## 1. Which principle targets high-risk offenders?

The principle being tested is that resources should be concentrated on those who pose the highest risk of reoffending. When probation systems use risk assessments, they identify high-risk offenders and assign them more intensive supervision, closer monitoring, and targeted interventions. The idea is that focusing attention on the offenders most likely to commit new crimes yields the greatest reduction in overall recidivism and makes limited resources more effective. This approach stands in contrast to broader aims like deterrence or rehabilitation without regard to an individual's risk level: deterrence is about discouraging crime in general, rehabilitation focuses on changing behavior without necessarily prioritizing who is most likely to offend, and public safety is the overall goal rather than the specific method of allocating supervision. Historically, the shift toward risk-based decision making in probation gained prominence with research and frameworks in the late 20th century (such as the risk-need-responsivity model), which structured how supervision and treatment should be matched to offenders' risk levels.

A Presentence Investigation (PSI) is meant to give the judge a clear, evidence-based picture of the offender and the circumstances to guide sentencing. Therefore, the report should present concrete findings—data, risk assessments, prior history, treatment needs—and tie each conclusion to that evidence. Detailed statistics support credibility and precision, while the tone should avoid unsupported personal impressions; clear, well-supported conclusions are the goal.

Case management in probation relies on a risk/needs assessment. This approach blends two critical elements: how likely someone is to reoffend (risk) and what factors drive that risk (criminogenic needs). The risk part helps decide how intensely a person should be supervised, while the needs part identifies specific areas to target with services—such as substance use, employment, housing, social networks, and attitudes—that, when addressed, reduce the chance of reoffending. This pairing is central to evidence-based practice and the RNR framework, which emphasizes matching supervision and interventions to risk and addressing the factors that fuel that risk while also being responsive to the individual's abilities and circumstances. Relying on risk alone misses intervention targets; relying on needs alone may not set appropriate supervision levels; and case notes review, though useful for monitoring, doesn't provide the proactive, structured framework for planning.

Rational-legal authority is the one grounded in a system of rules and offices that people accept as legitimate. This mutual agreement means both those who govern (by creating and enforcing the rules) and those who are governed (who consent by following the legal framework) recognize and accept the legitimacy of the authority. Charismatic authority relies on a leader's personal appeal, and traditional authority rests on customs and lineage, not on a formal system of rules that people collectively accept. So the best answer is rational-legal authority.

Relying on formal procedures and having limited discretion describes a bureaucracy. This structure promotes consistency, accountability, and predictability—key in probation and justice settings where uniform processing, documentation, and oversight (like standardized intake, decision checklists, and formal appeals) are essential. Historically, reforms in criminal justice emphasize bureaucratic administration to reduce arbitrariness and ensure fair, auditable processes. Role conflict is about competing demands on a person's roles, not the organization's overall structure. Evidence-based refers to using research to guide practice rather than describing how an organization is run. Referral means directing someone to another service, which describes a function rather than the organizational form.

The goal is to balance monitoring with appropriate treatment and support so supervision becomes a pathway to rehabilitation rather than just punishment. This stands in contrast to strictly punitive approaches or incarceration, which emphasize punishment or confinement without the same focus on tailored treatment and ongoing support in the community.

This information can influence sentencing and orders for restitution, making the financial impact on the victim a central element of the statement. It isn't about the broader emotional impact on the community, the crime's timeline, or the penalties imposed by the court—that last part is determined by the judge through the legal process.

Relapse typically refers to returning to substance use or a similar behavior while the person is in treatment or recovery, not necessarily committing a new criminal offense. A technical violation describes breaking the conditions of the supervision agreement—like missing appointments or failing a drug test—without committing a new crime. Escalation suggests increasing severity or frequency of violations, but it isn't the standard term for a new criminal act after supervision starts. So the best fit for describing a new offense occurring after supervision begins is "new crime."
