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Explanations

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1. What is Lorne Michaels's famous quote?

- A. The show doesn't go on because it's ready, the show goes on because it's 11:30
- B. The show goes on because it's time

The concept being tested is recognizing a famous line tied to live TV production and the discipline of sticking to a broadcast schedule. Lorne Michaels' line captures the idea that a show must proceed at its scheduled time, regardless of whether everything is perfectly ready. This is why the correct choice is the familiar quote that says the show doesn't go on because it's ready, but goes on because it's 11:30. It ties the start time of the live broadcast (11:30) to the decision to proceed, illustrating the mindset of delivering the show on the scheduled window even if perfection isn't achieved. The other options don't fit because they reference different motivations or timings (time in general, crowd noise, or the idea of "showtime") that aren't the specific sentiment associated with this famous line. The phrase emphasizes punctuality and perseverance tied to a fixed broadcast time rather than a general notion of timing or audience cues.

Wrap day marks completion and teardown. It is the point when filming is finished for the project, and the crew begins winding down: sets are struck, locations are cleared, equipment is packed and returned, and final paperwork and wrap reports are completed. This day signals the move from production to the post-production phase, though the actual editing and post work typically begin after shooting has ended. Auditions happen earlier in pre-production, and the start of filming is the opposite of wrap day.

Prop management and studio workflow during off-hours is what this question hinges on. Saturday Night Live is produced in Studio 8H on Saturdays, which means there's a need for a large, accessible space to store a vast and ever-changing collection of props and set pieces. Studio 6B serves as that dedicated prop storage area on weekends, keeping the main stage clear and ready for quick sketch setup and teardown. This arrangement supports the fast-paced, prop-heavy nature of SNL's weekend production. The other shows use different studio setups and schedules, so they aren't typically associated with weekend prop storage in Studio 6B.

Leading a writers' room on a sketch show means shaping what gets written, deciding which sketches fit the episode, and guiding the tone and direction of the humor. Seth Meyers held the head writer role on Saturday Night Live, where he oversaw the writing staff and helped craft material for the sketches and Weekend Update. That leadership position on SNL was a key step that led to him becoming the host of Late Night on NBC. The other programs listed aren't the ones where he served as head writer.

5. How many employees is the SNL crew made up of?

This question tests understanding of how large a TV show's production workforce can be. Saturday Night Live functions as a week-to-week live production with many moving parts, so it relies on a broad network of people across numerous departments—writers, producers, directors, stage crew, lighting and sound technicians, makeup and wardrobe, props, special effects, camera operators, editors, and backstage staff. When you add interns and the broader Rockefeller Center production support, the total staffing is around the scale of a thousand people. That size makes sense for handling multiple sets, live musical performances, rapid sketch turnover, and post-production tasks that support airings each week. The other numbers don't fit the scope of what's needed to run the show weekly: 500 would be too small to cover all essential roles, while figures like 2,000 or 5,000 exceed typical staffing for a single ongoing live program.

6. The skyline behind Jimmy's desk is built from which materials?

The main idea here is that the skyline behind Jimmy's desk is described as handmade wooden pieces, specifically cherry, mahogany, and maple. This signals a crafted, warm, natural aesthetic, built from real wood with visible grain and color variety. The word handmade emphasizes artisanal work and attention to detail, which fits a setting that prioritizes a classic, inviting look. Why this fits best: cherry, mahogany, and maple are hardwoods known for beauty and durability, giving rich tones and distinct grain patterns that a handcrafted skyline would showcase. It contrasts with more industrial or utilitarian materials, like steel and glass panels (sleek and modern), concrete (cold and austere), or shellac-coated plywood (less natural and premium in feel). So the description of handmade wooden pieces conveys the intended atmosphere and material quality.

7. What is Studio 6B used for on weekends?

A. Storage for props for Saturday Night Live

B. Guest dressing area

On weekends, the space is used for storing props for Saturday Night Live. This works well because a prop-heavy show generates a huge inventory of costumes, set pieces, and prop items that need to be organized and kept secure between rehearsals and episodes. Having a dedicated storage area near the main stage keeps the main studio uncluttered and ensures quick access when the next show or rehearsal begins. Guest dressing area would require private dressing rooms and makeup areas, which are specialized spaces and not typically repurposed as general storage on weekends. A short film shoot location implies active filming with crews, lights, and camera setups, which isn't the usual weekend use for a dedicated prop storage space. Audience seating is tied to live performances, not to off-hours storage needs.

Using a song in a broadcast episode requires both synchronization rights and public performance rights. The synchronization right lets you pair the musical composition with the visual content, so you can place the song to match scenes and timing in the episode. The public performance right lets the broadcaster transmit the music to viewers, covering the actual airing of the song during the show. Public performance rights are typically handled through performing rights organizations. Mechanical rights, which cover reproducing the work on physical media or standalone audio releases, aren't needed just to air the episode, though they would come into play if you later release an audio-only soundtrack or similar product. So, both synchronization and public performance rights are needed for a broadcast episode.

9. Which statement correctly differentiates a shoot day from a wrap day?

The difference being tested is when filming happens versus when the production finishes filming and winds down. A shoot day is when filming occurs—cameras roll, actors perform, and the crew handles lighting, sound, and other on-set work. Wrap day marks completion of principal photography and the teardown process—the crew clears sets, packs equipment, and wraps up daily documentation. This is distinct from tasks that happen before filming, like buying equipment, or from activities that occur after filming begins, like writing the script or starting post-production, which happen earlier or later in the pipeline.

10. Which host had hosting years 1992-2009?

- A. David Letterman
- B. Conan O'Brien**

Conan O'Brien fits this window because he took over Late Night with Conan O'Brien in 1993 and remained as host until 2009. That running span covers the late 1990s up through 2009, which aligns with the given timeframe. Other hosts built their long-running hosting careers either earlier or later: David Letterman's Late Night tenure ended in 1993 (and he later hosted The Late Show), while Jimmy Fallon and Seth Meyers began hosting in the 2010s. So the person whose hosting years line up with 1992–2009 is Conan O'Brien.
