The third and fourth choices misapply the words "council" and "counsel," which refer to a group that provides advice or the act of advising, respectively, rather than the context in which they are being used in those sentences.

Standardized tests are typically administered under specific conditions to assess student performance in a consistent way, but they often do not provide the timely feedback necessary for continuous monitoring and improvement in reading skills. Thus, formative assessments stand out as the most effective tool for tracking and supporting student development in reading over time.
