. They verify the order, confirm the label and expiration, prepare the medication accurately, and document each administration in a medication record. In some cases, additional checks may be used for high-risk meds, but the core idea remains: consistency and traceability by designating a single med administrator. Why the other options aren't as effective: allowing any staff member to administer meds can lead to inconsistent practices and missed or wrong doses; relying on the owner isn't practical in a facility setting; and having a veterinarian administer all doses isn't feasible for routine care and timing, even though veterinarians oversee treatment.

Lifespan is strongly influenced by size: small dogs often live longer than large ones. When you average across all dogs, a commonly cited range around 12 to 14 years best represents the overall picture, because it balances the longer lifespans seen in smaller breeds with the shorter ones more common in larger breeds. While some individual dogs—especially small breeds or those in excellent health—may reach into the mid to high teens or even higher, and a few exceptionally healthy individuals may live into their twenties, these are not the typical experience for most dogs.

Recognizing signs of stress and using calming signals to show you aren't a threat is the foundation of safe handling. When a dog is uncertain or stressed, it's important to slow down, give space, and communicate non-threat through calm body language. Calming signals include turning your body to the side rather than facing the dog head-on, keeping a relaxed posture, soft eyes with slow blinking, and a gentle, quiet voice. These cues help lower arousal and invite the dog to approach or accept handling on its own terms. This approach contrasts with actions that escalate stress, such as speaking loudly, forcing contact, or pulling the dog toward you. Those behaviors can trigger defensive responses and increase the risk of a bite or escape. Isolating the dog in a crate right away might remove immediate contact but does not address the underlying stress and can create fear or resentment. By reading stress cues and applying calming signals, you communicate safety and respect, making handling safer for both the dog and the handler.

When caring for a disabled dog, the space they live in should support safe movement and comfortable rest. The best approach is a roomy enclosure with level floors and non-skid flooring. That setup provides enough room to turn and reposition, reduces the risk of slips or falls, and makes it easier to assist with transfers or use mobility aids. A smooth, tractionful surface helps the dog grip during standing or walking and protects joints from unexpected slips, which is especially important for dogs with arthritis, spinal injuries, or post-surgical needs. Small, confining crates restrict movement and can cause discomfort and stiffness, making it harder for the dog to change positions or be safely assisted. On the other hand, assuming minimal handling to avoid strain isn't ideal because safe handling and gentle assistance are essential for transfers, positioning, and daily care to prevent further strain or injury. Regarding incontinence, managing it involves appropriate care planning and routines rather than expressing it as a housing or mobility strategy; focus on regular bathroom breaks and suitable containment or aids as part of overall care.

Hydrogen peroxide is not recommended for cleaning a fresh wound because it can damage healthy tissue. When applied, it releases reactive oxygen species that are cytotoxic to the cells essential for healing, like fibroblasts and keratinocytes. This can slow the healing process and even delay wound closure, especially in a new, uncontaminated wound. In contrast, washing with warm water or sterile saline is gentle and effective at physically clearing debris without harming healing tissue. After cleaning, applying a thin layer of antibiotic ointment (if indicated) helps prevent infection and keeps the area moist, which supports healing. Covering the wound with sterile gauze protects it from further contamination and provides a stable environment for repair. So the best practice for cleaning a fresh wound is to use mild irrigation with water or saline, avoid hydrogen peroxide, and then proceed with appropriate dressing and topical care as needed.

This extra material is often accompanied by other symptoms like odor, redness, or irritation, and may cause the dog to shake its head or scratch at the ear. In contrast, a clean ear canal without odor, normal hearing sensitivity, and no flaking or itching all point toward healthy ears. Those signs suggest there isn't an active problem in the ear canal. If you observe excess wax or discharge, it's wise to have the dog examined by a veterinarian to determine the cause and appropriate treatment.

If your dog is large, dropping the leash is safer for you and helps to avoid being dragged into the fight; it allows you to create distance and use barriers or distractions to separate the dogs without pulling or throwing yourself into the confrontation. Avoid trying to grab or lift a large dog, which can put you at serious risk of injury. Also, don't reach between dogs or attempt to pry them apart with your hands; seek space, call for help, and use indirect separation methods like barriers, a spray bottle, or a blanket while you intervene.

Most adult dogs are fed two meals daily. This regular, two-meal schedule helps keep energy levels even and supports smooth digestion, avoiding the stress of a very large single meal. Puppies, with faster growth and smaller stomachs, often need three meals a day to meet their higher energy needs. A single meal a day can create long fasting periods and large post-meal loads that aren't ideal for most adults, while four meals a day is usually unnecessary unless a dog has specific medical or dietary requirements.

The main idea is to use a gentle, localized restraint that reduces movement without increasing stress. For many small dogs, rolling a towel around the head and neck provides steady, controlled stabilization of the head and neck during procedures. This helps prevent sudden head turns, gaze shifts, or mashing against the procedure area, which can make the process safer for both the dog and the handler. Because the head is a primary source of movement during many exams or treatments, keeping it still minimizes the chance of sudden jerks and allows the clinician to work more precisely, while the dog often feels secure with a snug, supportive wrap. Compared with full-body towel restraint, this approach is less invasive and less intimidating, reducing overall anxiety and making it easier to monitor breathing and comfort. Ignoring the dog's stress or using a loud command tends to heighten fear and resistance, which can increase struggle and risk of injury. If you use this head-and-neck restraint, ensure it's snug but not tight enough to restrict breathing, and remove it if the dog shows signs of distress.
