1. Who founded the first Greek-letter fraternity and in what year?

The first Greek-letter fraternity was Phi Beta Kappa, founded in 1776 at the College of William and Mary in Virginia. It began as a small group of five students who formed a secret society to celebrate scholarship in the liberal arts, using Greek letters as its emblem. John Heath is recognized as the central founder, along with his four fellow students, and the year 1776 places its creation squarely in the American colonial era. This is why the option naming John Heath and the year 1776 is the best answer: it matches the historical record of the very first fraternity to adopt Greek letters and to base its identity on scholarly merit rather than social or religious criteria.

So, the best answer is the fraternity he belonged to, Pi Kappa Phi, because that is the organization linked to the founding of The Ability Experience. The other fraternities listed aren't connected to Sayre's founding effort, so they don't match his affiliation.

The Adelpheans represent the earliest form of the organization that would become Alpha Delta Pi. They began as a small, student-led sisterhood at Wesleyan College in Macon, Georgia, in 1851, created to support this group of women as they pursued education in an era with limited opportunities. As the group grew and expanded to other campuses, it adopted a Greek-letter name and reformed as Alpha Delta Pi in 1905. So, this lineage—from the Adelphean Society to Alpha Delta Pi—traces the direct historical precursor. The other sororities have their own separate founding stories, distinct from this lineage.

4. What color are the letters on the Pi Kappa Phi flag?

A. Royal Blue

The letters are royal blue because that shade provides a strong, clear contrast against the flag's background, making the Greek characters easy to read from a distance and instantly recognizable as Pi Kappa Phi. This color choice helps the insignia stand out in ceremonies and displays, which is why it's used for the letters. Gold, white, or black would either blend in too much or not carry the same distinctive branding, so royal blue is the most legible and recognizable option.

The title of honorary 4th father in PKP is a ceremonial honor tied to a chapter's history and leadership. Darwald Owen is the person associated with that Xi-Roanoke designation, which is why he's recognized as the honorary 4th father. The other names don't carry that specific chapter-linked honor in the PKP records, so they don't fit this designation.

Interpreting this motto hinges on understanding the Greek behind Phi Beta Kappa. Philosophia means the love or pursuit of wisdom, biou means life, and kybernētēs means guides or steers. Taken together, the phrase communicates that wisdom should steer how we live. Among the options, The Philosophy of life best captures that idea, because it presents philosophy as a guiding influence on living. The other choices misplace the sense: The Philosophy of knowledge would focus on knowledge itself rather than wisdom guiding life; The Path of wisdom suggests a journey rather than a rule for living; The Brotherhood of Liberty is unrelated to the motto's meaning. So the best answer is The Philosophy of life.

7. Which president was a member of the Flat Hat Club?

The Flat Hat Club was a colonial-era dining and discussion group at the College of William & Mary in Virginia, known for bringing together young leaders who would shape the new nation. Thomas Jefferson studied at William & Mary and joined this club during his student days, making him a documented member. This connection is why he is the correct answer: his association with the club is a notable part of his early life and the circles that influenced him. George Washington attended William & Mary briefly, but there isn't solid evidence he was a member of this club, and James Madison studied at Princeton while John Adams studied at Harvard, so they aren't linked to the Flat Hat Club.

This question tests what College for Chapter Officers is designed to provide. It is an officer training event held annually in January that brings newly elected or reelected chapter officers and chairmen together to gain practical experience and formal training in how to run the chapter. The program covers essential areas like governance and leadership, chapter operations and administration, risk management, membership recruitment and retention, finances and reporting, and planning and programming. The aim is to prepare leaders to handle their duties confidently and ensure the chapter operates in line with fraternity policies and standards. It is not a general leadership conference for all members, nor a social event or a scholarship program, which is why this description fits best.

9. What does the Star and Lamp contain?

Publications organize content by scope, and a national-focused periodical centers its reporting on events that affect the whole country. The Star and Lamp is designed to cover broad national happenings—the government, major nationwide events, and issues that matter across the nation—so National News is the best fit for what it contains. Local News would be about a specific city or campus, International News covers events abroad, and editorials are opinion pieces rather than the main news reporting.

The Flat Hat Club is understood as the seed of the American fraternity system. Formed at the College of William & Mary in the colonial era, it began as a social and literary circle but soon evolved into an organized group that helped give rise to Phi Beta Kappa in 1776. Phi Beta Kappa, with its Greek letters and formalized membership, became the template for the modern fraternity model. So, its lasting significance is as the starting point of the first modern-day fraternity, not merely the oldest club or a standalone literary or honorary society.
