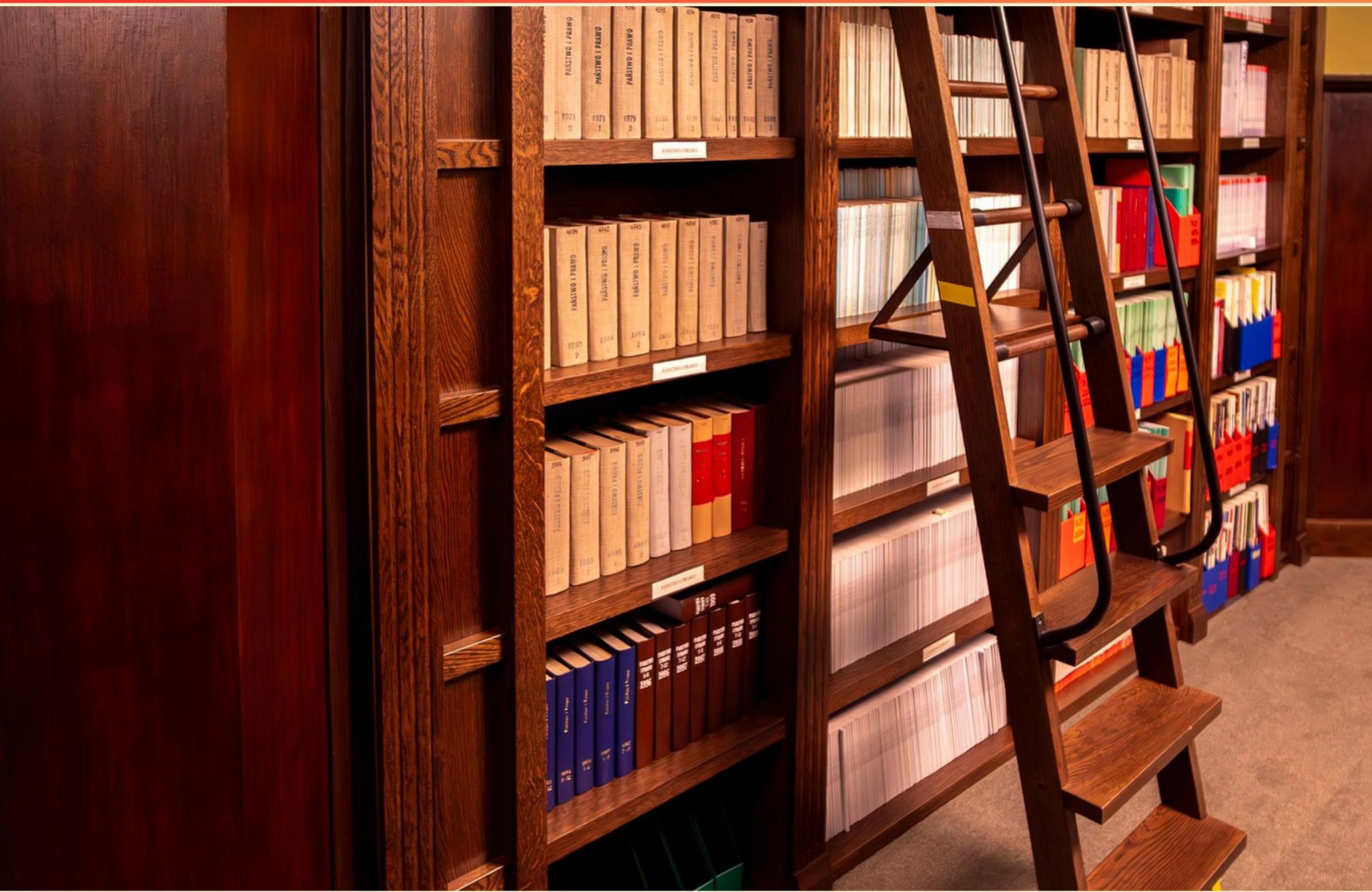

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Explanations

This is why modern policy emphasizes proportional penalties, the idea that punishments should fit the offense, and the importance of certainty and swiftness in enforcement to deter crime, along with strong due process protections and protections against torture. This approach supports public safety while recognizing that people can and do reform within the context of community life, making it the model that replaced the medical approach in probation thinking.

Higher complexity can come with managing many local adaptations, but it isn't the advantage; the benefit rests in the ability to adapt to who is being supervised and what is available in the community.

Summarizing simply shortens content and does not necessarily remove sensitive details. So redacting best fits the described process.
