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## **Explanations**

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## 1. What is phoneme segmentation?

Phoneme segmentation is breaking a spoken word into its individual sounds and counting how many there are. For example, the word hat has three distinct sounds: /h/ /æ/ /t/. This skill helps kids map each sound to a letter or letter combination when decoding, making it a fundamental part of early reading and spelling. This is why breaking a word into separate sounds and counting them is the best description. Identifying which letter begins a word is about the letter at the start, not the sounds; blending sounds to form a word is about putting sounds together, not separating them; and recognizing meaning involves vocabulary, not sound structure.

Understanding a character's motivations comes from showing what they do, what they think, and what they say. When readers can observe a character's actions, hear their thoughts, and listen to their dialogue, they get direct clues about why the character makes certain choices. This combination turns vague behavior into meaningful reasons, making motives feel real and connected to the story. If you hide a character's internal thoughts, readers are left to guess why they act, which weakens the connection between action and motive. Focusing only on describing the setting gives atmosphere and context but doesn't reveal the personal reasons behind a character's decisions. Using abstract pronouns won't clearly indicate who is thinking or feeling, so motive remains unclear. So the strongest way to convey why a character acts a certain way is to blend actions, thoughts, and dialogue, giving readers clear, tangible insight into their motivations.

This option captures the sense of revival of ancient learning and the broad burst of creativity and inquiry that characterized the period. It wasn't just about one area; it brought changes in art, ideas, science, and how people looked at the world, often tied to humanist thinking and new ways of learning. The other descriptions describe different phenomena. Religious reform within the church refers to the Reformation, a separate movement that sought changes in religious practices, not the broad revival and exploration that define the Renaissance. A military conquest era doesn't reflect the cultural and intellectual shifts of the time. A decline in science and learning runs opposite to what the Renaissance is known for, which included breakthroughs in science and a new spirit of discovery.

Text features that support comprehension help readers navigate the text and grasp meaning more quickly. Bold terms draw attention to important vocabulary or concepts, making them easier to remember and connect to what you already know. Captions explain what a picture, chart, or diagram shows, so you don't have to infer everything from the image alone. Together these features guide attention, highlight key ideas, and provide quick context, which makes understanding the text easier as you read. Other text features like footnotes and endnotes, a bibliography, or an index serve different purposes—extra details, sources, or help locating topics later. They're still useful, but they don't drive understanding in the moment the way headings, bold terms, and captions do.

In an argument, the claim is the statement the author wants you to accept—that's the position or conclusion they are arguing for. The evidence are the data, facts, examples, reasons, or expert opinions used to back up that claim and make it convincing. So this statement is best because it captures the relationship: a claim is a statement, and evidence supports or proves the claim. For example, if someone claims that daily reading improves writing, the evidence would be studies or examples showing better writing skills after consistent reading. The other options mix up roles: evidence isn't the main conclusion, a claim isn't merely a random opinion, and evidence isn't a peer review comment.

Practicing voting in the classroom gives students a hands-on way to engage in civic participation. This active experience helps them understand their role as citizens and why participation matters, which is more effective than simply hearing information about government. Lecturing about government is informative but passive, so it doesn't give students a chance to practice civic action. A silent reading assignment doesn't involve civic participation at all. A debate with no voting involves discussion, but it doesn't provide practice with the actual voting process or its democratic mechanics. Therefore, classroom ballots to practice voting best promote active citizenship.

Understanding what *lucrative* means helps you pick the right sense quickly. *Lucrative* describes something that brings in a lot of money; it signals profitability. When you hear about a *lucrative* deal or a *lucrative* market, you should think money and high profit. So the best match is describing something as highly profitable; *lucrative*. It doesn't mean unprofitable, which would be losing money. It isn't about risk or danger, and it isn't about how fast something develops. Those ideas relate to risk or pace, not the profit aspect that *lucrative* focuses on.

The idea being tested is how a culture that began as independent city-states grew into a vast, unified empire through conquest. In ancient Greece, political life was organized around city-states—small, self-governing communities like Athens and Sparta. When Alexander the Great, ruling Macedon, expanded his realm, he brought these diverse city-states under one rule and pushed his armies from the shores of Greece and Egypt all the way to the Indus River. This created a huge imperial span and spread Greek language, art, and ideas across the conquered lands, a period scholars call the Hellenistic world. That's why the Greek Empire is the best fit: it reflects the transformation from fragmented city-states to a single, expansive domain driven by Alexander's conquests from Egypt to the Indus. The other options don't match the idea of a Greek-led expansion tied to Alexander's campaigns.

The main idea being tested is recognizing the stages of the writing process, especially the planning part. Prewriting is the stage where you think ahead about what you want to say and how you want to say it. It sets the foundation for everything that comes next, helping you shape a clear plan before you put words on the page. Outlining is a useful method often used during prewriting to arrange ideas in a logical order, but it isn't itself a separate stage. Publishing comes later, after drafting, revising, and editing, when you share your finished piece. Skimming is a reading strategy, not a stage in creating writing.

Phoneme identification is recognizing the individual sounds in spoken words and figuring out where a specific sound appears in the word—the beginning, middle, or end. For example, when you hear the word *cat*, you can identify the sounds /k/ at the start, /æ/ in the middle, and /t/ at the end. Being able to say where that phoneme sits is what this skill covers. Counting syllables looks at bigger sound units—the beats in a word—rather than the exact sounds themselves. Spelling the word is about writing letters for the sounds, not identifying the sounds. Matching a word to its synonym deals with meaning, not sounds.
