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Explanations

The important idea here is how graduate admissions distinguish among applicants who all meet the basic requirements. This demonstrates not just knowledge, but hands-on experience with designing studies, analyzing data, communicating results, and sustaining a project to completion—capabilities that are central to success in graduate study and scholarly contribution. While a solid GPA shows coursework mastery, and GRE scores and letters of recommendation offer useful context, they don't prove you can independently produce publishable research to the same extent. A publication, especially in a scholarly journal, stands out as a tangible indicator of your potential to contribute to the program's research goals.

Stanovich emphasizes that psychology encompasses a wide range of topics, methods, and perspectives in both how it is taught and how research is conducted. This variety reflects the field's breadth as it seeks to understand behavior and mental processes from multiple angles, across subfields like cognitive, developmental, social, clinical, and neuroscience, as well as across different research approaches—from experiments to observational studies to computational models. In education and in research, this diversity is a strength that invites students and researchers to evaluate evidence across different paradigms rather than expecting a single, uniform view. So, the best description is that psychology is diverse. The idea that it is uniform, declining, or irrelevant does not fit his perspective, which centers on the value and presence of multiple approaches and areas within the discipline.

This combination of hands-on experiences and intentional reflection tends to develop independence, intercultural competence, adaptability, and a broader worldview, leading many students to feel a lasting personal and professional shift. Other high-impact practices offer valuable learning as well—internships provide practical work experience, research assistantships build specific research and analytical skills, and service learning connects coursework to community impact. Yet the distinctive, widely reported transformative effect is most closely associated with study abroad because it uniquely expands perspective and changes how students see themselves and their place in the world.

It also allows comparisons between the two groups to see where views align or differ, which can inform how programs are designed and communicated. If only students were surveyed, you'd miss parental context and potential home influences. If only professionals or only teachers were surveyed, you'd lose the student's personal perspective and the family's day-to-day experience. In-text citations for a source with two authors are written inside parentheses with both last names joined by an ampersand and the year after a comma, e.g., (Corser & Barney, 2010). This form is placed right after the referenced material. The other options fail because they either omit the parentheses, use brackets, or separate the authors in a way that suggests multiple sources or a different formatting rule.

The literature review in the introduction builds context and justifies the study by surveying what previous research has found, identifying gaps or unresolved questions, and showing how this project will address them. It helps readers understand the current state of knowledge and why this new work matters, including what question it tackles and what contribution it aims to make. It isn't about presenting results, describing data collection forms, or listing funding sources; those parts belong in later sections. By linking past research to the current study, the literature review motivates the work and sets expectations for its contribution.

The idea behind falsifiability is that a theory becomes scientifically useful only when it makes predictions that are specific and testable. With precise, testable predictions, researchers can design experiments or observations that could potentially show the theory to be false. This openness to being disproven is what lets theories be challenged, refined, or discarded in light of new evidence, driving scientific progress. That's why the best answer is the one that says predictions must be specific and testable. If a theory makes vague or flexible claims, it can accommodate any outcome and thus cannot be meaningfully tested. A theory doesn't have to be highly complex to be falsifiable; it just needs to make clear predictions that can be checked. It also shouldn't be broad and unfalsifiable, because that would prevent empirical scrutiny. And relying on a single experiment isn't sufficient for establishing a robust theory—reliable theories are supported by multiple, independent tests across different conditions.

Building and using personal connections is a central tactic in a successful job search. That's why the statement about using personal connections to help your job search is the best answer: it reflects actively leveraging relationships to access opportunities, rather than relying solely on impersonal online submissions. Relying only on online applications overlooks the human element; avoiding alumni ignores a valuable network; and submitting only to large corporations narrows your options and misses opportunities where networks can be especially impactful.

This order supports a clear, logical flow: identify the work, quickly summarize it, then provide the background before detailing the procedures. Other sequences disrupt this progression by misplacing the title or abstract or by putting the introduction before a summary, making it harder for a reader to grasp the study at a glance.
