1. Which civilization contributed to pottery and clothing, developed metallurgy, promoted architecture, designed irrigation, road and agricultural systems, and organized military structure?

The key idea is recognizing a civilization that unified engineering, craft, and governance across a vast empire. The Incas match all the listed contributions: they built an extensive road system across the Andes that connected far-flung regions and supported military and civilian movement; they engineered irrigation and terrace farming to sustain large populations; their architecture featured impressive stonework in places like Machu Picchu; they practiced metallurgy, producing metal goods; and they created pottery and especially textiles and clothing that reflected their skilled craftsmanship. Plus, they maintained a centralized administrative and military structure to keep the empire organized. Mayans contributed in pottery, architecture, and textiles and built impressive cities, but their road and irrigation networks were not as expansive or centralized. Mongolians are renowned for mobility and military organization but not for the same scale of architectural engineering, irrigation, and centralized governance. The Tea Act is not a civilization at all.

2. Which civilization is noted for education in astronomy and math and an elaborate written language influencing architecture and art?

Focusing on a civilization known for education in astronomy and math and for an elaborate written language that influenced architecture and art points to the Maya. They developed an accurate calendar system and a base-20 number system with a concept of zero, enabling advanced calculations for farming, astronomy, and ritual timing. Their hieroglyphic script—glyphs carved on temple walls and codices—recorded dynastic histories and celestial events, shaping how artistry and architecture carried inscriptions and meaning. This blend of scientific learning, a rich writing tradition, and monumental art is distinctive to the Maya among the options. The Neolithic Revolution describes a shift to farming, not a civilization with a writing system; Stamp Act and Tea Act are political acts, not civilizations or cultural achievements.

Totalitarianism describes a regime where the state seeks to control nearly every aspect of life, not just politics and the economy but also attitudes, values, and beliefs. This system imposes an official ideology, suppresses dissent, and uses propaganda, censorship, and coercion to keep everyone aligned with the regime's goals. Civil liberties are restricted, political pluralism is eliminated, and the state integrates itself into education, media, and even private life. Democracy involves shared power and rights for individuals, oligarchy is rule by a small group, and anarchy is a lack of centralized authority. Thus, the described regime best fits a totalitarian system.

4. The Great Sphinx of Giza is believed to honor which pharaoh?

The Great Sphinx is believed to honor Khafre, a pharaoh of the 4th Dynasty. This attribution fits best because the statue sits beside Khafre's pyramid on the Giza Plateau, a strong clue that it was connected to his royal complex. The Sphinx's style—its size, a squared jaw, the headdress, and the overall build—resembles other Old Kingdom sculptures from Khafre's era, including statues of Khafre himself. Radiocarbon dating and historical context place the carving in roughly the mid-2500s BCE, which matches Khafre's reign. In contrast, the other figures listed came from much later periods: Ramses II from the New Kingdom, Tutankhamun from the late 18th Dynasty, and Akhenaten from the Amarna period. Their times and artistic styles do not align with the Old Kingdom setting of the Sphinx, reinforcing why Khafre is the best fit.

Rights not explicitly listed in the Constitution but protected by the judiciary are known as unenumerated rights. The Constitution mentions some liberties directly, yet the courts interpret and safeguard additional freedoms as part of the broader guarantees of liberty and due process, often drawing on the Ninth Amendment's idea that not all rights are written down. A classic illustration is the right to privacy, which the Supreme Court has protected even though it isn't spelled out page-by-page in the text. This distinguishes unenumerated rights from rights that are explicitly listed (enumerated or expressed) and from powers reserved to the states (reserved rights).

The main idea here is how farming transformed human life. When people started cultivating crops and domesticating animals, they could produce a reliable food supply, support larger populations, and stay in one place. This surplus made permanent homes possible, allowed storage and trade, and led to a division of labor—setting the stage for organized villages and eventually more complex settlements. This shift, around 10,000 BCE, is known as the Neolithic Revolution. The other options refer to later events in world history—tax acts from Britain's colonial era—so they don't explain the move to agriculture or the rise of settled communities. The Neolithic Revolution best explains the development of agricultural societies and organized settlements.

7. Which economic philosophy advocates minimal government intervention in private production and markets?

Laissez-faire is the idea that the government should interfere as little as possible in private production and markets. It rests on the belief that markets are best at allocating resources when they're left free to operate, with competition, prices, and voluntary exchange guiding decisions. Government roles are kept to a minimum—enforcing laws, protecting property rights, contracts, and national defense—while the rest happens through private choice and market forces. Capitalism describes an economic system based on private property and market competition, but it doesn't specify the degree of government intervention. A mixed economy mixes private activity with some government involvement. A planned economy is run largely by the government directing production and distribution. Among these, the stance of minimal intervention is specifically laissez-faire.

A mixed economy combines both public and private ownership, allowing government-owned enterprises to operate alongside privately owned businesses. In this system, the government may own or control certain essential services or industries and set regulations to achieve social goals, while private firms compete and innovate in other areas. This coexistence makes it possible for publicly and privately owned companies to run at the same time. The other options don't fit because a pure market economy centers on private ownership with limited state involvement, an open economy focuses on international trade rather than who owns companies, and a planned economy emphasizes state ownership with centralized planning and little room for private enterprise.

9. Which ruler led the Yuan dynasty and presided over a technologically advanced China, reputed for fair treatment?

Kublai Khan is the ruler in question. He founded and ruled the Yuan dynasty in China, uniting Mongol power with Chinese administration. Under his leadership, the empire promoted extensive trade, administration, and infrastructure that helped connect vast regions, contributing to a society that could make use of technology and ideas from different places. He also earned a reputation for religious and cultural tolerance and fair treatment of different groups, including merchants and scholars, which supported a relatively open and cosmopolitan court. This combination helped China under Yuan governance become quite interconnected and knowledgeable, setting it apart from rulers who did not preside over the Yuan period. The other figures belong to different eras or regions: Genghis Khan established Mongol rule more broadly, while Queen Victoria and Nikita Khrushchev led in Europe and Asia outside the Yuan context.

10. Which temple complex in Mexico in the 1500s replicated a pyramid and honored the god of the sun?

In Aztec religion, pyramids served as bases for major temples where gods were worshiped, especially the sun god. The Great Temple of Tenochtitlan was a grand pyramid complex built in the 1500s in the Aztec capital, and it housed shrines to Huitzilopochtli, the sun god, alongside Tlaloc, the rain god. This mirrors the idea of a pyramid-topped temple dedicated to the sun, fitting the scenario described for Mexico in the 1500s. The Pyramid of the Sun is a large sun-temple too, but it belongs to Teotihuacan and predates the Aztecs by many centuries, so it doesn't reflect the 1500s Aztec context. Chichen Itza has a famous pyramid, but its main deity is Kukulcan, the feathered serpent, not specifically the sun god. The Ziggurat of Ur is from Mesopotamia, not Mexico. So the Great Temple of Tenochtitlan best matches a 1500s Mexican temple complex that replicated a pyramid and honored the sun god.
