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Explanations

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1. Which equation demonstrates the inverse property of multiplication?

- A. $A \times (1/A) = 1$**
- B. $A \times A = A$
- C. $A \times 0 = 0$
- D. $A \times (A + B) = A \times A + A \times B$

The inverse property of multiplication is shown when a nonzero number is multiplied by its reciprocal and the product is 1. For any nonzero value a , $a \times (1/a) = 1$. This works because the reciprocal $1/a$ is defined only when a is not zero, so you're finding the partner that brings the product to one. Why this is the best example here: it directly demonstrates that multiplying a number by the number that undoes it yields unity, which is exactly what the inverse property describes. Multiplying a number by itself, $a \times a$, does not generally give 1, so it isn't illustrating an inverse relationship. Multiplying by zero always results in zero, which is a separate zero-property of multiplication. The distributive property, shown by $a \times (a + b) = a \times a + a \times b$, involves distributing multiplication over addition rather than finding a multiplicative inverse.

The idea behind calling Mesopotamia the cradle of civilization is that farming there allowed people to settle, produce a food surplus, and support a growing population. When communities can stay in one place and produce more than they need, specialists emerge—craftspeople, traders, and leaders—leading to the development of cities, writing, and organized systems of rules. That sequence—settled farming enabling complex society—is why this region is seen as the birthplace of civilization. The option about agriculture being first developed there best captures this foundational shift. The other statements describe later or unrelated achievements—flight, democracy, or universities—that don't explain why this area is labeled as the cradle of civilization.

Galaxies are enormous systems bound by gravity that include billions or trillions of stars, plus clouds of gas and dust. This combination of many stars with interstellar material allows galaxies to form new stars and display a variety of shapes, from spirals to ellipticals. That scale and composition distinguish them from other cosmic structures: a planetary system is just a star and its orbiting planets, a single star with its planets is a star system, and a cloud of gas with no stars is a nebula. So the description that fits best is a large system containing stars, dust, and gas.

4. What are the primary byproducts of cellular respiration in humans?

In human cells, cellular respiration uses glucose and oxygen to produce energy (ATP). The waste products that come out of this process are carbon dioxide and water. Carbon dioxide is released as the carbon atoms from glucose are oxidized and exit the body when we breathe out. Water forms when oxygen acts as the final electron acceptor and combines with hydrogen during the electron transport chain. Put simply, glucose plus oxygen yields carbon dioxide, water, and energy. Oxygen and glucose are the reactants you start with, not the byproducts, so they aren't the wastes produced. Nitrogen and methane aren't produced by human cellular respiration, either, which is why those options aren't correct.

5. Which geographic feature is nearest to the Yangtze River?

The Yangtze River begins high in western China, on the Tibetan Plateau. Because the river's headwaters are located on that plateau, it is the geographic feature closest to the Yangtze. The Himalayan Mountains lie to the southwest and are not as immediately near the river's starting point. The Gobi Desert sits farther north in northern China and Mongolia, and the Brazilian Highlands are far away in South America. So the Tibetan Plateau is the nearest major geographic feature to the Yangtze River.

6. Which nation first colonized most of the western United States?

- A. Spain**

The main idea here is understanding which European power established the earliest widespread presence across the western part of what is now the United States. Spain was that power, building a broad network of missions, presidios, and settlements across the Southwest and California. Through these missions and towns—think of San Diego, Mission Santa Barbara, San Francisco, Santa Fe and other frontier outposts—Spain extended its control far into what would become the western U.S. This Spanish frontier remained in place for centuries, shaping culture, place names, and land use long before the United States expanded westward or Britain and France held other regions of North America. France did have influence farther north and along parts of the interior (like Louisiana), and Britain controlled areas along the Pacific Northwest later, but neither dominated the western territories to the extent Spain did. The United States expanded westward later, after independence and through acquisitions and treaties, not as the first colonizer of the western region. So, Spain is the nation that first colonized most of the western United States.

7. Houston serves as a major port of trade mostly because of which feature?

The key idea is how a place's exact position on the globe enables it to access trade routes. Absolute location means the precise point where Houston sits on the map. That position places the city on the Gulf of Mexico, right at gateways to major sea lanes and to inland transportation networks. That combination—direct access to ocean shipping and connections to rail and road networks—makes Houston a natural hub for importing and exporting goods, which is why this feature is the strongest explanation for its role as a major port. Climate and population size matter in other ways (weather risks, labor force, local demand), but they don't determine a port's ability to connect to global shipping as directly as its exact geographic placement does. Relative location would emphasize how Houston sits in relation to other places, but the main point here is that its precise geographic position on the globe provides the critical access needed for a major port.

The main concept here is identifying which amendment ended slavery in the United States. The Thirteenth Amendment is the one that makes slavery and involuntary servitude illegal throughout the country, except as punishment for a crime for which a person has been duly convicted. It also gives Congress the power to enforce this provision. This amendment was ratified in 1865 after the Civil War. The other amendments address different rights: the First Amendment protects freedoms like speech, religion, and press; the Eighteenth established Prohibition; the Nineteenth granted women the right to vote. So the Thirteenth Amendment is the correct choice because it specifically abolishes slavery.

Decoding hinges on hearing and manipulating sounds before linking them to letters. To confirm a first-grade student's difficulty with decoding words like ran, pet, him, and hot, you want to assess phonemic awareness—specifically the ability to break spoken words into individual phonemes. If the student can segment spoken words into distinct sounds, it shows readiness to map those sounds to letters and blend them into readable words. If segmentation is challenging, that points to a phonemic awareness deficit that's directly tied to decoding difficulty, guiding targeted practice with sound manipulation. Other assessments don't target decoding: a basic reading comprehension test measures understanding of text, not how words are sounded out; handwriting speed assesses writing fluency; and vocabulary knowledge examines word meanings rather than sound manipulation.

The main idea is that irrigation powered by windmills made farming possible in a dry region. Windmills provide a practical way to lift groundwater from shallow wells and bring it to the surface so fields can be watered reliably. This ability to irrigate transformed whether people could settle and what they could grow on the Great Plains, turning a semi-arid landscape into productive farmland. Deforestation isn't a key driver here since the plains were largely treeless; desalination is not relevant inland, and globalization affects markets more than the basic capacity to farm. So, windmills directly enabled agricultural development and settlement by enabling irrigation.
