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## **Explanations**

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**1. The Fifth Fleet's area of responsibility includes the Red Sea and which other sea?**

- A. Arabian Sea**
- B. Baltic Sea**
- C. Black Sea**
- D. Sea of Japan**

The key idea is understanding the Fifth Fleet's region of responsibility in the Middle East. The Red Sea sits at the northern end of a busy set of sea lanes that run from the Persian Gulf through the Arabian Sea and into the Indian Ocean. The two seas are connected by the Bab el Mandeb Strait, so the Fifth Fleet's AOR naturally pairs the Red Sea with the Arabian Sea for security and freedom-of-navigation operations in this vital corridor. The other seas listed aren't in the Fifth Fleet's area of responsibility: the Baltic Sea and the Black Sea are in Europe and overseen by other commands, and the Sea of Japan is in the Pacific region.

**2. Why did the United States maintain a presence in the Mediterranean after World War II?**

The idea being tested is how early Cold War strategy shaped U.S. military posture. After World War II, the United States kept a substantial presence in the Mediterranean primarily to deter the Soviet Union from pressuring or expanding toward key regional allies, especially Turkey and Iran. This kept these two states within a Western security orbit at a time when the Soviets sought influence in the region and posed a potential threat to crucial lines of communication and balance of power. Turkey sits at a strategic gateway between Europe and Asia and controls the vital straits, while Iran lies close to Soviet influence in the north and sits near important oil resources. Showing a visible U.S. military presence reassured these allies and signaled that aggressive moves would be countered. Oil security and access were important considerations, but they were not the primary reason for the sustained presence; the overarching goal was deterrence of Soviet expansion and protection of Allies in a volatile era. The other options don't fit the main purpose: UN peacekeeping missions were not the driving mission of the Mediterranean force, and enforcing sanctions against Italy wasn't the focus of that ongoing U.S. posture.

**3. Which Army rank is associated with the E-6 pay grade?**

Understanding how pay grades map to Army ranks helps you connect the numbers to the titles. In the Army, enlisted pay grades run from E-1 to E-9. The E-6 level is held by the Staff Sergeant, who serves as an NCO responsible for leading a squad and assisting at the platoon level. The other ranks listed sit at different pay grades: Sergeant is E-5 (one level below), Sergeant First Class is E-7 (one level above), and Master Sergeant is E-8 (two levels above). So the rank that matches E-6 is Staff Sergeant.

**4. Which expedition was a predecessor to Operation NEW DAWN in its lineage of post-9/11 operations?**

Post-9/11 expedition lineage shows how later operations build on the earlier campaigns in the War on Terror. After 9/11, Operation Enduring Freedom in Afghanistan established the initial framework for counterterrorism operations and coalition efforts. As the campaign broadened, Operation Iraqi Freedom in Iraq followed, and in 2009 the Iraq mission was renamed Operation New Dawn to reflect a shift toward stabilization, reconstruction, and governance while remaining part of the same overall effort. In this course's sequence, Enduring Freedom is the earliest post-9/11 expedition that sets the stage for later operations, making it the predecessor in the lineage leading to New Dawn.

The Third Fleet's headquarters is in San Diego, California, because it serves as the West Coast command hub for U.S. Pacific Fleet, keeping the fleet's leadership close to its ships and operating area in the eastern Pacific. The Third Fleet operates from Naval Base San Diego (Point Loma), which provides the facilities and logistics needed to coordinate training, deployments, and operations across the Pacific. The other cities listed are centers for other fleets or commands, not the Third Fleet's HQ.

**6. Which of the following best describes the Navy's primary Atlantic role during World War II?**

- A. Countering German U-boats and convoying troops and equipment to Europe**

The main idea being tested is the Navy's primary objective in the Atlantic: ensuring the safe transport of forces and materiel to Europe. That central task was carried out through the convoy system—protecting ships carrying troops and equipment and delivering them to force concentrations in Europe. Countering U-boats is the critical means by which this goal is achieved, but the overarching purpose is to move those troops and gear across the ocean. So the best description is convoying troops and equipment to Europe, because it focuses on the essential outcome of Atlantic operations. The other options describe important aspects (like anti-submarine work) or narrower duties (defending the U.S. coastline) but don't capture the primary mission of delivering forces and matériel across the Atlantic as clearly.

**7. Who is known as the Drillmaster of the American Revolution?**

Training and discipline shape how effectively an army fights. Baron von Steuben, a Prussian officer who joined the American cause, arrived at Valley Forge and introduced a rigorous, standardized drill program. He reduced complex tactics to simple, repeatable steps, taught formations, bayonet drill, and marching, and wrote a practical training manual used to instill uniform procedures across the troops. He also established inspections and routines that kept soldiers fit, disciplined, and confident in their abilities. That systematic, hands-on approach transformed raw recruits into a capable, cohesive fighting force, earning him the title known for shaping the Continental Army—the Drillmaster of the American Revolution. Other figures played crucial roles in leadership and strategy, but the distinctive emphasis on rigorous training and discipline defines this commander’s contribution.

**8. In the early 1900s, promotions were used to fill vacancies in which area?**

Promotions were used to fill voids in critical Navy billets, normally within the officer’s own command, because promoting from within that command keeps essential leadership in place where it matters most. This approach preserves continuity, ensures the person stepping up already understands the unit’s procedures, culture, and current operations, and minimizes disruption during shortages. The other options don’t fit this practice: shore billets overseas are typically filled by assignments or detachments rather than promotion within a command; civilian contractor positions involve civilian hires outside the military rank system; staff officer exchanges are temporary cross-command experiences rather than a primary method for filling critical vacancies with promotions.

**9. What is the primary purpose of a ship christening?**

The ceremony is about naming the vessel and blessing it as it enters the water for the first time. This act formally assigns the ship its name and seeks good luck and protection for its future voyages, often with a sponsor breaking a bottle of champagne over the bow and a blessing by a chaplain or official. It signals the ship’s official entry into service and ties the vessel to Navy tradition and morale. The other options describe actions unrelated to the christening: retirement or decommissioning happens at the end of a ship’s life, while repainting the hull is a maintenance task.

**10. After ships return from deployment, when do they enter basic training?**

The main idea here is maintaining readiness through timely refresher training. After returning from deployment, crews immediately begin basic training again to refresh essential procedures, systems, and safety practices, and to catch up on any new SOPs or equipment changes. This minimizes skill decay and keeps the ship prepared for the next mission. Delaying training would let proficiency slip and push back the ship's next cycle, which is why almost immediate re-entry into training is the best fit.
