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Explanations

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1. Which approach helps readers understand an author's stance in a persuasive text?

Understanding the stance in a persuasive text comes from analyzing the narrator's perspective and the language that signals bias. Persuasive writing aims to sway readers, so the author's point of view and how they choose words, tone, and emphasis reveal where they stand. By identifying who is portrayed as credible, what details are highlighted or omitted, and the mood created by word choice and rhetorical devices, you can detect the attitude the author wants you to adopt. For example, if the author repeatedly uses strong positive terms about one side and frames opposing ideas as risky or foolish, that signals a clear stance. If the language remains balanced and presents multiple viewpoints with careful reasoning, the stance may be more nuanced or even more neutral. Reading random sentences misses the connecting ideas and overall message; counting pages has no bearing on the author's stance; ignoring tone eliminates the most direct cue to attitude.

The Industrial Revolution is defined by a shift to mechanized, factory-based production that changes how goods are made. New technologies, especially steam power and machines that could do work faster than hands, transformed manufacturing from home workshops to large factories, enabling mass production and more efficient processes. This shift also spurred growth in cities as people moved from rural areas to work in factories, and many immigrants arrived seeking new opportunities, fueling urbanization. The other options don't fit because the internet came much later, agriculture was no longer the primary driver of economic activity, and cities actually expanded rather than declined.

Short vowel sounds are easiest to decode when the word is a simple consonant–vowel–consonant pattern. Pig fits this perfectly: p is a clear consonant sound, i is the short vowel sound as in sit, and g is a straightforward end consonant. When a reader blends these sounds together, the word comes out smoothly. The other options involve vowel patterns that aren't just a single short vowel, or rely on pronunciations that vary in practice. Farm uses ar, which is an r-controlled vowel, not a simple short vowel. Was often has a vowel that can become a quick, reduced sound in speech, and the is a common word with a weakened vowel you don't typically sound out fully. For a student focused on short vowels, pig is the most direct and decodable choice.

Limited resources mean we can't have everything we want, so we have to make choices about how to use what we have. This idea is scarcity, and it leads to deciding what to prioritize. When you pick one option, you give up another possibility—the next-best use of that resource. That trade-off is called the opportunity cost. For example, if you have a limited amount of money and must choose between a book and a movie, choosing the book means you forgo the movie experience. If you spend an hour on homework, you have less time for friends or fun—those are your trade-offs. These trade-offs show why people and societies must continually weigh costs and benefits to decide how to allocate resources like money, time, and materials. The concept helps explain everyday decisions and larger economic choices, from personal budgets to government spending.

This is why it's the correct choice here: it describes a collection that brings together original materials and analyses to present consolidated knowledge. The other options describe materials that come directly from someone's experiences or original work: a diary entry records an individual's firsthand experiences; a peer-reviewed research article presents new findings from original research; a firsthand interview recording captures a direct account from a person. These are primary sources, not tertiary, because they are original rather than synthesized summaries.

Patterns of rhythm and sound in poetry are described by prosody. In social studies, this approach helps students grasp concepts like culture, government, or geography even if a single textbook is hard for them, because they can explore through maps, timelines, images, and different formats that reveal the ideas from multiple angles. This is why it works best: it directly provides flexible access and allows diverse learners to demonstrate understanding in ways that suit them. Giving everyone the same assignment, relying only on multiple-choice tests, or focusing only on grammar instruction don't offer the adaptable access or varied demonstrations of understanding that differentiation needs.

For example, when you hear the word cat, you can identify the sounds /k/ at the start, /æ/ in the middle, and /t/ at the end. Being able to say where that phoneme sits is what this skill covers. Counting syllables looks at bigger sound units—the beats in a word—rather than the exact sounds themselves. Spelling the word is about writing letters for the sounds, not identifying the sounds. Matching a word to its synonym deals with meaning, not sounds.

Separation of powers is about dividing government into branches (like lawmakers, the president, and courts) to prevent a single group from gaining too much control. None of these specifically describe the division of authority between national and state levels the way federalism does.

To determine the author's point of view, analyze the narrator's perspective and the language that signals bias or stance. The perspective shows who is telling the story and how their view shapes what happened, whether the narrator is a character in the story or an outside observer. Even with third-person narration, the author reveals their attitude through word choice and tone. Look for loaded or evaluative adjectives, strong or emotional language, and the way events are described or omitted. These cues reveal the author's stance about the topic and help you understand the point of view they're presenting. For example, if the text describes a policy with mostly positive adjectives and focuses on its benefits while glossing over drawbacks, that signals a favorable point of view. Conversely, more neutral or critical language would indicate a different stance. This approach is more informative than just reading conclusions or fixing on punctuation marks, and it prevents ignoring the author's attitude, which is essential to grasping the point of view.
