Additionally, while zooming in is a part of what the backslash can do, it is more accurately described as toggling between zooming in and out rather than exclusively zooming in. Lastly, opening project settings follows a different command altogether and does not involve the use of the backslash key. Understanding the function of this key is essential for navigating the timeline efficiently and enhancing one's editing precision.
