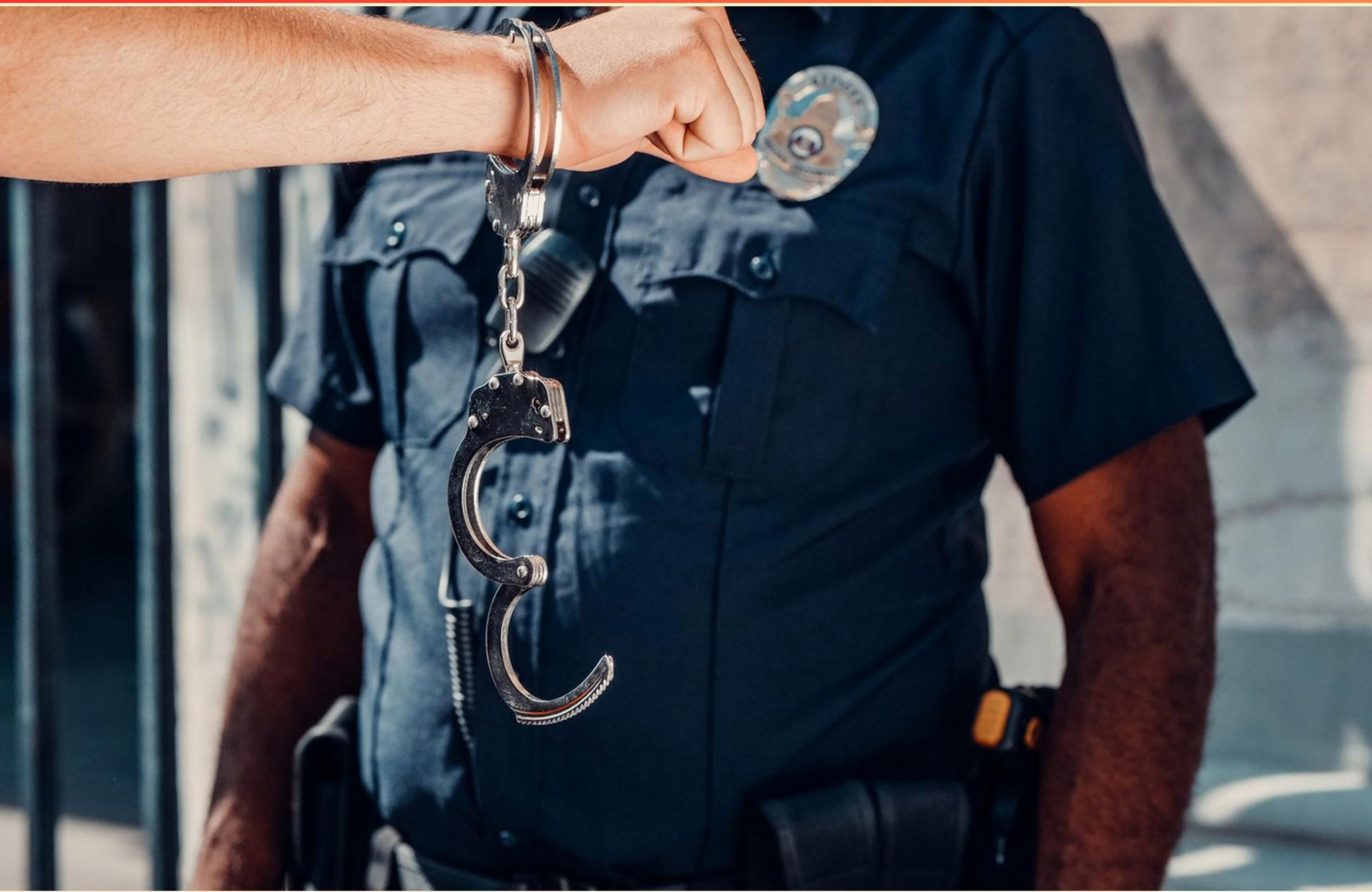

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Explanations

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1. Which technology is commonly used to track officer and vehicle locations in real time during patrol operations?

Real-time tracking of patrol locations relies on a system that provides continuous coordinates from satellites. The Global Positioning System does exactly that: it uses satellites to determine precise latitude and longitude, which can be sent to a dispatch center so supervisors see where every unit is on a map as operations unfold. This real-time capability supports rapid response, safe deployment, and coordinated moves across multiple units. RFID only identifies objects when they're near a reader, not continuously track them; geospatial mapping is a visualization and analysis tool that needs location data from somewhere, and satellite telemetry is a broader term for data transmission from remote assets and isn't the standard label used for real-time police unit tracking. So GPS is the technology most commonly used to track officer and vehicle locations in real time during patrol operations.

The other options don't describe a category of digital-era offenses. The Challenge of Crime in a Free Society is a broad policy work about crime in society overall, not a label for digital wrongdoing. Griggs v. Duke Power Co. is a landmark employment-discrimination case with no relation to crime categories. Crime-detention technology isn't a standard term for a crime category and doesn't convey the idea of offenses themselves. So cybercrime best describes digital-era crimes like hacking.

This goes beyond just legal responsibility, encompassing ethical conduct, governance, and how outcomes are managed. Immunity would remove punishment, which undermines responsibility. Anonymity hides who acted, preventing accountability from taking effect. Liability refers to legal responsibility for damages or obligations and doesn't fully capture the ongoing process of managing behavior and performance within a structured system. So, the best term for this practice is accountability.

Factors like prior experiences, recent incidents, training that emphasizes threat cues, media portrayals, and the overall culture of an agency all shape how dangerous a situation feels, not just how dangerous it objectively is. Actual danger is the real level of risk in the environment, which can be high or low independent of what someone believes. Potential danger refers to what might happen in the future in general—not necessarily what a specific officer believes about danger in the moment. Person-initiated danger points to danger that comes from another individual's actions, a source of risk, but not the broader belief about danger in police work. The sense of danger as a belief most directly fuels the dread officers experience.

Privatization is the move of delivering a service by private firms rather than the government. This differs from militarization, which focuses on arming and adopting military-style tactics; from centralization, which is about concentrating authority within a single public or central body; and from deregulation, which involves cutting back rules and oversight. The core idea here is shifting policing responsibility from public agencies to private entities.

Garner*, deadly force is only permissible if there is probable cause to believe the suspect poses a significant threat of death or serious bodily harm and the use of force is necessary to prevent escape. This rule specifically applies to suspects believed to have committed serious crimes, not to misdemeanors or non-threatening situations. The other terms refer to different ideas—hot pursuit concerns chasing suspects, arrest authority is the general power to make arrests, and an escape clause isn't a standard term for this context.*

Together, they fit under a category labeled Modern problems (4). The other options refer to older or more specific topics (a landmark civil rights case, a 1960s crime-policy report, or cybercrime) and don't capture this broad, current set of policing challenges.

Acute stress is the rapid, intense stress response to a sudden emergency. In a situation like a shooting or a high-speed chase, the body's fight-or-flight system kicks in quickly, flooding you with adrenaline and cortisol to heighten vigilance and physical readiness for the immediate danger. This surge is brief and tightly linked to the specific incident, usually fading once the event ends, though some people may experience lingering symptoms if the stress is very intense or if the event is traumatic. Chronic stress, by contrast, is ongoing and long-lasting, arising from persistent pressures that don't have a clear end. Physiological stress refers to the body's bodily responses—the hormonal and physiological processes involved—rather than the timing of the stress. Psychological stress concerns the mental and emotional experience of stress, which can accompany any type of stress but isn't defined by how sudden it is.
