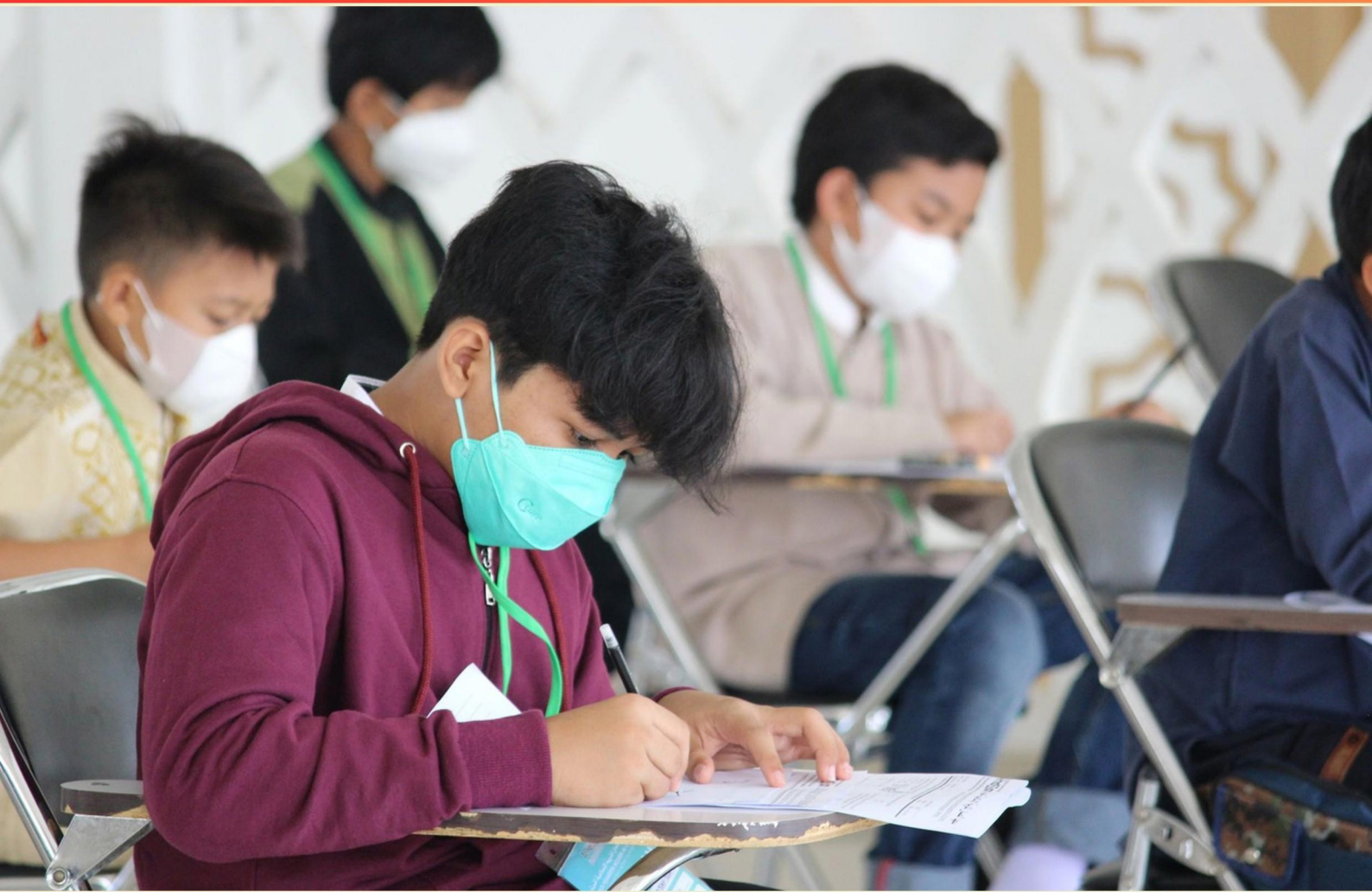

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Explanations

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1. Which color on the Pennsylvania flag matches the color on the U.S. flag?

- A. Blue**
- B. Red
- C. White
- D. Green

Colors on flags are often compared by looking at the dominant tones used in their designs. The U.S. flag features a blue canton (the blue rectangle with stars) along with red and white stripes, while the Pennsylvania flag is a blue field with its seal. Because blue is the main, common color on both flags, blue is the color that matches across them. Red and white do appear on both flags in different parts of their designs, but blue is the consistent, shared color. Green isn't present on the U.S. flag at all.

2. Which concept allows states to choose their own election dates?

Federalism is the distribution of power between national and state governments. In the United States, states have the primary responsibility for running elections, including deciding when they will be held and how they are administered. This state control over election dates reflects state sovereignty within the federal system, with the national government able to set some standards but not micromanage scheduling in most cases. The other ideas describe different ways power is organized within the national government rather than who controls election timing at the state level. Federalism explains why states can choose their own election dates.

3. Which amendment protects against self-incrimination?

This question tests understanding of which constitutional protection guards against being forced to testify against oneself. That safeguard is found in the Fifth Amendment, which states that no person shall be compelled in any criminal case to be a witness against himself. This is why people say "pleading the Fifth" when they choose not to answer questions that might incriminate them. The other amendments cover different rights: the First Amendment protects freedoms of speech, religion, press, assembly, and petition; the Fourth Amendment protects against unreasonable searches and seizures; and the Eighth Amendment prohibits cruel and unusual punishment and excessive fines or bail. Thus, the protection against self-incrimination comes from the Fifth Amendment.

Prohibition began with the amendment that banned alcohol. The amendment that addresses Prohibition again—by reversing it—is the one ratified in 1933, which repealed the prior ban and ended Prohibition. This change returned the power to regulate alcohol to the states and is notable because it's the only time a constitutional amendment repealed a previous one. The other options refer to different events: expanding voting rights for women, ending slavery, or setting presidential term limits, none of which directly address Prohibition.

Judaism's early history is preserved in the Hebrew Bible, which Christians refer to as the Old Testament. This collection contains the foundational stories and events of the Jewish people—the patriarchs, the exodus from Egypt, the giving of the Law at Sinai, and the formation and history of Israel and Judah. The New Testament covers Christian writings about Jesus and the early church, not the earlier Jewish history. The Vedas are Hindu scriptures, and the Quran is Islamic scripture. So the Old Testament is the place where Judaism's earliest historical narratives are found.

6. Which type of text presents facts with a clear thesis and little embellishment?

The main concept being tested is identifying text types by their purpose and how they present information. Expository writing aims to inform with facts and a clear central idea, using straightforward language and minimal embellishment. When a text presents facts and a clearly stated thesis or main idea, it's doing the work of explanation rather than telling a story or giving instructions, so it fits this type best. The other options don't match: an allegory uses symbolic characters and a moral, prescriptive writing gives rules or instructions, and a biography tells about a person's life with narrative detail. So, the text described—facts with a clear thesis and little embellishment—is expository writing.

A recession is a stretch of time when economic activity is shrinking across multiple parts of the economy for a sustained period. It's not about one bad quarter or a single price change, but a downturn you can see in several indicators—GDP, employment, production, incomes, and spending all slowing down together. The idea of "two consecutive quarters of negative GDP" is a common shorthand, roughly six months, to describe this ongoing decline. So the option that talks about a steady decline in the economy for at least six months captures the real sense of a recession. The other ideas describe growth, price increases, or full employment, which are the opposite of a downturn.

8. Which type of map shows natural features and uses color to represent terrain?

Different maps emphasize different kinds of information. Physical maps focus on the land itself—mountains, valleys, rivers, and coastlines—and use color shading to show elevation and terrain, so you can see how the ground rises and falls. A political map centers on borders, cities, and names rather than the land's surface. A climate map displays climate zones, often with colors indicating temperature or precipitation patterns. A population map shows where people live and how densely populated an area is. Since the question describes showing natural features and using color to represent terrain, the map that fits best is the physical map.

9. What is the latitude of the Arctic Circle?

- A. 23.5 degrees North
- B. 23.5 degrees South
- C. 66.5 degrees North**
- D. 66.5 degrees South

Latitude lines show how far north or south you are from the equator. The Arctic Circle sits at about 66.5 degrees north because of Earth's tilt, which is about 23.5 degrees. Subtracting that tilt from 90 degrees places the northern boundary at $90 - 23.5 = 66.5$ degrees. The Antarctic Circle lies at 66.5 degrees south, while the Tropics are at 23.5 degrees north and south and the equator is 0 degrees.

10. Which branch of government is responsible for making laws?

Making laws is the responsibility of the legislative branch. This branch creates, debates, and passes statutes that establish the rules a country or state follows. Lawmakers propose bills, discuss their implications, vote on them, and, after approval, the bills become laws. The executive enforces these laws and can propose or veto legislation, while the judicial branch interprets and applies them in courts. Administrative agencies implement the laws, but they don't serve as a lawmaking body. So the legislative branch is the one that sets the laws.
