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Explanations

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1. Which term means inhibiting the growth of microorganisms?

- A. Bones
- B. Fecal flotation
- C. Antimicrobial**
- D. Neurologic system

Antimicrobial is the term that covers substances that act against microorganisms, either stopping their growth or killing them. In practice, antimicrobials include antibiotics, antiseptics, and disinfectants, and they can be bacteriostatic (inhibiting growth) or bactericidal (killing). The idea of inhibiting growth fits squarely under this broad category, whereas the other options refer to anatomy, a diagnostic procedure, or a body system and do not describe actions against microbes.

2. According to Jenna Barber, DVM, how often should dogs be tested for heartworm disease?

- A. Every 3 months

Testing for heartworm disease is most appropriately done on a yearly basis. The reason is that heartworm can be present without obvious symptoms, and the antigen test detects mature, circulating worms. Even with monthly preventives, infections can occur if a dose is missed, a product fails, or a dog is exposed in high-risk areas. A yearly test provides ongoing surveillance to catch any new infection early, before significant heart or lung damage develops, and aligns with common veterinary guidance like that of Jenna Barber, DVM. More frequent testing isn't usually necessary for the average patient, and less frequent testing risks missing a new infection.

Sociobiology is the scientific study of social behavior in animals and humans, examining how genetics and natural selection shape interactions, cooperation, mating systems, aggression, and social organization. It uses an evolutionary lens to explain why certain behaviors persist because they improve survival and reproductive success, across different species and in humans alike. This perspective differs from psychology, which centers on mental processes and behavior without necessarily tying them to evolutionary history. The other terms aren't fields of study: a colony is a social group, and parasites are a type of organism, leaving sociobiology as the correct term.

4. Which cells carry oxygen in the body using hemoglobin?

Oxygen transport in the bloodstream is carried by hemoglobin within red blood cells. Hemoglobin binds oxygen in the lungs and releases it to tissues where it's needed, using the iron-containing heme groups to carry up to four oxygen molecules per hemoglobin molecule. Plasma carries only dissolved oxygen and is not the primary transport method, while platelets and white blood cells perform clotting and immune functions, not oxygen transport.

5. Which human disease is related to the simian immunodeficiency virus (SIV) that affects non-human primates?

SIV in non-human primates is the close relative of the human virus that causes infection in people. When this virus crossed into humans, it became HIV, the human immunodeficiency virus. HIV is the agent that attacks the immune system, and if not treated, it can progress to AIDS, the syndrome of severe immune deficiency. The other options are caused by entirely different pathogens and aren't linked to SIV/HIV.

6. Which site is commonly used for a small blood draw in cattle?

- A. Caudal tail vein**
- B. Jugular vein
- C. Subcutaneous
- D. Ear vein

The coccygeal (caudal tail) vein is commonly used for small blood draws in cattle. It sits shallow at the base of the tail and is easy to feel and access with minimal restraint, making a quick, small-volume collection practical in barn settings. Using a small-gauge needle, you can distend the vein and obtain just a small sample without the need for the more involved restraint that jugular puncture often requires. In contrast, the jugular vein is larger and better suited to larger volume draws or when frequent sampling is needed, but it requires more careful restraint and has a higher risk of hematoma if not done properly. The subcutaneous route isn't a method for drawing blood, and the ear vein is not as reliable or routinely used for small-volume venipuncture in cattle.

7. Short bones are typically found in the wrist and ankle.

Short bones are cube-like in shape, with roughly equal dimensions, and are designed for stability in small joints. This shape lets them support complex, yet constrained, movements in tight spaces. In the skeleton, the carpal bones of the wrist and the tarsal bones of the ankle are classic examples. Their interior is spongy (cancellous) bone surrounded by a thin outer layer of compact bone, which contrasts with long bones that act mainly as levers. Because of their structure and location, short bones reliably reside in the wrist and ankle, so the statement is true. Non-committal or opposing options don't align with established anatomy.

8. Which class of drugs was discovered after testing on cats and prevents the clotting of blood?

Anticoagulants are the drug class that prevents blood from clotting by interrupting the clotting cascade. They work downstream from the initial vessel injury, reducing the formation of thrombin and fibrin, which are essential to a clot. This makes them especially useful for preventing new clots in conditions like deep vein thrombosis or after surgeries, and they've historically been identified through early pharmacologic studies in animals, including cats, which helped reveal substances that slow or stop the coagulation process. A helpful contrast: antiplatelets mainly stop platelets from sticking together, which is more about arterial clots, while anticoagulants interfere with the protein factors that form a fibrin-based clot. Vasodilators change blood flow by widening vessels, and antibiotics fight infections. So, the option that best fits "prevents the clotting of blood" is the anticoagulants.

9. What is the liquid portion of blood called?

Plasma is the liquid portion of blood. It's the fluid that remains when cells are separated out from blood that has been prevented from clotting, and it contains water, electrolytes, nutrients, hormones, wastes, and proteins including albumin, globulins, and fibrinogen and other clotting factors. Plasma makes up about 55% of blood and serves as the transport medium for cells and dissolved substances. Serum, by contrast, is the liquid part left after blood has clotted; it lacks fibrinogen and other clotting factors. The clot itself is the solid gel formed during coagulation, and RBCs are the cells that carry oxygen.

10. Which animal behavior category may result in growling, showing the teeth, and pinning the ears?

A. Aggressive

B. Playful

C. Fearful

D. Submissive

Aggression is being signaled here. Growling acts as a warning to back off, showing the teeth is a threat display to communicate potential harm, and ears pinned back reinforce a defensive or assertive stance aimed at intimidating the other animal. Taken together, these cues point to a readiness to escalate and defend territory, resources, or personal space, which is the hallmark of an aggressive display. In contrast, playful interactions usually include a relaxed body and non-threatening signals, fearful animals tend to retreat or show submissive cues rather than threaten, and submissive behavior centers on appeasement and avoidance rather than warning or intimidation.
