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Explanations

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1. The area where the nail rests, providing support and nourishment, is called the:

The nail bed is the skin underneath the nail plate that provides support and nourishment to the nail. It houses the blood vessels that feed the nail as it grows, which is also why the nail looks pink. The visible pale area at the base, the lunula, is part of the nail matrix but not the supportive bed. The perionychium refers to the surrounding nail folds and skin, and the eponychium is the protective cuticle at the base. So, the area described as providing support and nourishment is the nail bed.

2. If moisture is trapped between artificial and natural nails, which infection may form?

Moist, enclosed spaces under a nail create an ideal environment for bacteria to multiply. When moisture is trapped between an artificial nail and the natural nail, bacteria can invade the surrounding tissue at the nail folds, leading to a bacterial infection such as paronychia. Fungal infections can occur with moisture too, but they're less likely to develop immediately in this specific trapped-gap scenario, whereas bacteria are more prone to quick growth in that moist environment. Viral infections require a virus and a different transmission route, and an allergic reaction isn't an infection.

A protective seal over finished polish is created by a top coat. It dries into a hard, glossy layer that resists daily wear, tiny bumps, and surface scratches, which are the main causes of chipping. By wrapping the colored polish in this protective shell, the manicure lasts longer and stays chip-free longer. The base coat goes underneath to help polish stick to the nail and protect the natural nail, not to shield the color once it's on. Speed dry speeds up drying time but doesn't provide lasting protection, and nail bleach is for whitening and isn't related to preventing chipping. So the top coat is the product that protects polish from chipping.

This practical shape follows the nail's natural curve, making it easy to maintain and versatile for everyday life, work, and sports. In contrast, square shapes can snag more easily and feel less durable when nails are kept short, and oval or almond shapes require more length and upkeep to maintain their elongated taper, which isn't as typical in daily male grooming. So round nails offer a neat, durable, and low-maintenance look, making them the most common choice.

A tool with a small scoop-shaped edge is used to clean debris from the nail sidewalls. This precise scooping action makes it ideal for cleaning the sidewalls before a manicure or nail enhancement. Other tools have different primary jobs: a nail buffer smooths and shines the nail surface, an orange stick is mainly for pushing back cuticles and tidying the edge (and can be less precise for sidewall debris), and nail clippers trim the nail itself rather than clean the debris from the sidewalls.

Keratin is a fibrous, structural protein that provides toughness and protection. In nails and hair, keratin is the primary structural component, forming the hard, rigid material that gives nails their strength and hair its resilience. Nails are made of hard keratin densely cross-linked, while hair consists of hard keratin that provides rigidity and durability as it grows. Bones are mainly collagen with minerals, and teeth are composed of enamel and dentin with different proteins and minerals, not keratin as the main structural element. Skin does contain keratin, but its outer layer is built from keratinocytes forming the protective epidermis rather than being the primary structural component like nails and hair.

Onychomycosis is a fungal infection of the nail, most often caused by dermatophytes. The statement that it is caused by biting the nail isn't correct; nail biting can damage nails and may create an entry point for fungi, but the infection itself comes from fungal organisms, not from the act of biting.

Primer is a bonding agent that prepares the nail surface for acrylic by removing oils and creating a tacky, receptive layer for adhesion. In an overlay with tips, the important surface the acrylic will grip includes the natural nail and the joint where the tip meets the nail. Applying primer after the tips are in place ensures you're priming the exact surface that the overlay will bond to, including that seam, which strengthens adhesion and helps prevent premature lifting. If primer were used before applying tips, the primed surface could be altered or covered by the tip application, reducing its effectiveness. Priming during buffing or filing would also risk the primer wearing off or being disrupted before the acrylic is placed.
