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## **Explanations**

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## 1. Which poem is NOT associated with the theme Power of Humans?

- A. Ozymandias
- B. London
- C. Poppies
- D. My Last Duchess

Power and control in human actions. These poems explore how power operates—whether in rulers, social systems, or intimate relationships—and what those dynamics do to people. Ozymandias critiques imperial power. The ruined statue of a mighty king shows that political authority and fame are temporary, no matter how colossal they seem in life. London reveals how powerful structures in society shape suffering. The speaker's voice highlights oppressive systems, corruption, and the impact of power on ordinary people, conveying a critique of institutions and arrangement of power. My Last Duchess examines domestic power. The speaker's controlling attitude and fixation on possession expose how authority is exercised within a marriage, revealing manipulation and coercion as a form of power. Poppies centers on memory, absence, and personal emotion—the intimate experience of a mother or loved one affected by war. It does not foreground power relations or how power operates over others, which is why it's not aligned with the theme of power in human actions.

## 2. The final stanza focuses on which group?

The main idea being tested is perspective and who the ending shifts our attention to. In the final stanza, the focus moves away from the events of war or the photographer's own memory and toward the people in England who will see the pictures. This highlights the distance between the scenes of suffering and the home audience, turning the act of looking at photographs into the subject itself. It also invites reflection on how those viewers are shaped by what they see—whether the images move them to action or leave them detached. So the best answer is that the final stanza centers on the group of people in England who will encounter the photographs.

## 3. Which poem is NOT associated with the theme Individual Experiences?

The idea being tested is whether a poem focuses on an individual's personal experience and emotional response, rather than broader ideas like power, time, or collective critique. Ozymandias stands apart because it centers on the monument, the ruler's hubris, and the passage of time, using a distant, reflective perspective rather than an intimate, personal voice or reaction. The other poems present a concrete, individual viewpoint: London gives the speaker's personal experience of urban hardship; Remains conveys a soldier's memory of a specific event and its lingering impact; War Photographer follows the photographer's professional encounter with others' suffering and his moral reflection. So Ozymandias is the one that doesn't fit the theme of Individual Experiences.

*The main idea here is to recognize how each poem treats war's immediacy and its effects. The Charge of the Light Brigade and Exposure present war as lived experience—the charged action and the brutal conditions soldiers endure—while War Photographer centers on how conflict is captured, interpreted, and felt by those far from the front. Kamikaze shifts away from that direct, on-the-ground reality; it concentrates on memory, a personal moral choice, and the way a family and society remember (or rewrite) what happened. Because of that focus on memory and ethical reflection rather than the raw, immediate experience of conflict, Kamikaze sits outside the theme of the Reality of Conflict.*

#### 5. Which poem is NOT associated with the theme Identity?

*The idea being tested is how directly a poem engages with identity as a theme. London centers on social oppression and the way institutions shape people's lives in an urban setting, focusing on collective experience and critique rather than an exploration of personal or sense-of-self identity. The imagery and voice highlight constraints and power structures—the mind-forged manacles, the chartered streets—rather than a search for who a person is. By contrast, the other poems tie identity to individual or communal sense of self: My Last Duchess reveals identity through the speaker's control and the way a person is defined by status and ownership; Poppies delves into personal memory, parenthood, and how a woman's sense of self shifts in the face of war and loss; Tissue uses the metaphor of paper to question how borders, culture, and belonging shape who we are. So London is the one not primarily about identity.*

#### 6. In the material about Exposure, what is described as the main enemy?

*The main idea being tested is recognizing that in Exposure the force oppressing the soldiers is Nature itself—the cold, the wind, and the harsh weather. Wilfred Owen renders the weather as an active adversary that wears them down, not the enemy soldiers at the front. Phrases like the "merciless iced winds" that "knife us" show how the environment directly attacks their bodies and morale, while the refrain of "something happens" is conspicuously absent because action is blocked by the elements. This makes Nature the dominant foe shaping the soldiers' experience and the poem's message about the futility and fatigue of war. The other options miss that focus: the front-line enemy is human, and while hunger or the passage of time are present themes in war poetry, they aren't the central adversary Owen centers in Exposure.*

## 7. What central idea does Tissue explore about life and power?

*The main idea being tested is that life is fragile and shaped by political and social forces. Tissue uses the image of paper to stand in for human life, showing how our existence is touched and ordered by the systems around us—borders, governments, institutions, and social hierarchies. The poem suggests that what we call life is not permanent or separate from power; it's written, restricted, and influenced by documents, maps, and rules that govern who belongs, where we can move, and what we can claim. Yet the light that can shine through the tissue also hints at potential or change—that life isn't fixed and that power can be questioned, reinterpreted, or challenged. This makes the idea that life is primarily about wealth or personal memories less fitting, and it moves away from seeing life as simply permanent or untouched by wider forces.*

## 8. What does the poem end with regarding the narrator's change?

- A. He reflects on being changed by the experience**

*The ending centers on a real shift inside the narrator, showing that the experience has changed who they are. Instead of finishing with action or a call to repeat the event, the final lines turn inward and reflect on how the experience has altered the narrator's perspective, values, or sense of self. You can sense this change in the tone and choice of words: a move from recounting what happened to acknowledging that the experience has left a lasting mark, often with a more measured, thoughtful, or even unsettled mood. The narrator may speak in a way that suggests permanence—recognizing they cannot go back to who they were before—rather than expressing a plan to repeat the act. Because the emphasis is on transformation of the self rather than on guilt expressed as regret, denial, or renewed intent to steal, this ending best matches the idea that the narrator has been changed by the experience.*

## 9. What did the Duke stop the Duchess from doing?

- A. Flirting with other men**
- B. Wearing bright clothes
- C. Visiting family
- D. Singing in public

*This question tests how power and control show up in relationships, especially in the way one person tries to limit another's behavior. In this poem, the speaker presents a wife as a possession he can command, and his impatience is aimed at how she interacts with people—particularly men. The crucial idea is that the Duke is unhappy with the Duchess because she enjoyed the company and flattery of others, a behavior that challenges his authority. The line about giving commands and then "all smiles stopping" signals that he could intervene in her social ease and, in the poem's dark arc, take drastic action to enforce that control. So the behavior he's policing is her flirting with other men, not her clothing, family visits, or singing in public. Those aspects aren't tied to the Duke's motive or the poem's central tension; the controlling issue is how she related to other men.*

**10. The island setting emphasizes which thematic idea?**

*The island setting foregrounds isolation and the vulnerability of people to the natural world. Being cut off from help or civilization makes the sea, wind, and weather feel like a constant, impersonal force that controls what can happen. This heightens tension and underscores that humans often gain little real mastery when faced with nature's power; the environment can threaten survival and expose us to danger, uncertainty, and loneliness. In poems with this setting, the mood is usually unsettled or perilous, emphasizing weakness in the face of natural forces rather than triumph or control. That's why it fits best: it isn't about urban resilience or human domination, which would imply overcoming or managing environment, nor about optimism regarding weather, which would be light and confident. Instead, the island makes nature seem formidable and inescapable, highlighting vulnerability and isolation.*
