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Explanations

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1. Which factor most directly contributed to the desegregation of schools as part of the Civil Rights movement?

The key mechanism here is using the courts to challenge segregation. Legal challenges to "separate but equal" education, led by the NAACP, culminated in Brown v. Board of Education. The Supreme Court's 1954 ruling declared that segregation in public schools was unconstitutional because separate facilities are inherently unequal. That decision provided the binding legal mandate to desegregate and prompted school boards to integrate, often under federal enforcement. Other tactics helped build momentum and put pressure on officials—public demonstrations raised awareness, and economic boycotts created economic and political leverage—but they did not alone compel desegregation through a legal requirement. Executive orders addressed desegregation in other areas (like the armed forces) rather than schools.

The main idea is that the Electoral College can create a mismatch between the national popular vote and who becomes president. Each state has a certain number of electors equal to its senators plus representatives, and in most states the winner of the statewide popular vote gets all of that state's electoral votes. Because of this winner-take-all approach, a candidate can win many states by narrow margins and still accumulate more electoral votes than the opponent, even if the opponent wins a larger share of the national popular vote. This is why it's possible for the candidate who wins the national popular vote not to win the presidency. History provides examples where the nationwide vote winner did not secure the needed electoral votes due to how states allocate them. While the system often yields alignment, it does not guarantee it, and it can lead to outcomes where the electoral vote tally does not match the popular vote. That's why this statement describes a potential effect of the Electoral College: it could prevent the candidate with the highest national popular vote from winning the election.

Indo-Aryan arrival and the beginnings of a fixed social order are captured in the Vedic Age. This period centers on the composition of the Vedas, the sacred texts that define early South Asian society and its values. In these writings, society is described as organized into four varnas—priests (Brahmins), warriors (Kshatriyas), farmers/merchants (Vaishyas), and laborers (Shudras). That framework lays the groundwork for the later, more rigid caste system, as social roles become embedded in religious rites, duties, and daily life. The Vedic Age also marks a time when political life was largely tribal and decentralized, rather than dominated by a single empire. This distinguishes it from the later Maurya and Gupta periods, which are known for centralized state power and large kingdoms. The term Iron Age is sometimes used to describe broader material and technological developments, but it does not specifically denote the Indo-Aryan arrival or the origin of caste-like social organization in the same way the Vedic Age does.

Media coverage in a state-controlled system often serves as a signal of what officials want to appear concerned about. The 1963 memo points out that Soviet press attention may reflect sensitivity to how Afro-Asian students and Soviet racial and ethnic minorities are treated. This fits with the era's dynamics: the USSR wanted to present itself as anti-imperialist and progressive on race and ethnicity while managing internal minority issues. By spotlighting the experiences and treatment of these groups, the press could convey concern, respond to international criticism, and bolster the regime's image both at home and abroad. That focus wouldn't align with topics like American veterans, NATO allies, European leaders, UN delegates, or rural farmers in the United States, which aren't the groups the memo identifies as the source of the depicted sensitivity.

In parliamentary governments, the executive rests on the support of the legislature. When no single party holds a majority, multiple parties must join forces to form a government that can command confidence in parliament. This leads to coalition governments, which are a common and practical feature of parliamentary systems. The other options don't define parliamentary governance as clearly: the executive in these systems is not typically independent and powerful on its own, but rather depends on legislative backing; parliaments can be either unicameral or bicameral depending on the country; and parliamentary government operates within representative democracy rather than direct democracy.

The main idea here is how the New Deal aimed to reform the banking system to restore stability and trust after the crisis. The Glass-Steagall Act of 1933 did exactly that. It separated commercial banking—where people deposit money and banks make loans—from investment banking, which involves trading in securities. This separation reduced the risk that a bank's everyday deposits would be exposed to speculative investment losses. At the same time, it established the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation, which guaranteed deposits and helped prevent bank runs by reassuring the public that their money was safe. These banking reforms targeted the structure and safeguards of the financial system, unlike the other programs, which focused on creating jobs through public works or providing social welfare.

7. Which committee is primarily responsible for reconciling differences between the Senate and House versions of a bill?

Reconciling differences between the Senate and House versions of a bill is handled by a conference committee. This temporary, bipartisan panel is made up of members from both chambers and is empowered to negotiate a unified version of the bill. They draft a conference report that reflects the agreed-upon language, which is then sent back to both the House and the Senate for a final up-or-down vote. The goal is to produce one bill that both chambers can approve. The Rules committee in the House sets debate procedures and scheduling; it doesn't work out policy differences between the two chambers. The Appropriations committee handles funding and spending matters, not cross-chamber reconciliation. A joint Senate-House committee can exist for certain purposes, but the standard mechanism specifically designed to resolve differences between differing bills is the conference committee.

The awakening energized religious revival that spurred social reform movements, especially abolitionism. The revival's emphasis on personal conversion and moral responsibility led many to view slavery as a profound moral wrong and to organize campaigns, societies, and networks to end it. Abolitionism rose from this sense of moral duty, driven by religious-based activism and reformist zeal. The other options don't fit as well: this movement didn't primarily cause urban industrial growth or transcontinental railroad expansion, and it actually increased religious involvement in public life rather than causing a decline.

9. Arab-Muslim expansion helped form a distinctive medieval Islamic civilization in part by which of the following?

The key idea is that Arab-Muslim expansion created a vast, interconnected world in which people, goods, and ideas moved rapidly across regions. This expansive trade network—linking the Mediterranean, Africa, the Persian and Central Asian worlds, and the Indian Ocean—funneled interactions among Muslims and non-Muslims alike. As commerce flowed, so did knowledge: Indian mathematics, Greek philosophy, Persian science, and diverse local innovations blended through translation, scholarship, and collaborative learning. This exchange helped cultivate a cosmopolitan urban culture, shared institutions, and a distinctive medieval Islamic civilization that thrived on the mixing of cultures and ideas. Notions about racial homogeneity aren't accurate for these caliphates, which were diverse and inclusive of many ethnic and religious groups. Trade did not decline; it expanded and linked distant regions. And while some populations did convert to Islam, it was not universal or forced across all areas.

10. Which statement best describes the effect of containment as a Cold War policy?

Containment is about stopping the spread of communism beyond where it already existed. After World War II, the United States built a strategy around preventing Soviet influence from expanding into new countries—through a mix of military alliances, political support for anti-communist regimes, and economic aid to stabilize economies so they wouldn't turn to communism. This focus on preventing expansion is what defines containment, rather than promoting global free trade, accelerating decolonization, or pursuing broad disarmament.
