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## **Explanations**

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## 1. What is the primary purpose of using a LUT in color grading in Premiere Pro?

- A. LUTs apply a predefined color transformation to a clip to achieve a specific look.**
- B. LUTs automatically correct exposure and white balance.

*LUTs apply a predefined color transformation to a clip to achieve a specific look. A LUT is essentially a table that maps each input color value to an output value, so when you apply it, the entire image shifts to a desired style, mood, or tonal balance. This lets you quickly establish a baseline or match the look across multiple shots, which is especially useful when working with footage from different cameras or lighting. LUTs aren't automatic corrections. They don't automatically fix exposure or white balance on their own, and they don't replace all color grading adjustments. After applying a LUT, you typically fine-tune exposure, contrast, and color using other grading tools to achieve the exact result you want. And while some LUTs can function within a color-space conversion workflow, their primary purpose remains delivering a specific look rather than converting color spaces.*

*A model release is a contract in which the model grants permission to use their likeness and, for the uses described, protects you from certain legal claims. The key idea is liability protection: by securing the release, you reduce the risk of lawsuits from the model about how their image is used, as long as you stay within the agreed terms. It does not grant you exclusive ownership of the footage, nor does it guarantee exclusive broadcast rights. It may include waivers related to privacy or publicity for the permitted uses, but the primary takeaway is that it releases you from certain legal liability for the uses covered in the release.*

## 3. Which marker workflow best supports navigation and notes on the timeline?

*Markers on the timeline are for quick navigation and for capturing notes about edit points. The best workflow is to add markers with the M key, move between them with the J/K/L shortcuts, and use marker notes or color coding to annotate what each point means or what needs to be done. This setup lets you scrub or play to the next important moment, then instantly reference the context you wrote or the color cue you assigned, keeping the editing process focused and communicative with reviewers. In practice, you'd place a marker at a cut or beat where timing needs adjustment, write a concise note, and maybe color-code it to indicate the type of action required (e.g., timing, color, sound). The other options miss essential capabilities—markers aren't only for exporting notes, there is navigation between markers, and they don't automatically summarize edits.*

#### 4. A color and shade of a color is referred to as what?

*Hue is the color family itself—the actual color you're looking at, like red, blue, or green. It identifies the basic color and serves as the label under which shades of that color exist. When you see a shade, you're just looking at a darker version of that same hue, created by adding black. Saturation would describe how vivid or dull that color is, brightness/value would describe how light or dark the color appears, and temperature refers to warm vs. cool tones of the overall image. So the term that best names both the color and its variations on the color wheel is hue.*

#### 5. Which resolution is considered Full HD?

*Full HD refers to the resolution of 1920x1080, which provides 1080 vertical pixels and a 16:9 aspect ratio. This 1080p format is the standard for many TV broadcasts, Blu-ray, and streaming, offering more detail than 1280x720 (720p) but not as many pixels as 4K (3840x2160). The other options are either higher (4K) or lower (720p) or a common laptop-specific resolution that doesn't reach 1080 vertical lines. So the 1920x1080 resolution is the one that meets Full HD.*

#### 6. Select, move, and trim clips in the timeline?

*The Selection Tool is what you use to select, move, and trim clips in the timeline. It's the primary editing tool because you can click a clip to pick it, drag to reposition it along the timeline, and drag the clip's edges to trim its in or out points. This gives you direct, intuitive control over clip placement and duration. The other tools serve different tasks: the Pen Tool adds or adjusts keyframes for effects or opacity, the Type Tool creates text, and the Hand Tool simply pans the timeline when you're navigating a zoomed-in view. So for selecting, moving, and trimming in the timeline, the Selection Tool is the best choice.*

## 7. Is all stock footage free?

*Not all stock footage is free. Stock libraries typically require a license or a payment to use clips, with different models like royalty-free (pay once for broad use) or rights-managed (costs vary by use). While free stock footage exists, it's only a subset and often comes with limits such as attribution or restrictions on commercial use. So you can find free clips, but you should not assume every stock clip is free—always check the license terms before using footage in a project.*

## 8. How do you relink media that has gone offline in a project?

- A. Reimport the file from the Media Browser
- B. Right-click the offline clip in the Project panel and choose Relink Media; locate the missing file or folder to reconnect the media**
- C. Delete the offline clip and re-import

*Relinking offline media means pointing Premiere Pro back to the original file so the project can reconnect the clip without creating a new asset. When a file is moved or renamed, Premiere can't find it and marks the clip as offline. The reliable way to fix this is to use Relink Media on the offline clip in the Project panel and browse to the missing file (or its containing folder). Once you select the correct file, Premiere reattaches the clip and preserves all your edits, in/out points, and effects. Reimporting creates a new clip in the project and won't reconnect the existing item in your timeline, which can disrupt edits and metadata. Deleting and re-importing similarly replaces the asset rather than restoring the original connection. The Relink All option is broader and would try to reconnect multiple items at once, which isn't as precise when only one file is offline.*

## 9. The default choice on the clip mismatch settings is

*When you add a clip whose properties don't match the timeline sequence, Premiere asks how to handle the mismatch. The default is to Keep Existing Settings, which preserves the sequence's current frame rate, resolution, and pixel aspect. This keeps your timeline stable and avoids unexpected changes to how your project looks or renders. You can later choose to conform the clip if you want by interpreting the clip to its own properties, or by changing the sequence settings to match the clip. Using the other options would immediately alter the sequence or project settings—changing how the clip is interpreted or how the timeline is defined—so they're more disruptive if you're aiming to maintain the current sequence setup.*

**10. What operation swaps a clip on the timeline while preserving adjacent timing?**

- A. Cut the clip with the Razor tool and reassemble.

*Swapping the clip on the timeline while keeping the surrounding timing intact is accomplished by replacing the clip with another clip from your project. Using Replace With Clip (or Replace Footage) swaps the source content while preserving the in and out points on the timeline, so the edit points with adjacent clips don't move. The new clip takes the same timeline duration as the old one, keeping the surrounding cuts and transitions exactly where they are. This is different from the Slip tool, which only changes which portion of the same clip is shown without swapping to a different clip, and from time remapping or razor cuts, which alter timing or the structure of edits.*
