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Explanations

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1. Which product acts as a barrier to caustic chemicals during a relaxer retouch or chemical service?

Barrier protection during chemical services is essential because caustic chemicals can irritate or burn skin. A barrier cream forms a protective layer on the skin around the hairline and ears, preventing direct contact with the chemicals during a relaxer retouch. This reduces the risk of chemical burns and irritation and also helps keep cleanup easier if any product touches the skin. The other products serve different roles: a conditioning treatment nourishes and moisturizes hair, a neutralizing shampoo stops the chemical reaction and cleanses the hair, and curl reform is used to reshape texture—not to protect the skin from chemical exposure.

The main factor here is residual moisture in the end papers that dilutes the neutralizer, which weakens the curl. If water is left trapped in the end papers after rinsing, it mixes with the neutralizer and lowers its strength right where the curl is being set, leading to a weaker or looser curl. Other scenarios don't explain the same effect: over-wetting introduces extra water overall but doesn't specifically describe dilution of the neutralizer by water retained in the end papers; too much perm solution increases chemical exposure rather than dilution by end-paper water; insufficient rinsing leaves residue and can cause uneven processing, not dilution of neutralizer by end-paper moisture.

End paper placement shows how the hair ends are secured around the rod. That two-paper setup is the Double Paper/Double Flat wrap, which creates a secure, flat wrap around the rod and keeps the ends neatly contained during processing. This differs from a single wrap (which uses only one end paper) and from other arrangements that involve different overlaps or placements, which aren't described by the "under one, over the other" pattern.

Leaving water in the end papers after rinsing mainly reduces the neutralizer's strength when it contacts the hair ends. An Additional Booster isn't a standard label for the wrapping saturant, and Rod Diameter is a physical measure that affects curl size, not moisture retention.

Porosity shows how readily the hair takes in moisture and chemicals; highly porous hair absorbs solutions quickly and is often more fragile, so you might use a shorter processing time or milder solution, whereas low porosity hair resists penetration and may need longer processing or a different approach to reach the desired curl. Together, these properties predict how fast the chemical will work and how much strength is needed to achieve the curl without causing damage. Other factors like color, density, or shine don't directly determine processing behavior in a perm.

Metallic salts introduce metal ions that react with the chemicals used in a perm. During a perm, a reducing agent breaks disulfide bonds in the hair, and an oxidizer then re-forms them to set the curl. Metal ions can catalyze unwanted side reactions, create deposits, or alter the balance of the chemical reactions across the hair, which leads to an uneven curl, discoloration, and potential breakage where those reactions are concentrated. Water is just a solvent and doesn't add reactive ions, while alcohol and glycerin are not known to cause this specific incompatibility in standard perm chemistry. So, metallic salts are the substance that can cause these issues.

If it were overprocessed, you'd typically see more frizz or damage with a disrupted pattern rather than just a weak, limp curl; normal curls would hold their shape, and extremely tight curls would still feel very compact and springy.

Acid perms are gentler and slower. They use a low-pH, milder reducing solution, which reduces how much the hair swells and how aggressively the bonds are broken. That gentler action means the processing happens more slowly, which is safer for fragile hair because there's less stress on the fiber and more time to accommodate the curl pattern without causing damage. After wrapping, a neutralizer is still required to re-form the bonds and lock in the curl. Because of the milder chemistry, the result is typically softer, more flexible curls rather than very tight, strong ones, aligning with the idea that acid perms are better for fragile hair.
