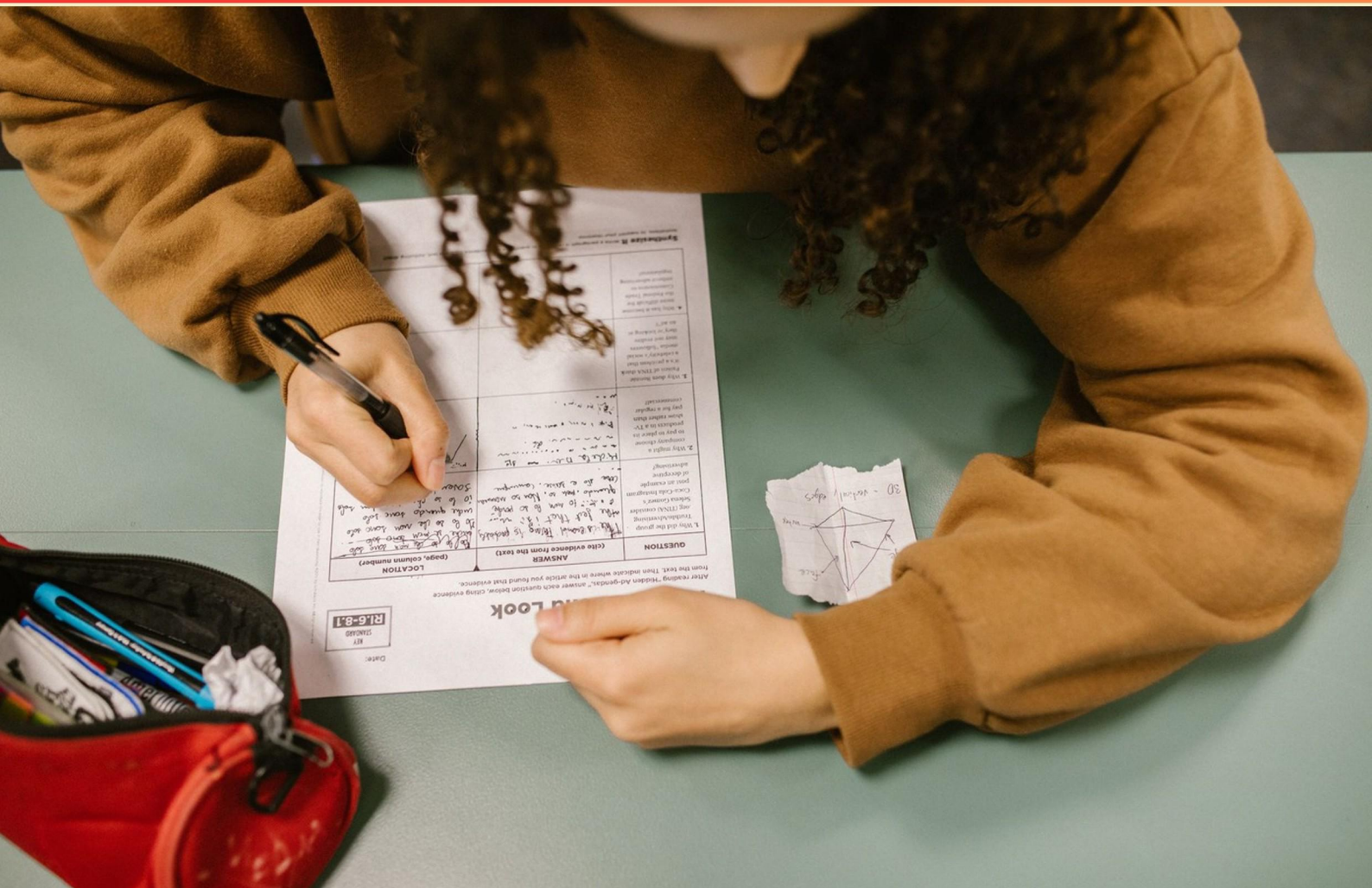

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Explanations

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1. During the approach, what did Peak and his companions do besides hiking?

- A. They cooked meals together in the truck.
- B. They slept the entire day.
- C. They listened to loud music.

During the approach, the emphasis is on building relationships as the group moves toward their destination. Peak and the others use that time to talk and get to know each other, sharing stories, backgrounds, and motivations. This conversation helps build trust and camaraderie, which is essential for working together on a demanding climb. The other activities listed don't fit the scene the author sets for this part of the journey, where bonding and learning about one another take center stage.

2. How did Peak's mother get injured?

The other scenarios don't fit because they describe different situations: a kitchen slip on a banana peel would imply a minor accident, a car crash is a different incident altogether, and an ankle injury while hiking would point to a different activity and injury pattern.

3. At the climax, how close is Peak to the summit?

Climax is about the moment when the character is almost at the highest point and the tension about finishing is at its peak. That tiny distance heightens suspense because the finish is within reach, making the climactic push feel urgent and decisive. If Peak were at the summit, the climb would already be completed, which moves past the peak moment; being 100 feet away suggests a longer, less immediate struggle; not near the summit would understate how close the peak moment is. So the best fit is that Peak is about 10 feet from the summit.

Man vs. Society shows when a character's actions directly test or oppose the rules, laws, or expectations of the broader community. In this story, Peak climbs without the proper authorization, ignoring the official permits and safety norms that regulate who can climb and under what conditions. That choice pits him against the social order—the authorities, institutions, and shared rules that govern climbing—creating tension centered on breaking those rules rather than just fighting another individual or dealing with a personal misunderstanding. The struggle is about a single person challenging the way society enforces its rules. The other scenarios involve conflicts with specific people or a personal miscommunication, which are more about interpersonal issues or minor disputes than a direct challenge to the larger social system.

5. Describe the third step.

Understanding how the steps unfold during Peak's climb. The third step is described as the easiest for Peak, and when they reach the top they see another corpse that looks fresh. This pairing of a smoother, more confident ascent with the surprising, new danger at the summit fits a natural progression in the ascent: after earlier tougher moves, Peak's pace eases, and the moment at the top is charged by the sight of a recently fallen climber. The detail that the corpse looks fresh signals a recent tragedy, heightening the stakes of the climb. Other possibilities would describe a descent or a hazardous ridge maneuver, which don't match the idea of an easy up-and-top moment paired with a fresh corpse.

6. Which sequence of cities did Peak's father plan to pass through before Everest?

The main idea is that Everest is in Nepal, and Kathmandu is the typical gateway to the Everest region. If you're traveling from Bangkok, a sensible route would take you north to Chiang Mai, then onward to Kathmandu before heading to Everest. So the sequence Chiang Mai, then Kathmandu, then Everest fits a plausible travel path to reach the Everest area. Choosing Kathmandu before Chiang Mai would imply going to Nepal before visiting Chiang Mai, which isn't the standard way people describe a route to Everest starting from Bangkok. Including Bangkok or Lhasa introduces a less direct or less common path to access the Everest region, whereas Kathmandu serves as the main hub before approaching Everest.

7. Which word describes someone who is guilty of betrayal or deception, or something that is dangerous or harmful?

- A. Mangled

This word captures both ideas: someone who betrays or deceives, and something that is dangerous or harmful. When you call a person treacherous, you're saying they're untrustworthy and capable of betrayal. It also broadens to describe risks that aren't obvious at first—like a treacherous road that looks fine but hides danger, or a treacherous plan that could backfire. That -meaning makes it the best fit for both parts of the prompt. Mangled describes severe physical damage, not betrayal or danger in the sense of risk. In Absentia means in the absence, which doesn't relate to deceit or danger. Ausocious isn't a standard English word, so it wouldn't correctly convey the intended idea.

8. Which term refers to the state or process of being deprived of oxygen, potentially causing unconsciousness or death?

The main concept here is oxygen deprivation and its serious consequences. Asphyxiation is the state or process of being deprived of oxygen, which can quickly lead to unconsciousness or death if breathing isn't restored. Think of scenarios like choking, smothering, or exposure to gases that displace oxygen—these illustrate how a lack of oxygen harms the body. The other terms don't fit because they refer to something entirely different: a proprietor is a business owner, the larynx is the voice box in the throat, and scrutinized means examined closely.

9. Which term refers to a soothing ointment used for the skin?

- A. Salve**
- B. Wherewithal
- C. Elicited
- D. Cinched

A soothing ointment for the skin is called a salve. A salve is a medicated, greasy preparation designed to protect and ease irritation, helping the skin to heal. The other words don't relate to skin care: wherewithal means resources or means, elicited means drew out, and cinched means tightened. So in a question about a soothing skin ointment, salve is the best fit because of its established usage in skincare and medical contexts.

10. Which term denotes an extremely small amount and is the ninth letter of the Greek alphabet?

A. Iota

B. In Absentia

C. Ausocious

D. Treacherous

*An extremely small amount is captured by the word **iota**, as in the phrase "not one **iota**." That same word is also the ninth letter of the Greek alphabet—alpha, beta, gamma, delta, epsilon, zeta, eta, theta, **iota**. This combination of meaning and position is why it's the best fit for the clue. The Latin phrase *in absentia* means "in the absence," not a tiny quantity, and the other options aren't standard words with the tiny-quantity sense or Greek-letter identity. So **iota** satisfies both parts of the clue.*
